Menard, Feb. 25.-W. R. Nisbet, county agent, says the results of the fly trapping in this county has shown that four traps to the section is not too many for efficient use. He also finds that more and more ranchmen will do trapping of flies this year when fly time arrives in March. The Menard County fly trap organization working over its 200 sections will maintain its hired trapper but many ranchmen in other counties and in this county out of the district will keep their own traps instead of hiring some one to handle them.

Two thirds of the traps used in the local organization have been going right through the Winter. There are new fool worms this year anywhere in the State and so the effect of the trapping on the fleeces is not to be Mrs. W. L. Aldwell left Thursday easily determined. The fly trap organitation caught 2,000 gallons of flies last year from March 1 to Nov. 1 and the number of worm cases where trapping was carried on aver aged one to 52 head, while outside the zone it was one to 24 head. 




