1,000 ATTENDED **BARBECUE** AT **HUDSPETH RANCH**

(By Sam Ashburn)

Concerted action to reduce the ten million dollar annual loss from the blowfly in Texas was agreed on today at a big gathering at the Hudspeth Ranch on the Devil's River. The speakers declared that the blowfly could be outdone like the scab and the fever tick.

This was the business end of a gay gathering of the friends of C. B. Hudspeth, congressman from the Sixteenth District, serving on his fifth term and re-elected to his sixth.

The assembly, which had been called together by Congressman Hudspeth to discuss the problem, named a committee to work out a plan of action. Roy Aldwell is chairman of the committee and will likely call the first meeting in December.

More Than 1,000 Attetnd gars were also on the menu. The affair closed with an old-fashioned dance.

Wearing a khaki suit and shoe on the platform shaded by hundred foot high liveoaks, and asked that the audience toast the "silent man in the White House." A telegram of good wishes was dispatched to President Coolidge.

Cheaney Leads Jackets to Big Six Title

Brownwood, Texas, Nov. 17, 1928: Joe Bailey Cheaney, former star grid assistant coach under Dad Amis, is serving his first year's head mentor of the Jackets and if the results of the first seven games played by the Jackets can be taken as true indicators, it can be truthfully said Cheaney has made a decided success. And if the Jackets go through their remaining four games with equal success, Cheaney will have accomplished a feat that his predecessors have failed in, that of winning the Texas Conference football championship. While playing with the Yellow Jackets, Cheaney gained a state wide reputation as being one of the best backfield men and ball carriers in Tex as. His sensatonal runs of from 50 to 90 or more yards for touchdowns stamped him as one of the game's greatest men. In addition to this, Cheaney was an excellent passer and a fair punter and his defensive play was equal to his steller work on the offense.

Cheaney took special pride in beating the Simmons University Cowboys while carrying the ball for the Jackets, as evidenced by the fact that during his career with the Jackets, Simmons did not win a single game from the Brownwood school. Since becoming coach, Cheaney is none the less cager to beat the Cowboys, and fans of Texas may rest assured that much time will be spent between now and December 7, in planning an offense that will leave the Abilene machine wondering what it is all about.

Coach Cheaney is being assisted this season by McAdoo Keaton, another former Howard Payne player. Keaton won distinction as a lineman with the Jackets and has charge of the Jacket forward wall this year. Only one team besides Southern Methodist has crossed the Jacket goal line and that was on a forward pass and not through Keaton's line. Few gains have been made through the Jacket line and the Jacket front line is expected to care for itself against any and all opposition.



Upwards of fifty Ambassadors and Ministers to foreign countries will be retired on March 4. next. There are many splendid jobs to be found in the list, ranging from \$17,500 a year down to a paltry \$5,000. These plums are generally gobbled up by the big boys of the campaign. Dr. Work, head of the Republican National Committee, for instance, was said prior to election to be desirous of appointment to a European capital. Most of the men appointed to such posts must be wealthy. A poor man can't keep up his end of the entertaining.

This was a bit unusual. Generally the campaign head gets a cabinet post. Raskob, for instance, has been definitely linked with the Treasury Department since the beginning of the campoign. Everybody took it for granted that in the event of a Smith victory, John J. Raskob would be Secretary of the Treasury. In Dr. Work's case, however, he has already filled two Cabinet portfolios-Postmaster General and Secretary of the Interior-and the Cabinet held no allure.

The entire personnel of the Intersate Commerce Commisison will not be retired during the coming four years, but seven of the eleven members will end their terms. The new President will thus be able to appoint a majority, if he resires, of the Commission with wholly different views from those held by the incumbents. This applies equally to the Federal Trade Commission.

One of the big plums is the Directorship of the Budget Bureau, a \$10,-000 a year job. The present holder of this office is a retired Brigadier General, Herbert M. Lord. There will be a host of applicants for his job. The Tariff Commission, likewise has some good berths for the faithful-at \$7,500 a year. The Board of Tax Appeals will have several va-
