But if he tears a muscle he generally says, "It's nothing but a sprain," never goes near a doctor, keeps on working and so never gives the torn muscle a chance to heal. 

Movement of Continents

The Companion has spoken once or twice of a curious geographical theory, that the continents are not perfectly stable portions of the earth's crust, but float, as it were, on the heavier but somewhat plastic materials below. It is now announced that the scientific bodies of some twenty countries are to cooperate in a series of delicate observations to determine whether or not there is a secular drift of the continents in one direction or another. This fall exact observations of longitude will be taken at a number of widely separated stations. These will be repeated in 1931 and every five years thereafter, and it is expected that, if there is any movement whatever, it can be detected by the minute changes in the position of these stations with reference to the stars .-- Youth's Companion.

## Italian Silk Federation

With a view to adopting a policy of concerted action during the present critical period, the various manufacturers and producers, organizations and associations, engaged in the various branches of the Italian silk industry have recently formed the Federazione Serica Italiana, with headquarters at Milan. A European silk congress will be held in the spring of 1927 at Milan, and during that year a national silk exposition will be held at Como.

## KEEPING WELL

DISEASES OF THE MOUTH DR. FREDERICK R. GREEN Editor of "HEALTH"

In the mouth are the tonsils, often the center of an infection which may polson the whole body and cause such W'B Adams was in from his diseases as rheumatism, inflammation of any of the joints, diseases of the heart, arteries or kidneys.

The mucous membrane covering the lips and tongue and lining the mouth cavity is, on account of its delicate nature, especially subject to irrifatton. Constant and long continued irritation is probably one of the exciting causes of cancer.

The lips are subject to several kinds of irritation. Clgarette burns often Mr and Mrs Jim Buchannan cause sore spots. Smokers of pipes, tender spots may later lead to cracks in the lips which may be the starting point of eancer.

The tongue, in smokers who have sharp or broken teeth, may develop chronic sore spots on which cancer is apt to develop. A long sharp point on a tooth may cause a chronic irritation cancer may develop. The danger is greatly increased if the teeth are dirty and uncared for.

These are all causes which can easily be avoided or removed, if chronic sores have once developed. While there is no positive proof that tobacco will cause cancer, the habitpal smoker or chewer of tobacco is more apt to develop chronic points of irritation on the lips, tongue or check than the nonsmoker. To avoid this danger, every person who uses tobacco should take special pains to avoid burning the lips or tongue, to have the teeth kept in good order, to have decayed teeth filled or removed and to have any sharp or irritating points removed or smoothed down. New Theory Advanced for Lightning Cause

The latest accepted theory about the cause of lightning is based on experiments conducted in India by Dr. George C. Simpson.

Simpson's explanation starts with the fact, previously determined by laboratory experiments, that when drops of water are broken up there is a separation of negative and posicurs on a large scale in thunderstorms, where the falling raindrops are broken before they reach the earth by the powerful uprushes of air that occur in such storms.

Positive electricity is carried aloft by the rising air and eventually gives a strong negative charge to the higher parts of the clouds. The two kinds of electricity have a tendency to reunite and neutralize each other, but they are kept from doing so by the air, which is a bad conductor. However, when the opposite charges are strong enough -Mentor Magazine.

Wireless Waves Can

Not Penetrate Room The only room in the world that is proof against wireless waves from the most powerful stations has just been completed at the national physical laboratory, Teddington,

England. It is to be used for carrying out important and delicate wireless experiments that would be spoilt if outside transmissions could find a way inside the room.

Hut the room is so completely closed to wireless waves as a vacuum is to air. The most expert wireless operator with the finest receiving set would not hear a sound from any station in that room.

The windows are covered with fine wire netting, which also runs under the floor and over the ceiling, so that the six sides of the netting make a box inside the room. When the door is closed it fastens with a triple lock, whilst the jambs of the door are of solid copper.
