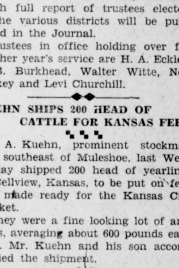
RUEN SHIPS 200 HEAD OF CATTLE FOR KANSAS FEED
