WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 .- In the most drastic speech that has been made in the Senate this session, Senator Norris of Nebraska attacked the Underwood Muscle Shoals bill as a "rape upon the treasury and a gold brick to the American farmers," and declared that it's adoption would hand over control of the giant water power project to a monopoly stretching over the country and headed by the General Electric company.

"Adoption of the Underwood Muscle Shoals bill will make the Tea-Muscle Shoals bill will make the Tea-pot Dome scandal look like a pin-head," Norris declared. "Doheny and Sinchair will realize they were only S'nclair will realize they were only pikers when this lease is consumma-
