In what proved to be a splendid practice game the Sonora High Bronchos steam roller rolled over the Menard five here Monday afternoon to the tune of 50 to 23. The game was slow and uninteresting until Coach Halcomb removed his entire first string and substituted his "midget" quintet.

A Hollmig, for the Bronchs was high point man with 20 counters. He was followed by K. E. Taylor who accounted for eight points. For the first string aggregation the passing of Striegler and A. Hollmig was the feature, while Williamson and Pete Taylor played a splendid floor game for the substitutes.

For Menard, Waters was the high point man with 8 points. A feature of the game was the battle at center between the Striegler brothers. Howard of Sonora had the edge over his brother from Menard.

Eugene Jackson of Southwestern University refereed the game.

Chevrolet Produces 3-Millionth Car

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 3. — Added impetus was given the swift pace set for 1928 by the Chevrolet Motor Company here today with the announcement by W. S. Knudsen, President and General Manager, that the four millionth Chevrolet unit rolled off the assembly lines of the Flint, Michigan, plant on January 11.

The record model — a 1928 coach — was built only 363 days after the three millionth car had been turned out at the same factory.

This brief interval between production of the two epoch making cars reveals the tremendous volume of the company the past year — when it was the world's largest automobile manufacturer and shows the rapidity with which the new cars are now being built to supply dealers in all parts of the world with an adequate number for prompt delivery.

Production for the year just ended exceeded the program of a million units by 1,800 cars and accelerated production this January over January a year ago, necessitated by the splendid reception recorded the new line, made possible the building of the four millionth car two days less than a year after the three millionth unit had been produced.

West Texas News

COLORADO—An unusually strong program of prominent speakers will take part at the West Central District convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce here February 29.

MIDLAND—Oil, cattle, cotton and potash are the quadruplets of the Midland family which make for prosperity in this section.

GRAHAM—Gain of gross receipts for December 1927, making a better showing than for the entire year.

COMANCHE—A series of four community club meetings was held here the week of January 17 by T. C. Richardson, field editor of the Farm and Ranch.

ARTESIA, N. M.—Aid in building a connected system of highways leading into Artesia was one of the chief works of the local chamber of commerce in 1927.

MERKEL—The 1928 district convention season of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will close here December. There will be an average of one district convention for each month, in 1928.

OLNEY—Location of a county agent here is one 1928 aim of the Olney Chamber of Commerce of which M. Gruvor is secretary.

SWEETWATER—Manager Sam H. Bothwell, formerly of Longview, first city manager of Sweetwater, will receive a salary of \$5,000.

ALMOGORDO, N. M.—Otero and Lincoln counties shipped 46,651 head of cattle in 1927.

FLUVANA—One hundred twenty cars of livestock, 12 cars of threshed grain (maize), three cars of maize heads, forty-five cars of cotton seed, and five cars of wheat were shipped from here in 1927.

CANADIAN—With \$1,500,000 or deposit in local banks, Canadian is one of the richest per capita places in the Panhandle.

CROSBYTON—The Crosbyton C. of Commerce is helping farmers in its territory to get their milch cows tested.

CISCO—Dairying is assuming an important place in agricultural life here under direction of the dairying committee of the chamber of commerce.

EDEN—A 12,000 egg capacity electric hatchery is now open here.

BALLINGER—The Big Three Produce Company of Abilene has opened a branch plant here, handling fresh fruits and vegetables.

SLATON—Slaton building and public improvements in 1927 reached \$730.

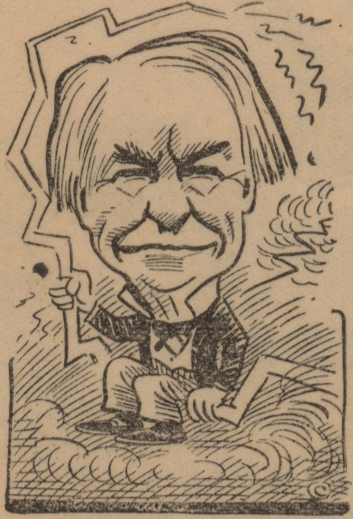

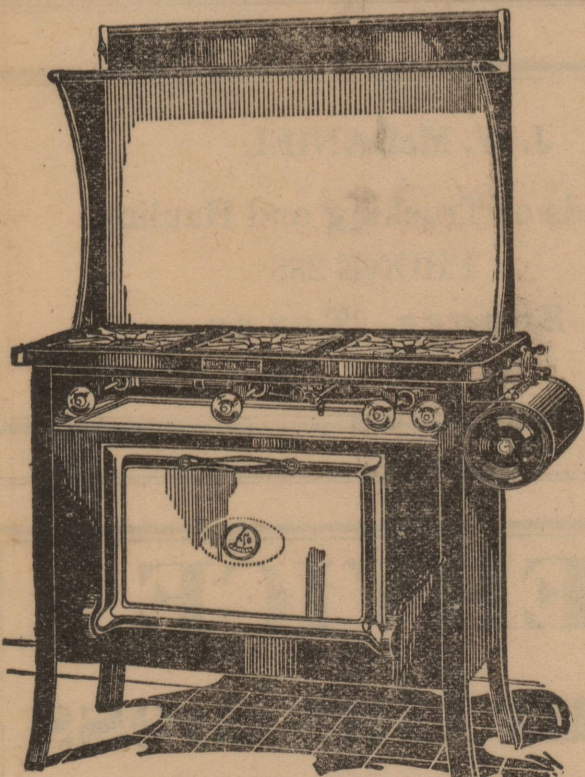

NEWS FROM THE U. S. CAPITOL

(News Washington Bureau)

WASHINGTON, D. C. Feb. 4.—In the general breakdown of party lines, the House last week overrode President Collidge's merchant marine policy of spending as little as necessary in repair to government-owned merchant vessels, pending their sale to private interests. By a vote of 212 to 119, the House disapproved this policy by authorizing the expenditure of \$13,400,000 on certain shipping board vessels, including two passenger liners now laid up, to equip them better for government operation.

The opposition of Representative C. B. Hudspeth of Texas was not recorded in the Roll Call, as Mr. Hudspeth was paired with Congressman Johnson of South Dakota.

Congressman Hudspeth extended to the House, in a well-timed and happy speech, which enlisted laughter and applause, an invitation extended to Congress to attend the national convention of the American National Livestock Association of El Paso last week. The invitation was signed by President Luke Bright. At the conclusion of his speech, Mr. Hudspeth presented to Speaker Longworth the "official badge of our great Association."

Three thousand or more women from the four corners of the Union are meeting here this week. They come from a dozen or more national associations and claim to represent 10,000,000 of their sisters. They are talking peace, discussing ways to prevent war, delving into foreign policies, hopes, aspirations and jealousies. This is the third year they have met here in open forum and they are making their impression on those who legislate for peace or war and those who carry out the nation's policies.

Sir Esme Howard, Britain's amiable ambassador, told American engineers that England wanted nothing so much as peace with the United States and intended to have it, "despite fiery generals, peppery admirals, and jingo journalists." Unfortunately, his 14-year old son had figured at the wheel of the dad's car, in a distressing automobile accident the day before, the victim being a school-girl, who probably will recover.

The Democratic brand of peace was dispensed at the Jackson Day love feast and in the selection of a convention city. The navy's idea of preserving peace was outlined by Secretary Wilbur in cross-examination before a House Committee. Mr. Wilbur said that the proposed \$725,000,000 navy building program was essential if the navy were to "protect" trade routes of American overseas commerce. Even at that, some of it would not be fully "protected," he said.

Sonora Basks in California Weather

Tourists en route to California, whose way led them through Sonora a this week, probably thought that they had reached that highly-advertised land of eternal sunshine when they arrived in Sonora. This week's weather has been of the variety often referred to in poetry and song as "perfect" and calculated to take the worries from the mind.

Although the weather man predicted cold weather from the 28th of January through early February, the scheduled visit of Jack Frost seemed to have been postponed.

DILLING NEAR UVALDE

Five trucks, carrying a Fort Worth Spudder and all necessary machinery for the drilling of a shallow well, passed through Sonora Wednesday en route to a point in Uvalde County where a test is to be made.

The trucks came from Albany to San Angelo via Abilene. The test is to be drilled by Cribbs Brothers, who have recently completed a well near Albany.

Reports Favorable from Diamond Test

T. C. Hadley of San Antonio, promotor of the diamond core test being made on the J. N. Ross ranch in this county, was here this week. Mr. Hadley reports that the well is drilling at around 1000 feet and that the Pennsylvania has been encountered. The test will, in his opinion, furnish conclusive sub-surface data on the presence of the Pennsylvania throughout the Plateau area.

No adverse conditions have been encountered in the sinking of the test, Mr. Hadley stated, but on the contrary, the test is more than justifying the owners in the formations being encountered.

Actual information as to the formations is being withheld from all save Mr. Hadley and companies owning acreage around the test.

Mr. Hadley believes that Sutton County is in for an oil play in the near future, probably this year. He is one of the first men to back his faith in Sutton County with an expenditure of money for a test, and says he believes he will be rewarded.

Lyceum Courses to Give Way to Films

Through an agreement with K. V. E. Scott, lessee and manager of the La Vista Theatre, four films will be donated to the members of the graduating class of Sonora High School next year and no further traffic will be had with lyceum courses. This step was decided on after receipts had been compared with disbursements in bringing the lyceum courses here.

It is believed that the lyceum courses, while no doubt instructive and in other ways very good, lack the quality of entertainment to which people have become accustomed. This was borne out by the small attendance at each of the performances staged here this year.

Furthermore, Mr. Scott said, these courses not only are unprofitable but "knock" one of the town's assets, the theatre. In a town of small population, two functions on the same night are impossible.

By thus agreeing to donate certain proceeds of given films to the class next year, Mr. Scott believes that he will be able to make his legitimate profit and at the same time hand over a very handsome sum to the class.

Miss Moore Reviews Home Economic Work

In the home economics department of the Sonora High School two courses are offered, namely H. E. I. and H. E. II. Each course is divided into two units, Foods I and Clothing I; Foods II, and Clothing II. For the first half of the school year the first year classes studied foods, while the more advanced class studied clothing. During the last half the program will be reversed.

These classes prove to be very interesting and practical. The girls learn not only to cook and to sew as the majority of people understand, but they learn the value of foods, their care and cost. In clothing they learn to choose the color lines that are most becoming to them and the care and renovation of clothing.

An interesting problem now being studied by the home economics classes is that of a budget. A budget stresses the importance of an allowance. One may see the need of this when he knows that a budget is a systematic record of expenditures.

The above mentioned subjects are just a few of the many practical things that the girls of the H. E. classes are getting. They are striving to gain two units of affiliation this year, but if they fail at that the time will be well spent in getting so many really useful helps.

Better Service and More Tire Miles

Changing tires around from time to time will result in longer tire life and better all round service, according to C. E. Stites, of the Stites Motor Co. Firestone dealers in Sonora Texas.

"When a motorist buys a new spare, we recommend that he put it on the right rear and give that tire a rest for a while," he stated. "The other tires should be changed, too, left front to left rear, etc. Each wheel puts certain strains on a tire different from that of the other wheels, and by using the tire in each in turn the wear is evenly distributed and the tire lasts longer and gives better service."

"It is also important to have tires looked over frequently for minor cuts and bruises, etc., and to have small repairs made promptly. Tires should be inflated to correct pressure as under-inflation of a few pounds will often result in the loss of hundreds of miles of useful service. Valve caps, screwed down tightly by hand, should always be used to prevent air leaks."

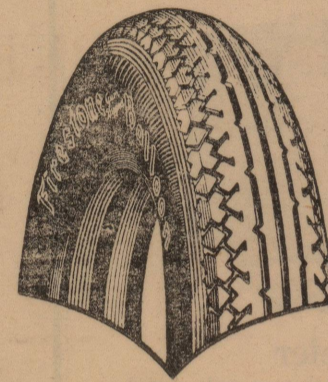

UTILITIES SECURITIES INSPIRES CONFIDENCE

Within the past year the highest courts have done much to clarify and make more definite and certain the acceptable ways of determining the value of utility property.

These decisions have served to increase confidence in the securities of gas and electric utility companies. The high favor in which such securities are held today is common knowledge.

A survey made during the past year showed that 250 gas and electric companies had sold 4,879,000 shares of stock to employes and customers since the inauguration of the customer ownership movement. One company published its annual statement in fourteen different languages.

Prediction has been made that the broadcasting by radio of annual stockholders' meetings can be expected in the near future, as a development of the large growth in the number of security holders.

FIFTEEN THIRTY-THIRDS CLAIMED BY LODGE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The list of lodges claiming a large number of Thirty-third Degree Scottish Rite Masons on their membership rolls continues to grow. 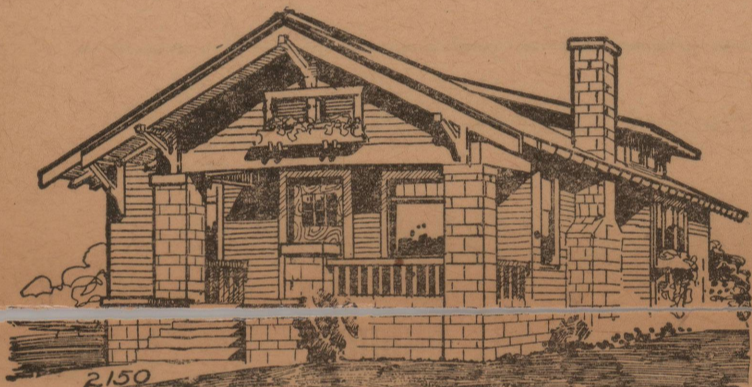
