ALDWELL NAMED DIRECTOR OF NEW ORIENT

W. L. Aldwell, president of the First National Bank of this place, and who has been a director of the Orient Railroad for several years, was reelected as a member of the board of directors Tuesday in San Angelo at a meeting of Santa Fe and Orient officials.

W. T. Kemper, former president of the road and receiver, resigned at this meeting. The new board of directors is composed of the following:

W. L. Aldwell, Sonora; M. L. Mertz, San Angelo; W. B. Stoney was elected president of the board and the new property of the Santa Fe.

Mr. Aldwell said the Orient would continue to be operated by the Santa Fe as the Orient and as a property of the same.

Four Sonorans: Roy E. Aldwell, Sol Mayer, R. A. Halbert and Roy Hudspeth composed a committee from Sutton County to confer with officials of that route relative to the extension of the Orient from San Angelo to Del Rio.

The Santa Fe officials made their visit to San Angelo merely to inspect their new property, Mr. Aldwell said. They will announce later as to their intentions and plans of extension.

Two Sonorans Barely Escaped Death Sun.

Orion Hightower, senior partner of the W. O. Hightower Company Store, and Dorsey Archer, were injured Sunday near Mason when their Chrysler coupe ran off a bridge into the Llano river. They were enroute with other Sonorans to the Sul Ross-Kerrville football game there Sunday.

A bad crossing was attributed to the wreck, Mr. Archer said. The car fell into the river a distance of six feet. Archer was submerged. Hightower escaped with minor injuries while Archer sustained several ugly gashes about the face and head.

The car was damaged to the extent that it cannot be repaired.

Utilities Co. May Extend Line Here

San Angelo, Texas, Nov. 16.—Twelve miles of 66,000 volt transmission lines are being constructed to extend to Christoval for the electrification of that town. Completion of this work will mean the addition of the 107th. town to the properties of the West Texas Utilities Company served by the network of more than 2,000 miles of highline.

The company also will erect at Christoval a 66-12-2.4 kv substation and a three phase 2300 volt distribution system. The new transmission lines will tap the 66,000 volt San Angelo-Mertzon line.

Christoval is a summer resort town and is located south of this city in Tom Gren County. It is expected that the West Texas Utilities Company will serve approximately 125 customers in the town.

It is anticipated that this line soon will be extended to Eldorado and Sonora to take care of pipe line leads in that territory.

New Speedometers on Fords Accurate

The speedometers of the new model "A" Ford cars have shown remarkable accuracy in the measurement of speeds.

Designed and built to maintain an accuracy of within three miles fast at seventy miles per hour, these speedometers of the new Fords thus far have shown, in tests, an average accuracy of not more than one and a half miles fast at seventy miles per hour, or just one-half of the tolerance allowed.

The allowed tolerance of three miles fast at a speed of seventy miles per hour means, translated into terms of average driving speeds, that if the speedometer on the car indicates a speed of twenty-four miles per hour the actual rate of travel of the car at that time is not less than twenty-three miles per hour, or that if the speedometer shows a speed of forty-seven miles per hour, the car actually is traveling at a speed of not less than forty-five miles per hour.

Whatever the speed limit allowed by law, the driver of one of the new Fords may be certain that he is within that limit if his speedometer indicates exactly that figure which is the legal limit.

The speedometer which is standard equipment on the new Fords is one of the best known and finest of makes. It is driven from a gear on the drive shaft and measures speed from the revolutions per minute of the shaft. The tests of these instruments that are being made regularly in the Ford Engineering Laboratory at Dearborn are interesting. The speedometer are tested against an electric tachometer, which in turn is checked with an integrating revolution counter, the most precise device made for determining speeds in revolutions per minute.

MASONIC HOSPITAL FIRST HOME FOR 2,013 BABIES

Chicago, Ill.—The Illinois Masonic Hospital has been the first home for 2,013 babies from May 1, 1921, to September 1st, this year. The files in the statistical department show that 477 boys and 462 girls have been born at the hospital from November 1, 1925, to September 1st, this year.

The departments of a Class "A" institution, such as the Illinois Masonic Hospital, are organized with care and function with efficiency. The hospital is supported by members of the Fraternity, and its friends, and is regularly chartered by the State of Illinois. It is governed by 1,216 representatives from 671 Masonic and allied bodies, representing over a half million members of Masonic families. In addition to the officers and board of trustees, there is also a group of prominent Masons who serve as honorary members.

THE lubrication system for the engine of the new Ford is as simple in principle as water running down-hill.

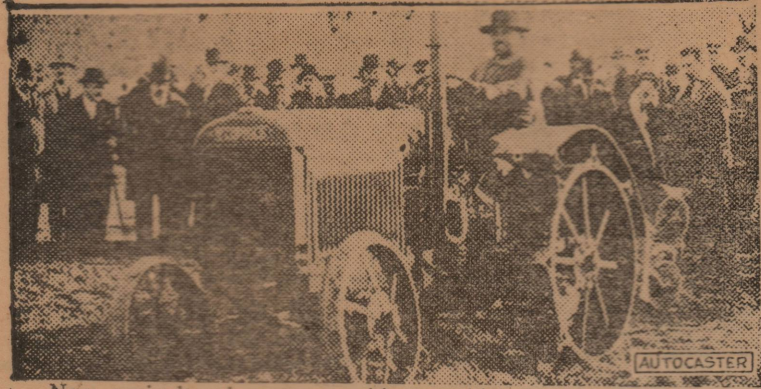

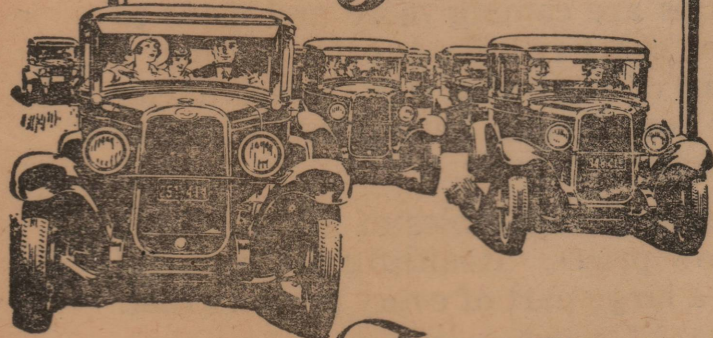

Upsets a Feature of Football Play

There's no denying, football is in for its greatest season. We have had three Saturdays of football and surprises have marked each day. But these surprises have increased each week, and the toll last Saturday was heavy. It is this place is to be continued throughout the season it will be difficult to foresee what will happen before Thanksgiving.

There is no doubt that the defeats of Notre Dame and Michigan were the outstanding upsets. Here we have Notre Dame losing its first game in ten years to a Western Conference team also Michigan losing its opening game for the first time in twenty-five years. It was known that Notre Dame had a hard fight on its hands against Wisconsin, but it must be admitted that Michigan, although not as strong as in the last few years, was a favorite to defeat Ohio Wesleyan.

Then again we have Navy. For the second straight week the Navy has been beaten and thus far has even failed to score. But in defeat the Navy has shown a fine defense, as a safety decided the first game against Davis Elkins and a fine touchdown settled the clash with Boston College last Saturday.

Navy Has Offensive Powers. There still is no occasion for Navy men to be downcast, for Coach Ingram's men have displayed plenty of offensive power, but have not mastered the art of developing a scoring punch. Notre Dame, like the Navy, has not had its usual scoring machine functioning at high speed, for the reason that Rockne's men have had two rugged opponents. Now these same teams will meet in Chicago this Saturday, and the football public should not be deluded into thinking that it will see weak teams in action. I feel that both elevens have learned a lot in those two tough games and should put on a high grade of football.

But for spectacular, half-raising, early-season football I doubt if there ever was anything like the brand flashed at West Point last Saturday. I wish to state right here that it was far from the perfect football played by Army and Southern Methodist, but it was that sensational passing and running game, specially as played by the Texans, which had a distinct appeal for the spectators.

Of course the unexpected always happens in his kind of game when the ball is in the air so frequently. Naturally, interceptions and fumbles are part of this style of football and a successful march often is checked through an interception or a fumble.

It follows that this type of game is bound to keep the spectators on edge, for the reason that first one team is threatening to score, then a fumble or an interception suddenly has the offensive eleven very much on the defensive.

Passes Thrilling but Dangerous. The kind of football as played by Southern Methodist, which consists of dazzling passing plays of all descriptions, is thrilling but dangerous. Lateral, double and triple passes, winding up sometime with long tosses down the field, are mystifying and baffling. This is the real open game, but it is dangerous and virtually can be called boomerang foot-

ball. When I say dangerous football I mean the kind that is in contrast to the style in which the team of the offensive so arranges its plays that line drives and end runs are mixed with short passes. Scores cannot be made so quickly but on the other hand, a more conservative style also helps to eliminate the danger from interceptions.

I regard it, however, as a fine thing for football. In order to play the kind of football as employed by the Texans it is necessary to have men thoroughly coached and skillful in handling the ball. The fast, passing game also necessitates high grade replacements.

The Army has another of its great teams this year and it took a great team to drop the high-powered Texan machine. This eleven lived up to its reputation with a display of advanced passing that may prove beneficial in more ways than one. The Army has a more finished football team—that is, one well grounded in the rushing and running game, but great credit must go to the courageous Texans.

It is a fine thing for football to have teams of the style of Southern Methodist make their appearance in the North. It also is evidence of the great development of football. A few years ago a team from Texas or some other distant section would be regarded as just a good early season game. The advanced football, as played last Saturday by both teams show clearly that in most cases elevens must be ready for real football right from the start.

All Games Are Hard. And this situation is general. In the old days the big teams could take things easy until November when the coaches found it necessary to concentrate on only one or two games. Now it readily can be seen that a hard blow is likely to be struck from any side and the so-called big teams, in order to win or at least hold their own, are forced to do some intensive driving right from the start.

I personally feel that big teams should not be regarded as weak just

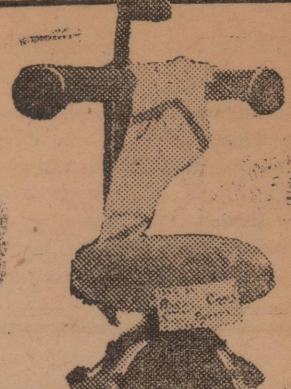
because they happen to fall before one from a smaller school. As I have pointed out before, modern football has been carried to all parts of the country through the coaching of former college stars. Football is truly the national Fall game.

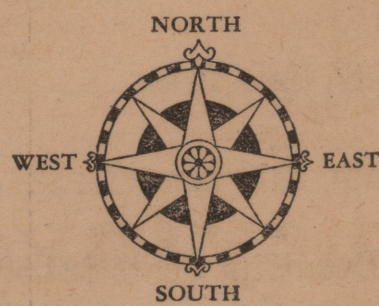

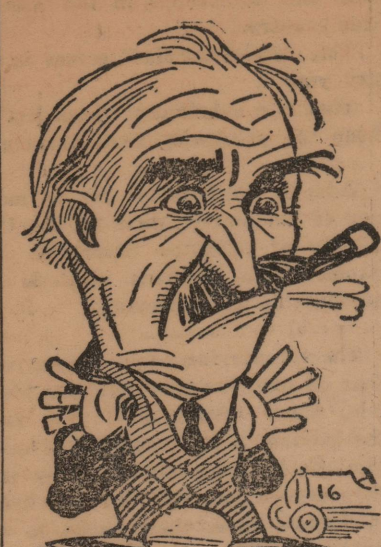

THE GREATEST NEWS FIFTEEN BILLIONS OVER RELIGIOUS IDEALISM ENGLISH JUSTICE

The most important news in the world has nothing to do with the election, or the intelligence of the modern "flapper" highly prized by educational authorities. The year's important news tells of a giant telescope, with a 200-inch mirror that will reveal to the eyes of men hundreds of millions of new stars and distant "universes."

Appalling to man's feeble intellect is a thin instrument that will bring within reach of our eyes the light of nebulae in a far off universe, light that has been traveling through space one billion years, at a speed of 186,000 miles a second.

Mr. Raskob, a brilliantly able business man, said, probably out of politeness to please political associates, that our prosperity is not genuine. The General Motors Company, for which he has done good work, seems not to share his opinion, judging by the price of its stock and the size of its earnings.

Mr. Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury, thinks our prosperity is sound enough and so do others of financial ability.

This "social surplus" comes in every year.

That is a substantial "back log" to keep the prosperity fires burning.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., in memory of his mother gives to the University of Chicago \$1,000,000 "to promote the religious idealism of students of the university."

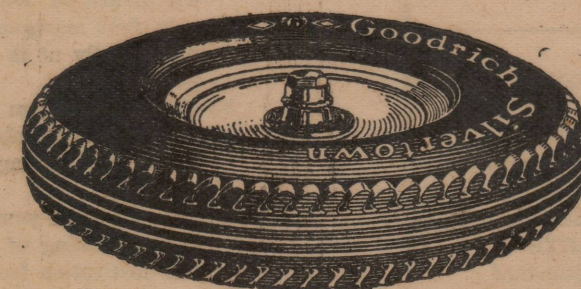

Local Men Buy Stock in Dry Ice Corporation

Several Sonora business men and ranchmen have purchased stock in the Dry Ice Corporation of Texas and Louisiana, according to W. R. Matthews, representative of that corporation. Stock is selling in units of 7 per cent preferred and of common at \$11 with par value on 7 per cent preferred which leaves common stock at \$1, non-assessable and no par value. Fifty shares is the minimum amount sold for \$550. This corporation is capitalized at \$850,000 and will be incorporated to provide for five plants to be located in Houston, San Antonio, Fort Worth, Shreveport and New Orleans.

Dry ice is equal to twenty-five times the same amount of water ice. It is manufactured from carbon dioxide gas and is absolutely free of moisture, Mr. Matthews said. A family that uses 50 pounds of ice daily will use 1500 lbs. per month will not use in excess of 40 pounds of dry ice per month, he declared. This new ice will retail for ten cents per pound and a block of forty pounds will last the average family for at least 30 days.

The demand for dry ice is fifty times greater than the output. At present the corporation will cater principally to the transportation trade. It will be at least two years before the new product will be sold for domestic use, he averred.

It has been announced that Henry Ford, multimillionaire automobile king, will build special boxes for this new product and will have them distributed through his vast sales organization. Each Ford dealer will be authorized dealers for the box.

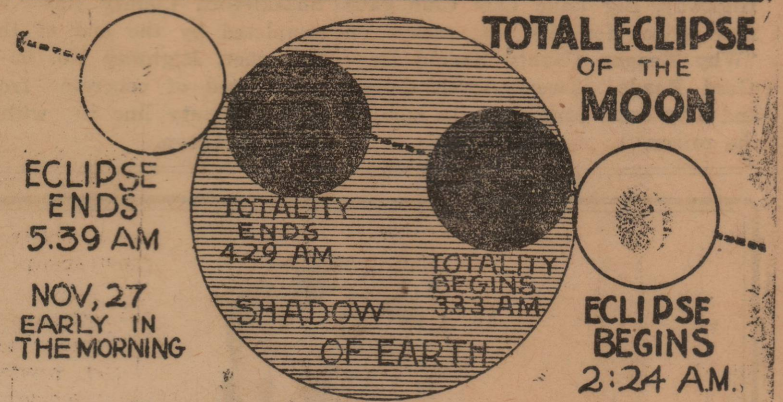
A quart of milk, which contains bacteria, may be placed in a box containing this ice, and within an hour the milk will test 100 per cent pure.

It is said that the new Ford box will be so constructed that the temperature may be easily adjusted from a few points above freezing to a point where a container of water will freeze in a very short time.

Mr. Matthews has sold stock to Sonorans and many Del Rio business men. He believes that this new ice corporation will pay handsome dividends.

Total Eclipse of the Moon Nov. 27



Visible from beginning to end everywhere in the United States, there will be a total eclipse of the moon early in the morning of November 27th. The chart above provides a graphic time-table of the eclipse.

BUT YOU'LL HAVE TO BE UP EARLY TO SEE IT!

Everyone in the United States will have the opportunity of seeing the total eclipse of the moon coming November 27—but the spectators will have to be pretty early. For the moon will enter the earth's shadow at 2:24 a. m., eastern standard time. Total eclipse begins at 3:33 and lasts until 4:29 o'clock, when the moon begins to emerge. At 5:39 a. m. the eclipse will be over. Central times are one hour earlier, mountain times two hours and Pacific times three hours.

The moon will probably not disappear from view although entirely within the shadow for nearly an hour. Considerable sunlight is refracted into the shadow through the ring of the earth's atmosphere around the base of the shadow. The moon at that time will be dim and noticeably red like the setting sun.

During a lunar eclipse, recent observations have shown, the moon's surface temperature drops from 170

degrees Fahrenheit immediately before the eclipse to 190 degrees below zero during the total phase.

A drop of 360 degrees in an hour or two! Some cold wave! Of course, no one lives on the moon, for it is airless and barren. The absence of atmospheric protection permits the sudden change in temperature. During the long lunar night, a thermometer at the surface would register not higher than 150 degrees below zero.

The earth's conical shadow stretches nearly a million miles into space. At intervals of 9 1-2 days the moon, then at the full phase, overtakes the shadow; but it passes usually above or below and there is no eclipse. The number of lunar eclipses in a year varies from three to none at all. Some of them are only partial and not visible from the earth. Astronomers now know far in advance the times and circumstances of eclipses. At the times of full moon, near the middle and the end of the year, conditions are most favorable for eclipse.
