WHEAT SHORTAGE LOOMS AS REPORT MADE ON OUTLOOK
For the first time in the Twentieth Century production of all wheat in the United States will be less than estimated domestic needs, government statistics indicated Wednesday.
The crop reporting board estimated winter wheat production as of May 1 at 337,485,000 bushes, or 66.7 per cent of normal. It will be the smallest crop since 1904 if the estimate materializes.
Managers of two of Amarillo's

Managers of two of Amarillo's largest grain elevators estimate the Texas Panhandle wheat crop at from \$,000,000 to 12,000,000 bushels, which would place the yield from \$,000,000 to 1902, generally estimated at 14 million bushels. It will be the shortest crop since the Panhandle came to be known as a wheat country.

Stidham Gets A 1,200 Gallon Well For Irrigation

For Irrigation

M. S. Stidham, living about threequariers of a mile northwest of Muleshoe, last week finished a fine Irrigation well to be used in watering the
crops on his 40 acre farm. He is a
dairyman, milking 18 cews, and will
plant much of his crop to feed for his
milk herd.

The well was drilled by A. B. Hays,
local driller, and was sunk to a depth
of 102 feet. The hole is 15% inches in
diameter for the first 40 feet and
12½ inches for the next 62 feet, being
cased with 12½ inch casing. The first
strata of water was encountered at
about 10 feet, and again at 85 feet
continued for the rest of the well
depth. The well is cased with 12 inch
steel casing. Mr. Stidham has installed
a No. 10 Layne & Bowler 2-stage centrifugal pump in the well with a capactivy of 1,200 gallons per minute, and
states he has no difficulty in obtaining full capacity.



A great thing has occurred amongst us. We have made a complete turn-around, and at last America's face is toward the future.

Three years---1929 to 1932---we Americans looked backward. All our old financial and political machinery was geared to pull us out of the depression by the same door through which we entered. We thought it simply a case of going back the way we came. It failed. We now realize that the way out is forward---through it.

Thanks for that belongs to President Roosevelt. Inauguration Day he turned the Ship of State around. Having observed the failure of sincere efforts to haul us back the way we came, he designed a new method --- new political and financial machinery --- to pull us out the way we are going --- forward. He is clearing international obstacles out of the way; he does not stand in awe of tariffs. The people begin to feel that he does not take advice from the "interests"; that he has courage and loyalty to work for one supreme interest only---the welfare of the American people. That is a big achievement for two months in office.

And now we all look to what is coming; we grow less and less concerned with what is behind. We are locking for a hand-hold on the haul rope. Every man wants to do what he can, and all, he can.

The best thing I can do for the Country is to create industry by building good motor cars. If I knew anything better to do, I would do it. Industry must be my contribution. Motor cars must face ahead to the future, like everything else. They are so much part of the Nation's daily life that if they lag behind they hold the Country back.
