TEXAS AND TEXANS

Politics in the Schools

In resigning from the presidency of the University of Texas President Walter Splawn gave a distinct rebuke to those who use the schools of the State, and especially the University, to further political ends. He stated that the uncertainty of tenure of position makes the presidency of the University an uncertain and, therefore, an undesirable position. President Splawn knows from experience

whereof he talks and has grown weary of playing politics even to further the interests of a great educational institution. Educators and schools should be left free to devote their time unhampered by political exigencies to the great work of education, and with the feeling that so long as they do their work well it will not be impeded by political considerations. Every educator in Texas of any real worth has suffered from politics, either State or local, as President Splawn has suffered.

Commendable Service

Junction is a small town so far as population counts, but large in the heart of its people. When the report of the Rock Springs tornado reached there its citizens got together and asked what was the most urgent need of the town. When told that it was the restoration of its water plant and that the cost would be \$6,000, Junction promptly told Rock Springs to have the plant rebuilt and it would pay the bill. Other towns have responded nobly, but none showed a quicker and more generous response than Junction, which has the true spirit of neighborliness—ready response in the time of need.

Thoughtful Assistance

It was not so much the magnitude of its help as the spirit of it that made the aid which Schreiner Institute at Kerrville rendered Rock Springs a notable gift. Just after the disaster it was announced that the school would have to be suspended, thus preventing the senior class from graduating. Schreiner Institute promptly offered to take care of the boys and girls to that school, board and instruct them free of charge the rest of the school year and give certificates of high school graduation

to all who might deserve it. Schreiner Institute is a boy's boarding school and for that reason the offer had to be restricted to boys.

Denton Gets Hotel

Those who visit Denton—and Denton being a great school center, they are legion—have for a long time felt the need of a modern hotel there. Denton people long ago saw the need, but waited for "George to do it." Finally, as that figurative and dependable town builder failed to respond to duty, the citizens raised a bonus of \$200,000 and gave it to the owner of the leading hotel to be used in a new building. Now Denton is realizing the completion of a fine four story hotel building of 90 rooms, with all conveniences and most of the luxuries of modern hotels. The moral is that the town that helps itself gets helped, and in more ways than one Denton has helped itself in this enterprise.

Speaking of Hotels

Texas is going through an era of hotel building such as was never known before in the State. It means that people are going about in all parts of the State and that they have money to spend for their comfort. If one town doesn't provide the right kind of hotel facilities, it is easy to drive over good roads to the nearest place that does. Every week—almost every day—there are reports of new hotel under construction. Laredo has splendid hotels, but is going to build another to cost \$500,000. Harlingen has contracted for another hotel to cost \$200,000. La Feria has ordered plans for a \$125,000 hotel. You can come to Texas now and be assured of comfortable hotels in almost

any progressive place. The "wagon yard" age has passed.

Can You Believe It?

San Benito, Brownsville and Olmito—down in the Valley—had shipped 11,540 cars of potatoes this season up to April 23, and the new spuds are still going out of the Valley at the rate of about 100 cars a day. It is a bad potato season, too, the potatoes being small on account of insufficient rain. Robstown has shipped more than 1,000 cars of other vegetables. The North is still shivering. Minnesota, which seems to delight in calumniating Texas, should take notice.

County Flower Show

San Patricio county has been having a county-wide flower show in which towns and communities from all over the county contested and furnished entertainment programs, thus fostering a wonderful intercommunity spirit. Sinton, Taft, Aransas Pass, Udem, Mathis, Elroy and other communities were represented. This is an idea that might well be developed in every county. The way to destroy ugliness is to replace it with beauty. A love of the beautiful in nature creates a love of the beautiful in character.

Yoakum Tomatoes.

According to word sent out by Editor Ritcher of the Yoakum Herald, Yoakum has shipped its first car of tomatoes, sending them to Toronto, Canada, and it is estimated that 100 more car loads will go to other parts of the country. There are 500 acres of tomatoes in the Yoakum territory, and the growers have a co-operative marketing association. Each tomato is wrapped in a lithographed wrapper bearing a small map of that part of Texas and briefly stating something about its products. Can you beat this for favorable publicity?

Burnet County Graphite

A \$360,000 graphite mill is to be built to handle the graphite production of Burnet county. Capitalists do not invest that sum on uncertainties, which means that the graphite industry there is going to be thoroughly developed, which in turn means that other industries will certainly follow. One good enterprise in a community brings another, just as one good deed performed paves the way for other good actions.

Seventy-five Bands

Seventy-five bands are to take part in the musical contest at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce meeting at Wichita Falls, May 15 and 16 and about 50 glee clubs will sing in contest, which goes to show that in Texas the arts are making themselves felt in commerce and are coming to be regarded as essential to life and to business.

H. J. R. No. 25. Posing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article VIII by the insertion of Section 1-a therein, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the separation of the objects of taxation for State purposes and for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the State and Counties, and authorizing the an ad valorem tax or other form of Legislature to provide for the levy of tax for State purposes only, and for local purposes only; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the classification of objects of taxation and providing the rates shall be equal on the same class of property, and fixing limitations upon taxation. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein Section 1-a as follows:

Section 1-a. The Legislature may separate the objects of taxation for State purposes from the objects of taxation for the support of the counties, districts and political subdivisions of the State and counties; and may provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax, or other form of tax, on certain classes of taxable property, or other objects, for State purposes only (including school purposes); or upon certain classes of property, or other objects, for county or local purposes only (including school purposes). In no event shall the rate of such taxes exceed the sum of the limits of such taxes fixed by this Constitution for State, county and other local purposes. The Legislature may provide for the classification of objects of taxation. Taxation shall be equal and uniform.

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-A, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

"Against the amendment to Article 8, inserting Section 1-A, providing for changing the taxation system so that the State may derive its income, in whole or in part, from other sources than the ad valorem tax."

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the neces-

sary proclamation ordering an election to determine whether or not the proposed constitutional amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. And the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election. Approved March 11, 1927. (A Correct Copy.)

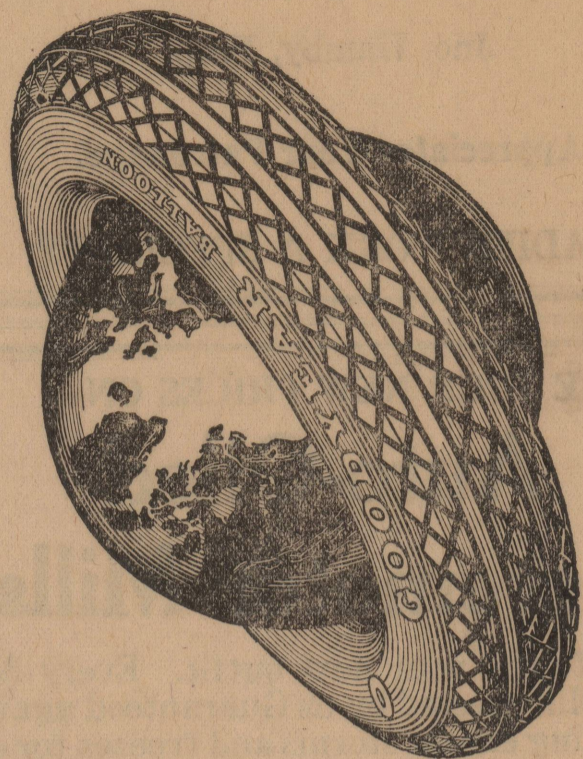

HOME MAKERS CLUB

The very interesting demonstration enjoyed by the Home Makers club on April 27 was lamp shades. A very pretty shade was made of ordinary wrapping paper unglazed. This paper was crumpled and dyed in rose rit (cold) allowed to dry and dipped in blue rit. After drying this time the paper was brushed with hot paraffin, and after the paraffin was dry it was brushed with hot paraffin. After the paraffin dried it was put between blotters and pressed with a very hot iron. Rose sealing wax was next dissolved in alcohol and brushed over the paper. When this was dry the shade was made by gluing to circles of cardboard painted black. These circles were six inches in diameter and the paper was about thirteen inches long. This made a lantern shaped shade, which was finished at the bottom with a tassel made of many colors of beads. The shade was very pretty, and it imparted a beautiful rose glow to the light coming thru the shade.

H. J. R. No. 24. Proposing an amendment of Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows: Section 2 (of Article V) The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices

Justice and eight Associate Justices five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five Judges shall be necessary to the decision of a case. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election or appointment a citizen of the United States and of this State, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years and shall have been a licensed lawyer for seven years and, during that time, shall have been a practicing lawyer or Judge of a court of record, or such practicing lawyer and Judge together. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State, at a general election, and shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualify, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their terms of office until their successors are elected and qualify. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate. Section 3 (of Article V): The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only, except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several courts of civil appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a statute of the State is held void, and to questions of law arising in such other cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law; provided, that the Legislature may authorize direct appeals from the County and District Courts in any case where a statute of the State has been declared void. The Supreme Court and the Judges thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus as may be prescribed by law; and, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, the said Court and the Judges thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari, and such other writs as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified except as against the Governor of the State. The Supreme Court shall also have power, upon affidavit or otherwise, as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times, and shall sit at the State Capital for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court. The present statutes defining the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court not in conflict herewith shall continue in effect until repealed or altered by the Legislature. The Supreme Court shall appoint a Clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years, and shall be subject to removal by said Court for good cause entered on the minutes of said Court, and who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide. Section 4 (of Article V): The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of three Judges, provided that the Legislature may increase the number to five, and a majority of the Judges shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of a majority of the Judges shall be necessary to the decision of any case. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Judges of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State, at a general election, and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their terms of office under the present Constitution and laws: Section 5 (of Article V): The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction co-extensive with the limits of the State in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, and the Legislature may confer original jurisdiction upon it to issue writs of mandamus, procedendo and certiorari in criminal cases. The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus and, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have the power, upon affidavit or otherwise, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. Said Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capital for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by it. Said Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and he shall hold his office for four years, unless sooner removed by the Court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said Court, and said Clerk shall receive such compensation as may be prescribed by law. Section 6 (of Article V): The Legislature shall, from time to time, divide the State into such number of Supreme Judicial Districts as to it may seem necessary, not exceeding twelve at any one time, and shall have the power to re-district the State at any time, and shall establish a Court of Civil Appeals in each of said Districts, which Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and not less than two Associate Justices as the Legislature may provide, who shall have the qualifications as herein prescribed for Justices of the Supreme Court, provided that the aggregate number of Judges of all of the Courts of Civil Appeals shall never at one time exceed thirty-six. Each of the existing Courts of Civil Appeals shall continue until otherwise provided by law. The Courts of Civil Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction co-extensive with the limits of their respective districts, which shall extend to all civil cases of which the District Courts or County Courts have original or appellate jurisdiction, under such restrictions and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, that the decision of said Courts shall be conclusive on all questions of fact brought before them on appeal or error. Said Courts of Civil Appeals shall hold their sessions at such places as may be designated by the Legislature and at such times as may be prescribed by law. Said Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of their respective Districts, at a general election for a term of six years, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. Said Courts shall have such other jurisdiction, original and appellate, as may be prescribed by law. Each Court of Civil Appeals shall appoint a Clerk in the same manner as the Clerk of the Supreme Court, which Clerk shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by law. The Judges of the Courts of Civil Appeals who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment. Section 7 (of Article V): The State shall be divided into as many Judicial Districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a general election, a Judge who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall have been a licensed lawyer for four years next preceding his election, and during that time shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court of record or such practicing lawyer and Judge together, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his District during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and shall receive for his services such compensation as may be prescribed by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his court at the County seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year, in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power, by general or special laws, to authorize the holding of special terms of the court or the holding of more than two terms in any County for the dispatch of business. The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent or is, from any cause, disabled or disqualified from presiding. The Supreme Court or the Chief Justice thereof may assign any District Judge to any District in the State other than that for which he was elected, with all the powers of a resident District Judge of the District to which he is assigned, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, or by the Supreme Court in the absence of such regulations enacted by the Legislature. The District Judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment. Sec. 2: Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off the ballot with pen or pencil the following words printed thereon: "For the amendment to the State Constitution amending Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article V of the Con-

stitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system;" and each voter favoring said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner, the following words printed thereon: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution amending Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 of Article V of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing a more efficient judicial system." If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas. Sec. 3: The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution and the Constitution and laws of this State; and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and

counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law. Sec. 4: The sum of twelve thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expenses of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto Section 60, Article 16 so as to provide that the Legislature may fix the compensation of certain county officers by salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other prerequisites; providing for an election and making appropriation to pay expenses.
Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 60, Article 16, to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 60. The Legislature may provide compensations for certain district and county officers, to-wit:

The District Attorney, County Judge, County Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, District Clerk, County Tax Assessor and County Tax Collector, by prescribing their duties, and fixing salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and other prerequisites as now provided by the Constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and prerequisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," and Against amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas giving the Legislature power to provide compensation for the District Attorney and county officers through salaries in lieu of fees, commissions and prerequisites as now prescribed by the Constitution," leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. There is hereby appropriated out of any money on hand in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or as much thereof as may be necessary to defray the expenses of this election, including the expense of printing notices and advertisements.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

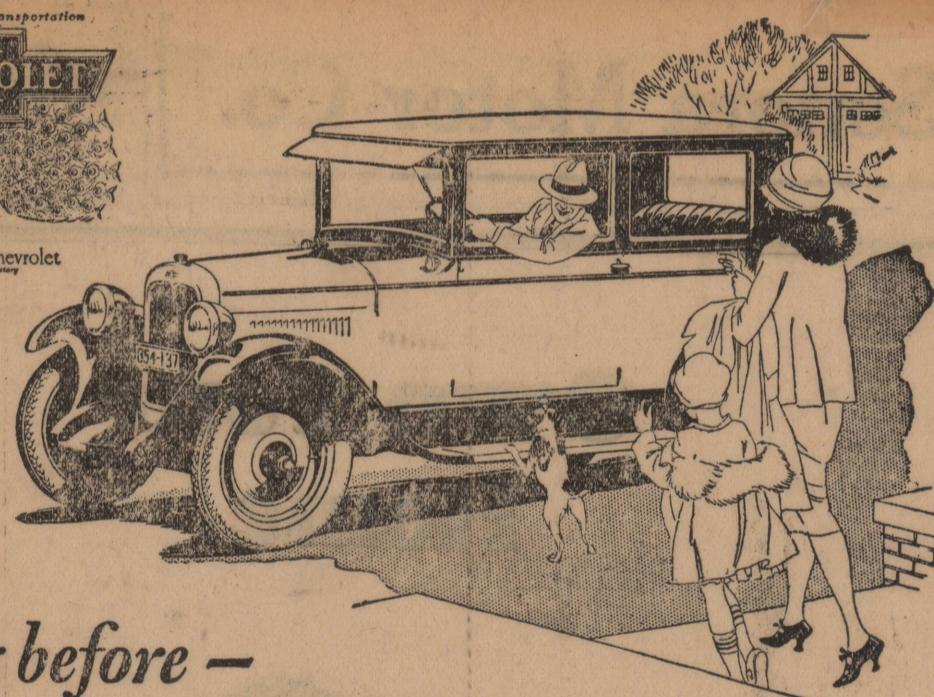
Constable, R. L. Rasmussen, who had been stationed in a tankhouse in the rear of Failla's house, was instantly killed when Failla made a back door sortie.

A JOINT RESOLUTION
S. J. R. No. 33.
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1927, and not sooner.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by inserting therein a new section to be numbered Section 30a, which shall read as follows:
Section 30a. All provisions of the present Constitution of Texas fixing or limiting the amount or salary of

compensation of officers and members of the Legislature are hereby repealed and hereafter said officers and members of the Legislature shall receive such salary or compensation and expenses as now provided until otherwise provided by law. The salary of the Governor shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) per year, and no more payable monthly and he shall have the occupancy and use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

The salary or compensation of any member of the Legislature shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year, and actual traveling expenses from the place of residence to the capitol and returning for each session of the Legislature, as shall hereafter be provided by law; and provided that no change of salary or compensation from that now provided by the Constitution shall become effective until the first day of January following the first general election held after adoption of this amendment.

Sec. 2 Said proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the electors of this state qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Monday in August, A. D. 1927, at which each voter opposing said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed thereon: "For the amendment to the Constitution from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1927, and not sooner;" and each vote favoring said amendment shall scratch off of the ballot in the same manner, the following words printed thereon: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas removing from the Constitution all limitations as to the amount of compensation of officers, the compensation and expenses of said officers to be as provided by law, and fixing the compensation of the Governor, and providing that said amendment shall be effective on and after January 1, 1927, and not sooner."

If it shall appear from a return of said election that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of said amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas:

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this resolution and the Constitution and laws of this State and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the required vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Sec. 4. The sum of five thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for publication of the proclamation calling said election and any expenses of the State in submitting said amendment and holding said election.


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
