





So acute was the need for powder in 1775 that George Washington wrote to the governor of Rhode Island that "no quantity, however small, is beneath notice." Learning that there was a store in Bermuda, and that the islanders were anxious to have the embargo lifted upon shipment of food supplies from the colonies. Washington addressed a letter to the people of the island, who had shown thenseives sympathetic with the American revolution-

ists, promising them ample supply of provisions and "every other mark of affection and friendship which the grateful citizens of a free country can bestow on its brethren and benefactors" if they would make this ammunition available for the Continental

army It so happened that the powder had been procured before the letter was delivered, and with it the Continental army compelled the British to evacurte Bostou.

Not only the sale of the powder, but the fact that, Bernaida allowed the colonies to have sall; so incensed its governor that he upbraided the citizens for treason, and teeling ran so high that he was removed. His successor was a native of Salem, Mass., whose toyalty to the mother country was such that he gave up large estates in the colonies rather than join the revolu tionists. THE WORLD'S FLEET.

There is now a total of 31,595 vessels of all kinds, according to the new Register Book, of which 5,082 are sailing vessels and 26,513 steamers. Apart from Germany and Austria, the United Kingdom and Greece are the only nations showing any considerable reduction in tonnage as owned prior to 1914. Denmark and Sweden show minor losses and Norway a small gain. The United States has increased its volume of sailing tonnage during the war and now owns 45 per cent of the world's sailing vessels. The sailing ships form 6 per cent of the world's tonnage today, as against 8 per cent in 1914 and 22 per cent in 1902.
