

If you look carefully you can make out a snake, toad, centipede, lizard and a spider. The little tiger behind has in its mouth Chang's own magic sword. Chang is pasted up in the home on the "Double 5th"-5th of moon—June 22 this year. He's supposed to repress the poisonous creatures so to ward off calamity and sickness, especially during the hot, trying months of Summer. 




