### BANISHING THE BARBERRY.

As the alternation of the grain rust, Puccinia graminis, between wheat and the common barberry is a very old story among botanists, it is curious that determined efforts to banish barberry from the wheatgrowing regions of this country should not have antedated the present year. Last summer the federal horticultural board invited the cooperation of more than 6.000 nurserymen throughout the United plant. The nurserymen have quite generally signed pledges not to ship Berberis vulgaris to the Upper Mississippi valley and a campaign is under way to exterminate the plant in the same region. 
