Don't Intend to Buy Much Feed for Stock

"This is the lightest stocked year I remember in Sutton county," said Roy Hudspeth Monday morning when interviewed with respect to the amount of feed he would have to bring this year, "and we do not contemplate buying any feed whatsoever for cattle, sheep or goats." Mr. Hudspeth was upheld in this contention by W. A. Miers, another big rancher here in Sutton county.

Mr. Miers and Mr. Hudspeth further stated that the lack of rainfall in Sutton county so far is no reason for anyone to become alarmed, in their opinion, as this is by no means a new thing, but that the periodical rains of the Fall and light snow falls of the winter would provide ample grazing for sheep and goats in Sutton county.

These two ranchers, however, are more optimistic than the balance some of whom believe that it will be necessary to buy considerable amounts of feed. But that the feed that will have to be bought will not equate any very great quantity seems to be the consensus of opinion among the ranchers.

Mr. Hudspeth, it seems, as well as Mr. Miers, is the owner of some exceptional sheep, goats and livestock. Mr. Miers states that as far as he knows, he never owned a sheep that knew how to eat this "prepared breakfast food," and certainly never knew of anyone who had to resort to feeding goats. His sheep are the variety that take a loving interest in their owner, and make themselves at home where they are placed, live within their incomes, and don't have to be pampered and flattered into eating these "post toasties," and such. And as for the goats, Mr. Miers and Mr. Hudspeth both have the kind that you read about, that eat with rare gusto anything from a fossiliferous tin can to the choice, tender luscious winter weeds which make the feed question in Sutton county just a topic of conversation and not a problem.

The reporter tried to keep this interview of Mr. Miers and Mr. Hudspeth on the subject of sheep, goats and cattle, but somehow, perhaps due to the cool breeze with which we were favored Monday morning, we drifted into other channels, politics and things

Then the question of oil came up, and Mr. Miers and Mr. Hudspeth were again as one in denouncing the oil boom. "What will we do for a living" they asked "if some company finds oil on our land?" They cited the case of Ira G. Yates, who had his perfectly good Pecos County ranch spoiled by the finding of oil. Of course it has made him a multi-millionaire, who has to do something besides air coupons?

To prove their contention, they pointed out the fact that Mr. Yates recently laid down \$230,000 in cash for a ranch down in the San Saba country. And, after all, aren't they right? A man who has nothing to do is, above all other earthly creatures, cursed. Should oil be found on their land, wouldn't they both be out of a job, or at best, have to relinquish the best sheep and goat country in the wide, wide world to the filling station men, and buy other ranches elsewhere to carry on the most interesting work demanding business in the world?

Yes, the conversation drifted away from feed. They seemed to think a lot of this Mr. Coolidge, and it does us good to hear some one speak a good word for him, after all this paning he has gotten since he dealt the death blow to his supporters with his short, cryptical, typical New England terseness "I do not choose to run for President in 1928."

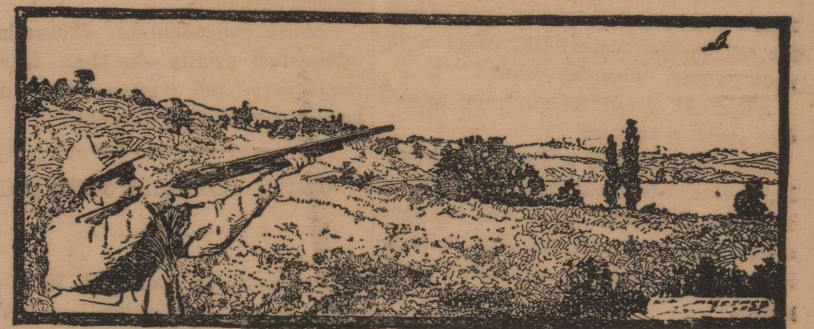

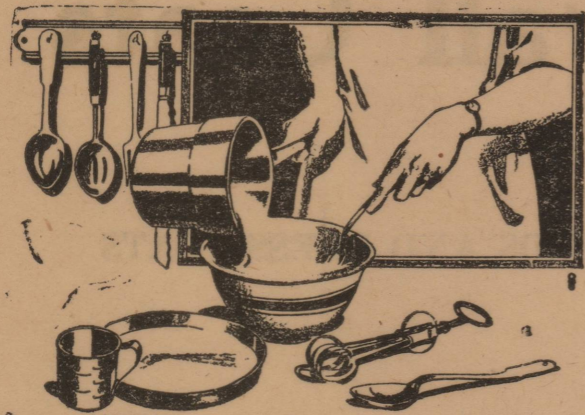

MASONRY DEFENDED AGAINST ACCUSATIONS

London, Eng.—Those prejudiced against Freemasonry have recently renewed, or continued their attempts to impede its progress by accusations that it was in itself a religion and harmful to the Christian Faith. Bishop Frodsham, Vicar of Halifax, at services held in commemoration of the laying of the foundation-stone of the Holy Trinity Church at Darwen in 1827, defended the Fraternity against such accusations. He stated that from his experiences as a Mason, membership in the Craft should make one more devoted to his own respective form of religion, more devout, more truly moral. "Indeed, I believe from my heart that no greater disaster could fall upon Freemasonry," he said, "than it should be separated from the Christian Faith."

Rev. J. Kirk Pike, Vicar of St. Barnabus' and Post Provincial A. G. Chaplain, in respect to his membership in Masonry, said, "I esteem it a great privilege—that I have been able to enter into real brotherly association with members and ministers of Churches other than my own. I have received the right hand of fellowship from Presbyterian, Congregationalists, Baptists, Jews, Swedenborgians, Unitarians, and a few Methodists whom I should never have had the joy of meeting if a Masonic lodge had not afforded the opportunity."

"If Freemasonry professed to be a religion, or a religious sect," he said further, "its theological deficiencies would bar from membership the great majority of its adherents. But that is not its profession. To be sure you may meet with ill-instructed Masons who will say, 'Masonry is my religion,' and think themselves rather fine fellows. But answer that any Masonic chaplain, or I think I may say any official Mason of any rank, would make to them, would be:

"Then you do not understand Masonry. Masonry is not a religion and does not profess to be. It is a social and philanthropic brotherhood; but it says to its members, 'You must at least believe in God and your responsibility to Him.'"

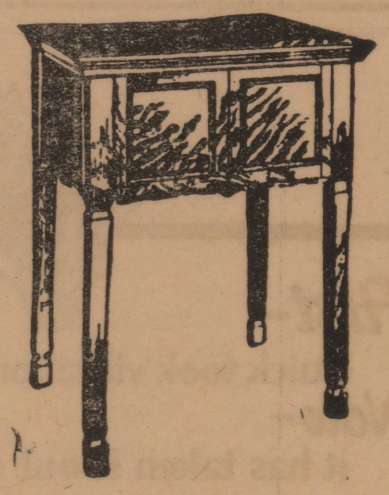

Says Ford Ranch in Sutton Only Rumor

Reports that Henry Ford has closed a deal for the purchase of a large Southwest Texas ranch were discounted here this week by B. M. Halbert. Mr. Halbert received a letter from Mr. Ford making inquiries about the conditions under which Angora goats are raised, but stated that similar letters were addressed to other ranchers in West Texas. It is Mr. Halbert's belief, however, that eventually Mr. Ford will purchase such a ranch for the purpose of raising Angora goats to supply the mohair for the manufacture of upholstery for his cars, as this is practically the only commodity used in the Ford plant that the automobile king does not either manufacture or produce for himself. Coal mines, iron mines, ocean and lake transportation facilities, rubber plantations, timber lands, and every material used in the huge plants of the Ford Motor Company are owned by Mr. Ford, and it has long been predicted that his entrance into the goat ranching business was inevitable. Such reports as these strengthen the belief that the new cars about to be brought out by Mr. Ford will meet the expectations of the public. It is now well known that Ford and General Motors will stage a gigantic struggle for the supremacy in the low-priced small car field, and control of raw materials will greatly facilitate the manufacturer.

Benefit of a Sewer System

Tax payers of Sonora will, during the coming two weeks receive through the mails, literature regarding the benefits of sewer systems.

These pamphlets are reprinted from the Journal of Health and by noted sanitarians. The date secured from State Board of Health. They will be mailed out at the expense of the Associated Manufacturers of Sewer Pipe. There will also be a booklet prepared by the City Engineers. This booklet will contain a map of the City of Sonora and a description of the sewer system. We suggest that you save your copy as there will be only one mailing in Sonora.

The people of this city have definitely shown a desire to make this a live

able town; to do away with insanitary alley castles which are best for fly breeding and disease spreading places, is the next important step to take.

As bonds are the legal and most economical means of securing the funds for building sewers, the bond election has been called. It is now "up to" the people to see that this election is carried as nearly unanimously as possible.

Hundreds of Texas towns are enjoying the use and benefits of sewers which are in large measure, or entirely paying their cost from a monthly charge for the use of the sewers.

Some recent installations are Rail's, Wylie, Marfa, Merkel, Winters, Anson, Rosebud, Flatonia, Giddings, and many other places.

Sonora must be listed in this progressive group.

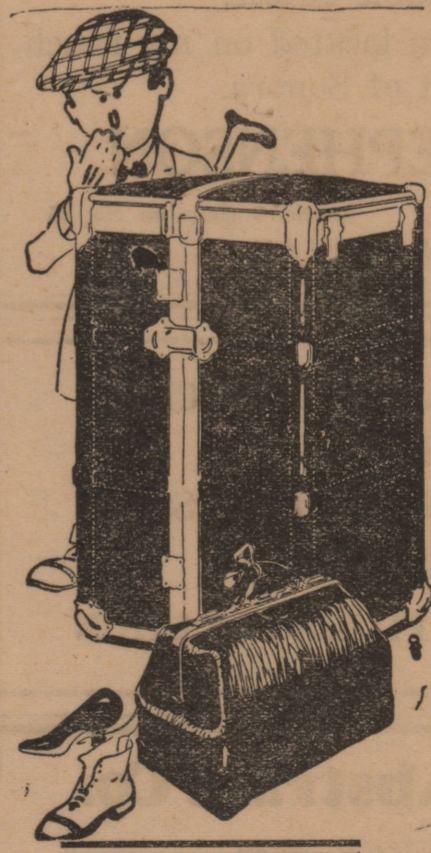

91,458 Chevrolets Produced in August

Shattering all previous records for the manufacture of gear shift cars for the eight consecutive month this year, the Chevrolet Motor Company in August completed 91,456 units for its greatest August in history, according to figures released today by H. J. Klinger, general sales manager for the company.

This new record brings the total output during the first eight months of this year to 786,336 as against 513,507 units during the same period last year and 732,147 units during the entire year of 1926. The 1926 output was passed this year on August 12.

"Shall the City Commission of the City of Sonora, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Sonora, Texas, in the sum of Forty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000.00) payable serially within any given number of years not to exceed forty years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of not to exceed six per cent (6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy taxes sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at maturity, said bonds being issued for the purpose of the construction of Sewers, within and for said City, as authorized by the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Statutes, 1925?"

The said election shall be held at Gilmore Hardware Co. Furniture Department in the City of Sonora, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to wit: Geo. J. Trainer, Sr., Mrs. R. A. Halbert, Mrs. Roy E. Aldwell, H. V. Stokes and Cecil Elliott, and the said Geo. J. Trainer, Sr. shall be presiding judge, and the said Mrs. R. A. Halbert and Mrs. Roy E. Aldwell shall be judges, and the said H. V. Stokes and Cecil Elliott shall be clerks at said election.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property taxpayers shall be allowed to vote.

All voters desiring to support the proposition shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER BONDS."

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF SEWER BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State governing General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Sonora, and attested by the City Secretary of said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted at the Gilmore Hardware Co., Furniture Department, (the place designated for holding said election) and at two other public places in the City of Sonora all of said notices to be posted for at least thirty (30) full days prior to the date of election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in the Devil's River News, a newspaper of general circulation, published in said City, and which notice shall be published once each week for five consecutive weeks the date of the first publication to be not less than thirty (30) full days prior to the date of election.

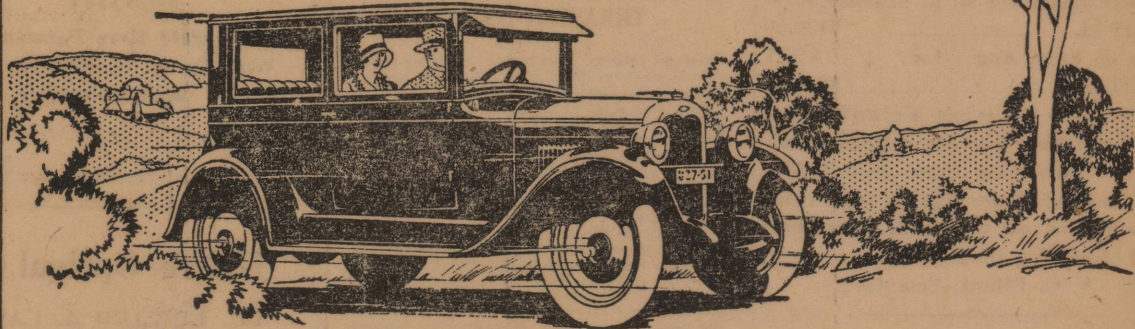

Texas Game Laws
*** * * * ***
 The following is of interest to local nimrods:
 The dove season in the north zone is September and October, in the south zone, November and December with a limit of 15 per day or 45 of a week of seven consecutive days. Open season on ducks and geese in north zone is October 16 to January 31, both days inclusive, limit 25 a day or 50 in a week of seven days on ducks, and on geese four a day or 12 a week. Season for other game not affected by the zone laws is: Quail, December 1 to January 16th, both days inclusive, limit 12 a day or 36 a week. Prairie chicken, September 1 to 10th both days inclusive, 5 a day or 10 for the season. Deer and turkey seasons are November 16th to December 31, both days inclusive, with two bucks and three gobblers as the limit. White wing dove season is July, August and September, limit 15 a day and 45 a week.
1927-28 Game Laws.
 It is unlawful to kill or possess at any time antelope, mountain sheep, woodcock, wood duck, egret or other plume bird, non-game water fowl song bird, insectivorous bird, pheasant, turkey hen, or doe deer.
 It is unlawful to hunt from a motor boat, sail boat, airplane, automobile, or boat under tow; and to hunt at night with any kind of light or lantern.
 It is unlawful to buy or sell (or barter) any game bird or animal.
 It is unlawful to kill at any time in any number English sparrows, rice birds, and blackbirds, buzzards, owls, crows, hawks, woodpeckers, and r-b-bits.
 Open season on wild game, not conflicting with either state or federal laws:
 North Zone—North and west of a line beginning on the Rio Grande west of Del Rio, thence east to Del Rio, thence east along the center of the main line of the Southern Pacific railroad to intersection of the I. G. N. railroad near San Antonio, thence along the I. G. N. railroad to Austin thence to H. T. C. railroad east to Brenham to a point where railroad crosses Brazos river, thence north following Brazos River, to railroad, then following G. C. & S. F. railroad in an easterly direction to a point at railroad crosses the H. E. & W. T. near Cleveland where the G. C. S. F. railroad, north easterly to the Louisiana line.
 South zone, south and east constitutes south zone.
 Wild bear, north and south zones November 16 to December 31.
 Buck deer, north and south zones, November 16 to December 31.
 Mourning doves, north zone, September and October; south zone, November and December.
 White-wing doves, both north and south zones, July, August and September.
 Wild ducks of all kinds (except wood ducks) geese, brant, snipe, gallinules and mudhens, north zone, October 16 to January 31; south zone, November 1 to January 31.
 Prairie chickens, both north and south zones, September 1 to September 10. Closed in counties of Collingsworth, Donley, Wheeler and Gray until September 1, 1929.
 Quail and Mexican pheasants, both north and south zones, December 1 to January 16.
 Wild rail (other than coot- and gallinules), wild black-bellied plover and golden-wing plover and yellow legs

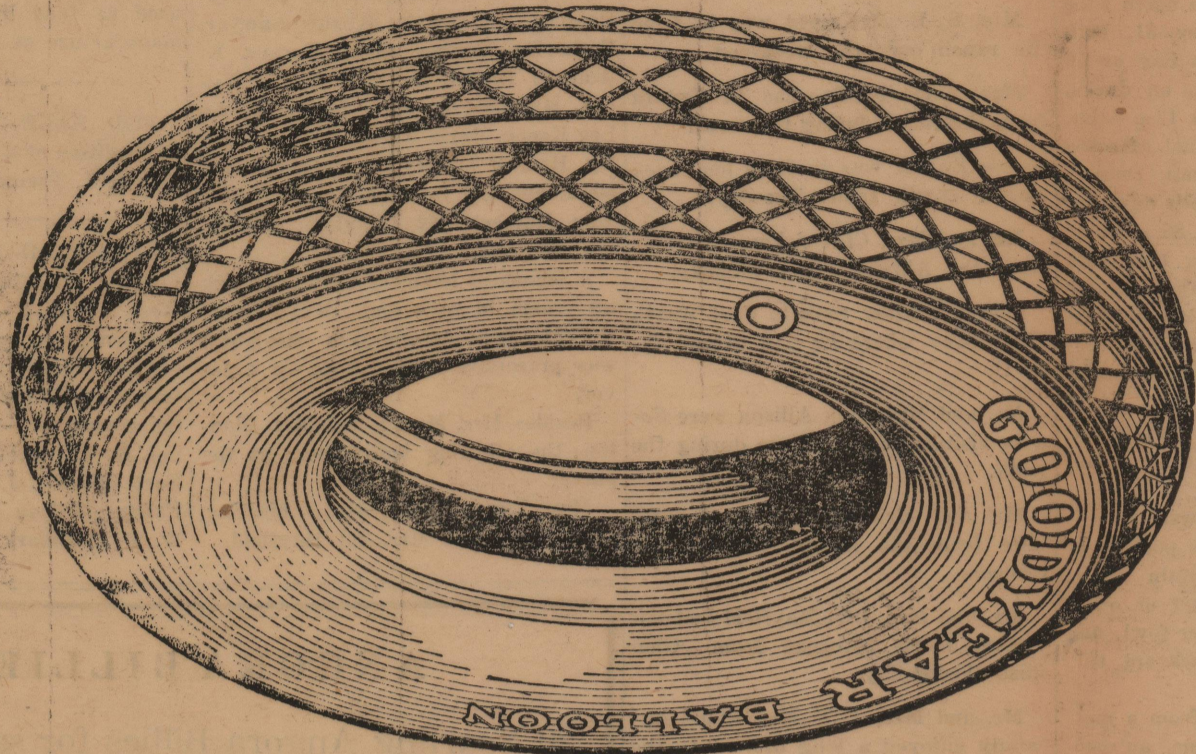

West Texas News Notes

SILVERTON—Agricultural students in the Silverton High School are making practical application of the vocational work offered them by constructing a frame building to the school system which will be used as home for the newly added music department.

OLTON—Olton's new high school auditorium-gymnasium has been finished and the school system is now prepared to take care of its student body with one of the best modern and well-equipped structures of this territory.

BANGS—Awning lights are being placed in the business district of this town. This construction work is being done by the local office of the Texas Power & Light Company.

ALPINE—All previous building records have already been shattered here this year, with the amount passing the quarter-million mark. One of the latest developments is construction of a \$100,000 addition to the Holland Hotel.

ARCHER CITY—The Archer City Wolf Association met recently and conducted a wild chase which netted at its close an animal of small broad stripe instead of the expected best. The organization has proved effective in ridding the section of wolves in hunts held at various times.

ARLINGTON—A mammoth lake is to be constructed at a point about 3 1-2 miles north of town, and will cover more than twenty acres. The body of the lake will extend some three miles above the dam, with numerous necks and coves. The place will be stocked with duck and fish.

STERLING CITY—the county capillary tractor is being used as a stump puller in clearing the Sterling City and Del Rio road on Sterling Creek of timber. The road will be opened for travel as soon as the felling operation just started here.

OLNEY—The old Townsite building, located on the corner of Third Street and Grand Avenue here, is being remodeled and will be converted into an up-to-date store and office building.

JUNCTION—The Wolf Club of Kimble County met recently and outlined plans for raising funds to start a predatory animal eradication program in this section. The commissioners' court is co-operating in the movement.

SWEETWATER—Goat and sheep raising on a large scale may begin in the Sweetwater country. A deal has just been consummated in which a Mertzon man has leased six sections of land near here on which he will run sheep and goats. The stockman announced that a number of sheepmen of southwest Texas are anxious to move into the Sweetwater country as it is very suited for their business.

ABILENE—Nearly one half of the record expansion made in the area served by telephones during the past year was made in the territory of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, especially in those sections in which oil play has developed.

RANGER—State and out-of-state visitors will be entertained here October 21 and 22 when Ranger is host at a Homecoming Oil Jubilee, celebrating the tenth anniversary of the discovery of oil in Eastland county. Many diversions and entertainments features are planned, in addition to informational and educational numbers.

The poison is being distributed at cost by the local chamber of Commerce.

PALO PINTO—Palo Pinto county has made an appropriation of \$3,500 to which the Federal Government and the State have added \$1,800 and three trappers will work after wolves in this section for twelve months. Movement is underway in many counties also to rid the State of predatory animals.
