SCHOOL NOTES.
ATHLETICS.

The Sonora eleven is showing up fairly well under the strenuous conditions. All are working hard to get in shape for the first game of the season, to be played here with Manser, Saturday 25.

Mr. Bryan, our coach, hails from Big Springs, Texas. Last year he put out a winning team there and we hope he can do as much for Sonora. Although we are inexperienced this year, we feel sure that if we work hard we can have some success.

So far there has been little or no equipment bought. There are several suits in good shape and others that are only slightly damaged. There were two balls ordered but were lost somewhere; so two more had to be sent for.

The change in the playing rules for the season did not in any way affect the fundamentals of the game or the style of play. A penalty of five yards (in addition to the loss of a down) is now imposed in each instance where a team makes more than one incomplete forward pass during the same series of four downs. A team which has scored a safety will now put the ball in play by a kick from its own 20 yard line. The definition of "crawling" has been clarified and the rule against "piling up" has been strengthened so that there can be no possible excuse for further violations of either of those rules. Players on the defense are now prohibited from striking an opponent in the face with the heel, back, or side of the hand.

Last year our opening game was with Ballinger. They came here with a good team but went down to defeat. Our next game was with Rock Springs. Again the Sonora eleven came out victorious. In the games that followed Sonora came home with the "spoils of war." Our last game of the season was with Lampassas. There the little eleven went down to defeat of 45 to 0. Although we had a good team we were no match for Lampassas.
