SAN ANGELO VOTES \$1,000,000 BONDS

Bond issues totalling more than a million dollars have been voted by San Angelo and Tom Green county for a five year period of development and expansion, keeping in step with the growth of West Texas.

A \$250,000 city hall audtori m is included in the bond issues. It will have a seating capacity arrangement to provide for 1500 persons, \$100,000 being available this year and the remaining \$150,000 ready for use the

second year. The best entertainments possible will be brought to West Texas and shown in this auditorium, including musical concerts, the appearance of outstanding speakers and artists, and other attractions of various kinds. With such a meeting place, West Texas will be able to house attractions which have not been possible before. San Angelo is matching the county paving program, so that not only will West Texas people have good roads on which to get to San Angelo, but will have well-constructed streets to drive over when they reach the city. Of the \$355,000 for paving, \$65,000 will be made available for the city's one-fourth paving share the first year. The project provides for 250 blocks, or more than twenty mles of streets. Another measure included in the bonds recently voted is for the construction of a \$294,000 courthouse to take the place of the old structure which is not meeting present needs



Fires Menace Alaskan Reindeer Industry

Forest and range fires are a particular menace to the development of the future reindeer industry in Alaska, according to Lawrence J. Palmer, of the Biological Survey, United States Department of Agriculture, who has been in charge of the reindeer-grazing investigations in Alaska for the survey for the past seven years.

Fires are declared to constitute one of the greatest sources of injury to forage and forest production in Alaska and cause large losses in fur and game. Tundra and forest fires in the interior are common, and large burned over range areas are frequently found The fires are often set by prospectors to clear off the vegetation and expose underlying ground and rock, and many are caused by carelessness in leaving camp fires or by tossing away lighted matches or cigarettes.

In the northern and northwestern part of the Territory are vast areas of grazing land of luxuriant forage especially suited to the raising of reindeer. A part of this area is now so used, the present herds totalling approximately 400,000 head. Expan sion of the industry in the future will greatly increase this number Such an increase, however, it is declared, is dependent upon the continued maintenance of the present forage crop. Lichens are especially important to the reindeer, as compristhe damage to lichen range from fire ing the principal winter forage, and is particularly serious. The surface virgin soil of Alaska is mainly covered with a layer of vegetable matter called raw rumpus, which the fires completely destroy. The effect of fires is evident for a long period of years. Even under favorable conditions it may take 24 or more years necessary for maintenace of the rein for a renewal of the lichen crop as deer herds.



Detroit, Mich., June 23 .- Indications that Chevrolet production will reach, if not pass, the million mark this year were seen here today, following the announcement by the Chevrolet Motor Company that production for the first five months totaled 494,953 units. This is a sixty per cent increase over the corresponding period of last year, and testifies to the phenomenal demand that has kept Chevrolet factories constantly at caracity since early in the year.

Since January, Chevrolet has bowled over production records each month, reaching a new all-time monthly mark in May with an output of 115,623 units as compared with the record 74,617 units set in May last


