Penetrating the depth of 6510 feet this morning the Phillips Holman No. 2, just over the line in Edwards county, had a good sweet gas showing, according to J. S. Holman on whose ranch the test is being drilled. Drilling is slow due to the hardness of the formation, but it is thought that the interesting depth of 6635 feet will be encountered sometime next



Wise hunters make arrangements to hunt before visiting the hunting territory, as most of the ranches are leased for hunting privileges.
