Victor Pierce, Ozona ranchman, and owner of one of the finest flocks of sheep in America was made president, and Roy Hudspeth of San Angelo was made vice president and general manager of the Texas Wool and Mohair Company at the annual meeting of the stockholders and the board of directors at the company's warehouse yesterday afternoon. J. W. Owens, of J. W. Owens and Sons, owners of perhaps the biggest registered flock of sheep in Texas and ranching near Sheffield, was added to the directorate. Sol Mayer, member of the executive committee of the National Wool Marketing Corporation and W. W. West, Ozona ranchman, were named vice presidents. R. D. Craig was renamed secretary and treasurer and A. S. Baker, formerly a Boston wool buyer was renamed as warehouse manager.

The stockholders chose as directors the following:

Early Baggett, Ozona; W. W. West, Ozona; V. I. Pierce, Ozona; J. W. Owens, Ozona; Dan Cauthorn, Sonora; R. A. Halbert, Sonora; J. R. Mims, Water Valley; Sol Mayer, San Angelo; Roy Hudspeth, San Angelo.

The report of the secretary-treasurer for the past season showed that the company had handled five and a half million pounds of wool and mohair during the year.

The company paid the stockholders a 4 per cent dividend and carried \$25,000 to the surplus account and \$5,764 to the undivided profits account, making a total of capital, surplus and profits \$130,764.00.

The stockholders of the company expressed themselves well pleased with the showing made for the 1930 business. It is the second year that the warehouse has been in operation.—San Angelo Standard.

**STATE U. LIBRARY BOOK LOANS INCREASE**

Austin, Texas, Jan. 15.—Circulation of the Package Loan Library Bureau of the University of Texas during December, 1930, shows a heavy increase over the circulation for December, 1929, according to the report of Miss LeNoir Dimmitt, chief of the bureau. In December, 1929, there were 1,122 individual borrowers, with a total circulation of 1,836 package libraries. In December, 1930, the borrowers numbered 1,485, and the circulation totaled 2,303 package libraries.

More than half the circulation for December, 1930, was among schools, where the material is used largely for school essay work in communities where library facilities are inadequate, Miss Dimmitt's report showed. Schools using the Package Loan Library Bureau material numbered 1,302; woman's clubs formed the next largest group of users, numbering 757, while libraries were third, numbering 134. Calls for interscholastic league debate material numbered 92, while ten individuals made re-

quests for package libraries and 8 parent-teacher associations asked for material.

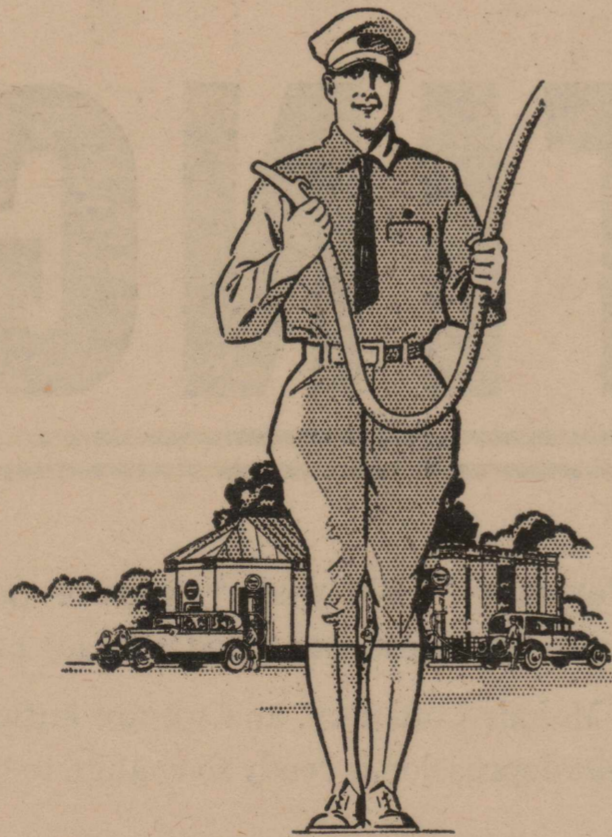

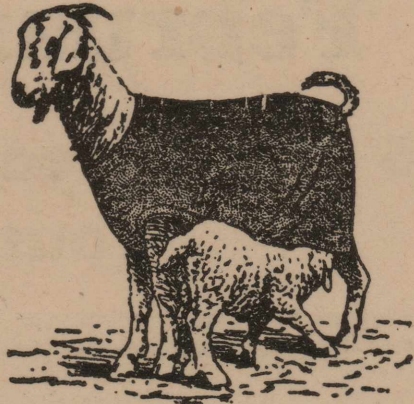
