

Cecil McLaury brought into the Journal office last Monday samples of wheat and rye taken from the H. E. Musson farm about 12 miles southeast of Muleshoe which proves conclusively the drought did not get all the small grain crop of this section.

A yard stick applied to the grain showed the wheat three feet high while the rye measured approximately four feet high, both heavily grained, and McLaury said these were average samples taken from the field. Musson has 30 acres of wheat and a small acreage of the rye, all grown without irrigation. The wheat was planted experimentally—in different ways, that planted in rows with a chain dragged over it to spread the seed proving the best method.
