| Walter D. Cline, prominent oil man of Wichita Falls, was last week chosen president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at its annual meeting held at Big Spring, succeeding Wilbur c. Hawk. San Angelo was selected as the place for holding the 1934 meeting of that regional body.. The meeting was attended by R. L. Brown, director, and Cecil H. Tate, county attorney, from Muleshoe, Mr. Brown naming this city as inviting the organization to hold its next meeting place here. Plainview ran a close second as the next convention city. <br> The organization goes into the new year with $\$ 23,000 \mathrm{cash}$ balance and the largest number of affiliated towns in largest number of affiliated towns in history. <br> Policies outlined in resolutions adopted without dissent express opposition to an attempt to weaken public education and specifically to abolishing or unduly restricting state colleges in West Texas. Opposition also was expressed to the concentration of the control of all state's colleges in the hands of a single board. The organization reaffirmed its stand for oll and gas conservation, requesting the author ities to reduce and enforce the allowable in line with consumption to prevent "the present gross and unjustifiable waste."
