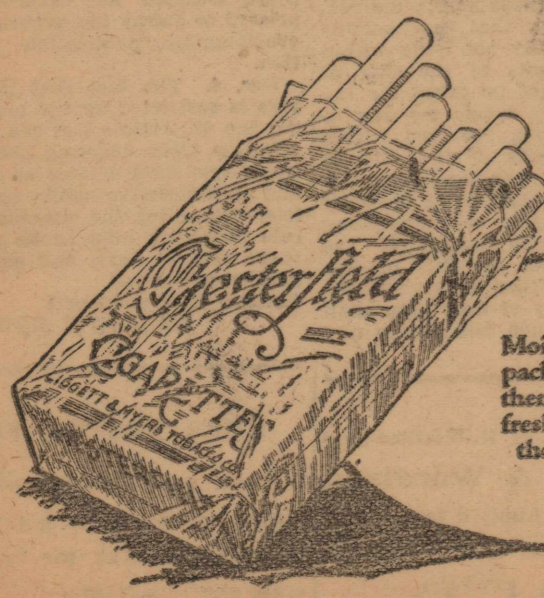

Highway No. 4, to be completed by Mid-Summer, 1920.

Every county along the route of the Del Rio-Canadian State Highway No. 4, with only two exceptions, has already appropriated funds for the improvement and hard surfacing of its part of the road, according to reports that were made to the convention of the Del Rio-Canadian Highway Association at Sweetwater Wednesday. It is hoped that by midsummer of next year the road will be finished and marked from end to end.

Plans have already been made for marking the route of the highway. The letters "D. R. C." and underneath them the figure "4," are the symbol that was suggested by Captain J. D. Fauntleroy for the stencils with which the highway is to be marked, and each county along the highway was assessed \$20 to cover organization expenses, including office supplies and the like and also stencils for marking the highway route.

The feature of the meeting was an address by Captain J. D. Fauntleroy, federal district highway engineer, whose headquarters are at Fort Worth. He spoke on "Cooperation in Road Building," and his remarks were listened to with much attention.

Tom Green county represented by Thomas F. Owen, who is secretary and treasurer of the association. The countries below San Angelo were rained out, and their delegates were unable to get to the convention. The counties on the central and northern portions of the line were on hand, however, and a strong delegation was present from Coke county.

The officers of the association, who were named at Mineral Wells in April when the organizing was formed, will hold over until next year.

It is pointed out that the highway when it completed will cross the Rio Grande at Del Rio and lead to Mexico City, while at its northern end it will stretch across the northern border of the United States into Canada. It will likely it is pointed out, be the only highway in the country that will have international connections at both ends—Standard.

Citation by Publication.

THE STATE OF TEXAS:

To the Sheriff or any Constable of Sutton County, Texas, GREETING: You are hereby commanded to summon Butler M. Alexander by such publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper of general circulation, published in our County, which has been continuously and regularly published for a period of not less than one year, to be and appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Sutton County, to be held at the Court House thereof in Sonora, Texas, on the third Monday after the first Monday in September, 1919, the same being the 22nd day of September, A.D. 1919, a suit numbered on the docket of said Court No. 271 between Mrs. Alice Alexander in lawsuit and Butler M. Alexander defendant, said petition alleging:

1st. That she is an actual bona fide resident of the State of Texas and has resided in said County of Sutton for at least six months next preceding the filing of this suit. That the residence and whereabouts of the defendant is of the plaintiff unknown.

2d. That on or about the 27th day of July 1914, in the County of Sutton, State of Texas, plainiff was lawfully married to defendant; that they continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about the 15th day of January, 1916, when the defendant without just cause, permanently abandoned plaintiff, since which time they have not lived together as husband and wife.

3rd. Plaintiff alleges that during the time she and the defendant lived together as aforesaid, she was kind and affectionate to him, and conducted herself with propriety, but that the defendant, unconsistently with the duties and obligations of his marital vows, on or about the date aforesaid, with the intention of permanently abandoning plaintiff as aforesaid, without cause or the consent of the plaintiff, since which time they have not lived together as husband and wife.

4th. That plaintiff, during the time she lived with the defendant as aforesaid, had two children by him, to wit: A boy, thirteen years of age by the name of Otto Alexander and a girl, eleven years of age, by the name ofewel Alexander. That said children are now and have ever been in the care, control and custody of the plaintiff; that plaintiff is the proper person to have the care, control, custody and education of said children; that she is a bona fide resident and willing to properly maintain and educate her said children.

5th. Wherefore, plaintiff prays the Court that the defendant be ordered to appear and answer this petition, according to law, and that upon hearing hereof said marriage between plaintiff and defendant be dissolved and declared null and void, and that plaintiff have judgment for the care, custody and education of the said children of said marriage, for costs of suit, and for such other and further relief legal and general, in law and equity to which she may be entitled.

6th. Herein fail not, but have before said Court on the said first day of the next term thereof, this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

SCOUTS BOOSTED IN BOSTON.

A letter to the Boston Transcript, signed among others by Charles W. Eliot and A. Lawrence Lowell, says in part:

We are entering an era of readjustments in wages and prices. In many cases lack of employment and clashes of opinion between employers and employees will be inevitable. Unless we adopt every reasonable means to promote right understanding and good feeling between our various groups—unless we keep to the front the importance of hearty co-operation—much hard feeling is sure to be generated, and we need only read the newspapers to be warned of the possible results.

We cannot expect a complete safeguard against this danger, but the public is coming to recognize that the boy scout movement gives considerable protection, because it promotes mutual understanding and good feeling.

BOHEMIAN BOY SCOUTS.

Scouts in Prague sounds like the real thing in scouting. A letter from them reads:

"Bohemian boy scouts of the First Scout troop at Prague in the Czechoslovakian republic send greetings to their brother scouts in America.

"Members of this troop are river scouts; all round sportsmen who row, yacht, canoe, tramp, swim, etc. In winter they skate and ski, and go camping with sledge and ski.

"The troop has four canoes, two rowing boats, two sailing yachts and a motorboat, their clubhouse, a ship 15 feet long with club rooms in the middle for 20 to 30 boys. The ship lies at anchor in Prague."

SCOUTING ALIVE AT COLLEGE.

The University of Pittsburgh has adopted scouting with enthusiasm, says Chancellor S. B. McCormick. Ten faculty members are instructing in scouting subjects, and courses in camp cookery and the duties of scoutmasters have been started.
