duty to join the fight when the ruth- ability. less submarine campaign torpedoed the Lusitania, sending to cold, wet graves American women and children. distinctly remember his face as he read the headlines in the papers telling of the murderous slaughter of Americans on the high seas. Now when he greeted me he startled me with his first words. "The war is over. I'm a bolshevik." I did not know what the word meant, yet it carried to my mind an impression, and while the impression was hazy, it was clear at least in one particular. It sounded like the confession of a crime.

He had always been of a quiet, conservative type. Before the war one would have judged him to be a pacifist; he was even-tempered, mild of manner, and I still think that before August, 1914, he was a pacifist in head and heart. It was only the call of a just cause, the fight for an ideal in which he believed, that had made him a soldier. In this respect he was typical of 90 per cent of his countrymen.

I had spoken to him the day he enfor conscription and claimed a just exemption. He was in the beginning of his married life, with two very young children. By profession he was an engineer. Going to war meant, iving a wife and two babies, leaving his patriotism, his quiet disregard of the danger to himself. I am sure that there was little hate in his morale. He saw a danger to the world. The honor of his country had been offended against. He was an American, one of those upon whom the duty fell, so he went.

It flaved of the torch, photographed disorder, lawlessness-it registered blood, violence, assassination, force, hate, insanity. I wondered how this nine-lettered word had become the vehicle for so many sensations that disturbed peace of mind and sounded alarm.

Where had the word come from and fouled its soul? What did it reafly mean-had it a definite meaning? Was it a bug like the "flu" germ? Had it come among nations to destroy them and to the hearts of men to silence the good will to men." 

base this statement on their faith that communism will increase production. They elain that competition shackles production. They say that the competitive system takes from the individual the inducement to work-that communism would give him an incentive to work; that it would be a stimulant; that under it men would work better and produce more. They add that the present system is bound to proveke an increasing number of strikes and that strikes stop production, cause waste, increase poverty. There is no doubt about the fact that there could be no poverty in the socialistic state if communism succeeded in stimulating men to work harder, thus greatly increasing production, because there would be more to eat, more to wear, more to use, and as the distribution would be controlled by the state, all of the people would receive an equal share of the great abundance, all would have enough. For the sake of fairness to them, I am conceding that the distribution program would be bonestly and justly carried out, but a better distribution, a more equal and just division would mean nothing if the first, the fundamental promise of bolshevism-greater production-is not fulfilled. Any plan which decreases production causes a shortage of the things necessary to life. If the bolsheviks are wrong in their belief that communism will increase production; then bolshevism would make poverty general, universal, and instead of bulshevism curing the cancer on the body of civilization, it would make the entire body of civilization a cancer. If the claims of bolshevism are well founded, sound in common sense, capable of fulfillment, communism would be the greatest blessing eyer conferred upon humanity. On the other hand, if the bolcheviks are wrong, and communism took from them the inducement to work, then notwithstanding the good intentions of the bolsheviks, their communism would be the greatest scourge the world has known. This is the simple issue in the case. If bolshevism is the good thing its advocates say it is, it will bring the millennium, and every human being should be in favor of it; but if it is not practical, and will not work out, then it is a danger, the red flag is its proper signal, and the world should axold the danger signal as an engineer charged with the sufety of human life would avoid running by a red light

on the track ahead. Examine Before Condemning.

Going back to the case of our friend, the doctor who honestly and sincerely believes he has a cure for cancer, let us consider what the scientific world would demand before offering a judgment as to the value of his proposed cure. And why should both these groups get excited and irritated, call each other names, learn to hate, and add to the world's unrest?

Monarchs Tire of Switzerland.

Former Emperor Charles of Austria and Empress Zita are tired of remaining in Switzerland, according to a telegram from Prague, and have applied to the Czecho-Slovak government for permission to reside in Prague. The request was refused for political rea-

Child Victims of the War. In Jugo-Slavia there are 500,000 fatherless children of whom 150,000 are absolutely destitute. Among them tuberculosis, eye and skin diseases are rife. Of these children, up to July, fewer than 2,000 had been provided for, largely because of the tremendous difficulties attending the work in an utterly disorganized community. The government at Belgrade and the great American and English relief organizations are now working in thorough harmony in their efforts to carry these children safely through the winter. They can only succeed if there is no stacking of effort on the part of the American and British publics.

Bolshevism Not Anarchy.
