### Nicotine Dip Not Permitted.

Fort Worth, March 24, 1920. E. E. Stricklen, Secretary Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association. Referring to our letter under date of March 4th in regard to your resolution of February 9th with reference to the reinstatement of the "Black Leaf 40" nicotine dip as an official dip recognized by this Commission.

At a meeting held in Houston March 15th by the three Commissioners, it was decided that no change would be made in so far as recognizing the "Black Leaf 40" as an official dip for this Commission. Therefore, the use of the nicotine dip is not allowed for the dipping of sheep affected with scabies mites.

Kindly advise all concerned as to the decision of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission in this matter, and oblige.

### Albert R. Cauthorn, a Pioneer Ranchman and Honored Citizen Was Buried Sunday. Special Services at the Grave.

Albert R. Cauthorn died at his ranch home, 18 miles south of Sonora, Saturday, April, 10th, 1920, aged 75 years, 1 month and 12 days. He is survived by his widow, five sons and two daughters. The sons are James A., Robert, B. R. (Billie), Daniel, John, Oliver, and the daughters, Mrs. Stella Altizer and Miss Ida Cauthorn all of Sonora. Three brothers, Daniel of Porter, Okla. and Robert and Theodore of Mexico, Mo., and one sister, Mrs. Francis Summer of Vernon, Texas also survive.

Deceased was born in Mexico, Mo., February 27, 1845 and came to Texas in 1882 and settled in Sutton county in 1887 and has been a highly respected citizen and worthy neighbor. Always a home loving, retiring disposition he attended strictly to his home and family and was consequently not as well known as many who have been with us but a few years.

The funeral was from the ranch Sunday afternoon and a number of friends accompanied the remains to Sonora and as the procession passed through town to the cemetery many others joined in and accompanied the remains to their last resting place.

The pall bearers were: W. L. Aldwell, E. E. Sawyer, D. J. Wyatt, E. F. Vander Stucken, G. W. Stephenson, J. D. Lowrey. The services at the grave were simple and very impressive and were conducted in conformity with the wishes of the deceased, by District Judge James Cornell. The choir of the Episcopal church sang several selections.

The following remarks were by Judge James Cornell and are a tribute to the memory of this pioneer ranchman and father:

We are gathered to perform the last and sad rites over the body of Albert R. Cauthorn, to pay a tribute of respect to his memory.

Mr. Cauthorn was born in Missouri on April 27th, 1845, removed to Texas in 1882, and to Sutton County in 1887.

Singularly enough Mr. Cauthorn was born in the year Texas joined the United States, and became a member of the Sisterhood of States. His life has been spent in an undeveloped but fast developing portion of the United States. The changes brought about during his life time, the changes he has witnessed and experienced amount indeed to a transformation. In a worldly way he was successful, possessing everything necessary to make his life comfortable, and to enable him to care for and to render aid and assistance to those who were near and dear to him, and withal to accumulate more than a competence. Naturally strong and robust he was fortunate in living to a ripe old age, more than seventy-five years. He was fortunate in having his children live near and about him, and to live to see them grow to maturity, and to be ranked among the most prosperous and respected of the community's citizens.

I might well say that Albert R. Cauthorn was a good man. It would not be proper to say anything else, because no man should speak ill of the dead, but I might say this of Albert Cauthorn with perfect truth. I have never before attempted upon a solemn occasion of this kind to say anything, this being the first time I have essayed this trying task, and certainly I would not have answered a summons if I could not have frankly and truthfully paid a tribute to the memory of a man whom I had long known, and known to be a man of rare qualities of character and deserving of a greater and more liberal tribute

than I could hope to pay.

In all his relations with his fellow man, Albert Cauthorn was always actuated by the highest possible motives of fair and honest dealing. Practically all of the commandments, all of the rules laid down for our guidance, whether of Divine or of human origin, have to do with the relations between man and his fellow man. All of our civil laws and all of our criminal laws are designed to compel man to respect the life and property and rights of his fellow man, and to deal fairly with him. All of these were observed without effort and perhaps unconsciously by Albert R. Cauthorn. He was doubtless naturally inclined to be scrupulously honest. He had so trained himself in his early manhood to methods of honesty and fair dealing, that in his latter years in doing so he was but following a natural inclination and a natural impulse. He was kind and generous and affectionate toward his children, and that he was is borne out by the fact that they have clustered themselves about him during all his life, even long after attaining their majority. In all of his dealings with others he was willing to do right for the sake of the right, liberal, willing to make allowance for the different viewpoint of the party with whom he was dealing, willing to grant what was right and asking no more. If Albert Cauthorn were given the opportunity now to review his relations with others I am sure he could not recall an act of which he might wish to repent. In all men in their dealings with others were actuated by the high and lofty motives and by the same broad sense of right that prompted Albert Cauthorn throughout his life, I am sure we would have no need of criminal nor even civil laws, no need of courthouses, no need of almshouses, no need even of written contracts unless the writing were intended merely to perpetuate the agreements and to provide against the contingency of death. If all men were like Albert Cauthorn and were as determined as he that their lives should be governed by lofty principles of Earthly Justice, I am sure the melancholy sentence

"Man's inhumanity to man makes countless millions mourn" would not have been conceived nor written.

Then, after the placing of the flowers,

My friends: These services have been conducted in accordance with the expressed wish of the deceased. Since throughout his life his slightest wish was their law, the children and relatives of Albert Cauthorn have properly thought it meet and proper that after his departure his often expressed wish should be respected.

In the lives of but few men has there been so much of good interspersed with so little of evil. If the sum of all the good is to be weighed against the evil, then no relative of Albert R. Cauthorn need have a fear, nor "languish in fruitless and unavailing grief, nor sorrow as those who have no hope."

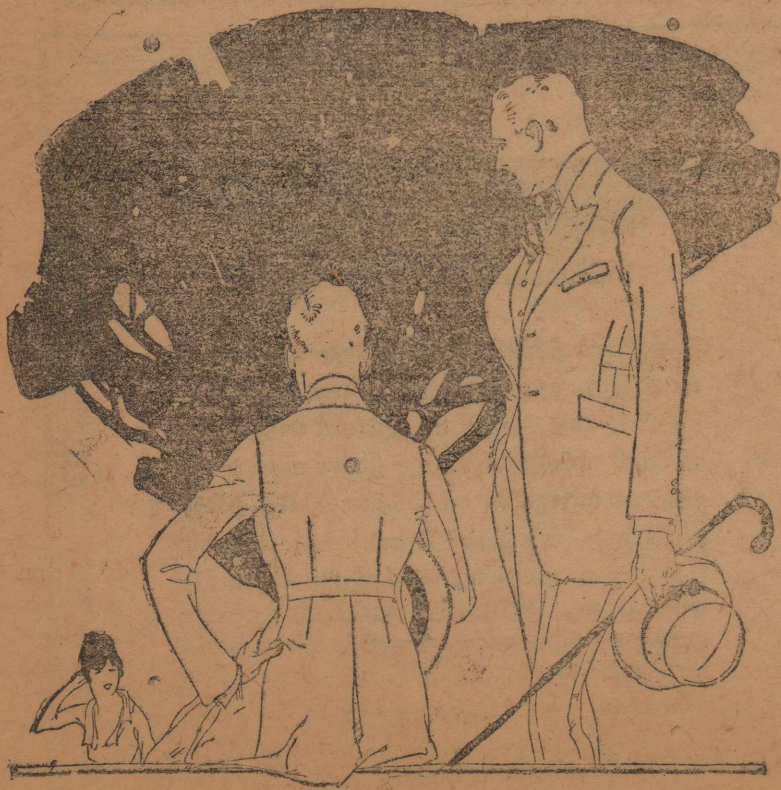
