



The total subscription of the fifth Victory loan was \$5,249,908,300, an excess of \$749,908,300, or 16.66 per cent over the prescribed quota of \$4,500,-000,000, according to final official figures tabulated at the treasury in Washington, D. C. All districts except Atlanta and Dallas over-subscribed their quotas.

In Great Britian about 22 per cent of all meat consumed is mut ton. In France the per cent is about 11. In Canada it is not quite 7, and in the United States it is only about 31-3 per cent. Last year (1918) the consumption of dressed meet (lard excluded) in the United States averaged 150 pounds per person, of which only 5 were mutton and lamb.

The British, the Canadians and the French-all smilar types of people and having habits of life similar to Americans—use less meat than Americans do but a much larger proportion comes from sheep. The United States gets its meat principally from catand hogs. Pork consumption is about 14 times, and beef consump tion about 13 times, as great as | our use of muttor and lamb. 
