Ed Welch convicted of the killing
 of Ben Tanager in the hills in Ed-
 wards county about five years ago
 has been captured. The arrest was
 made by Sheriff P. P. and Constable
 Mack Weaver of Edwards county
 at Bertram, Texas. It will be
 remembered that it was reported
 at the time that Welch after a
 gamble killed Tanager for Welch's
 red topped boots. Welch was
 afterwards convicted and given 25
 years. Since that time he has been
 indicted by the grand jury at Del
 Rio for another crime. After sen-
 tence had been affirmed by the
 Court of Appeals, Welch was
 at Uvalde and he was captured
 for the year. He was
 at Del Rio charged with the
 killing of his brother-in-law on
 of the Neuman's.

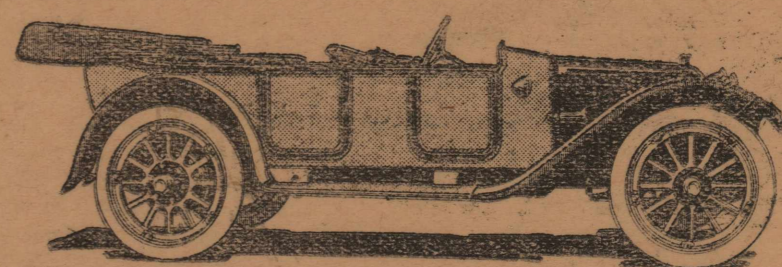

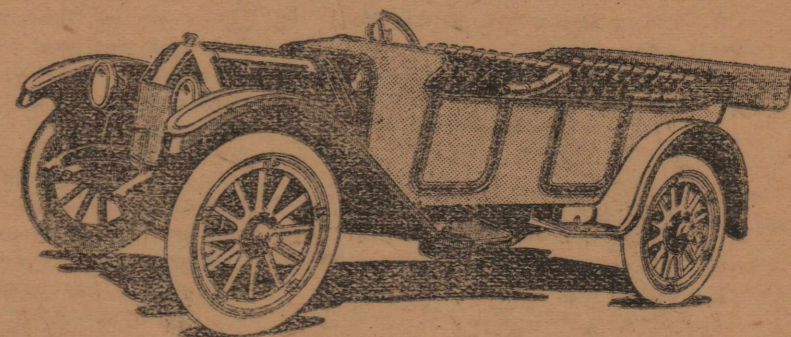
