



KEEPING WELL SNAKE BITES DR. FREDERICK R. GREEN Editor of "HEALTH"

REAR of snokes is a universal instinct. Ever since our common mother, Eve, met the snake in the Garden, the human race has feared

and hated snakes. This is not only foolish but actual-iy harmful. Black snakes, bull snakes and all the grass snakes and garter snakes are not only harmless but are also friends of the farmer and gardener, as they destroy quantities of rats, field mice and other destructive animals.

There are 163 varieties of anakes in the United States, of which 17 rarietles are poisonous. Venomous snakes all belong to one of four varietles: rattlesnakes, copperheads, water moceasins and coral snakes.

The coral snake is found almost exclusively in Florida, Water moccasins and copperheads are common in the Southern states. Rattlesnakes are distributed widely all over the

It is a common belief that whisky is an antidote for snake bites and that the only thing to do is to give the victim all the whisky that he can possibly drink. As much as five or six quarts of whisky have been given in a few hours. Such an enormous dose of alcohol is quite as dangerous as the enake poison.

In case of snake bite, the a bandage around the arm or leg (the parts most usually bitten) above the bite. This may be made of a belt, garter, suspender, handkerchief or strip of underwear. Twist it with a stick, pen-cil or knife handle, until the flow of lood is shut off.

Hightower, Then, with a sharp knife, cut through the bite, making two cuts at right angles to each other and going at least as deep as the bite. The freer the flow of blood the better. Suck the wound thoroughly, being careful that there is no crack or raw place on the lips. Spit out the blood, rinsing the mouth each time with a weak solution of permanganate of

and how should I take it?" Exophthalmic gofter is an entirely different disease from simple golter. In ordinary golter the chief and generally the only symptom is enlargement of the thyfold gland. Exophthalmic goiter is a disease which affects the entire body. It is characterized by slight enlargement of the thyroid, accompanied by protrusion of the eyes, rapid pulse, trembling of the fingers, extreme nervousness, muscular weakness, sleeplessness and loss of weight. While the popular name emphasizes the eye protrusion and the thyrold enlargement. there are cases of exophthalmic golter in which the eyes do not protrude, as there are cases in which the

gland is not enlarged. Many theories have been suggested. as to the cause of this disease; what it is we do not know. It may follow. some sudden shock or fright. It is more common among women than men. Although most common in middle adult life, it may occur at any age. It has no relation to simple goiter.

Beside the loss of weight and strength, the most alarming feature is the rapid heart, which may run as high as 140 to 160 to the minute. This extremely rapid action, if not relieved, in time tires out and exhausts the heart.

In the bellef that the disease was due primarily to a diseased thyroid, the favorite treatment in the past has been surgical removal of a part of dition and in the hands of the most skillful surgeon, the number of recoveries following operation is small. Sajous puts the number of recoveries four years after the operation as low as 18 per cent, or less than one out of five cases operated on.

The non-surgical treatment consists of rest, diet, carefully regulated exercise, the use of X-rays and of iodine and a few carefully administered drugs. Iodine, in large doses, la in most cases dangerous. Given in small doses and carefully watched by a competent physician, it may be of benefit

Rest and diet are most important. Tranquility of body and mind is more Important than actual physical inactivity. The patient must be made contented, and as Crile says, "must hibernate like a bear in winter" so that the brain, the heart, the nerves, the whole body as well as the muscles

The diet must be plentiful to make up for the lost weight, but meat of all kinds, as well as tea, coffee, alcohol and tobacco must be given up. (@, 1924, Western Newspaper Union.)
