Highest Yet Paid, A Total of \$29,640 Is Expected.

The State Board of Education, Thursday day of last week fixed the per capita aid to public schools for the next school year at \$19. Highest in the State's history. Based on an estimated 1,560,000 scholastics, the state per capita aid would total \$29,640,000.

Guidance Conference Will Be Held At Tech, Lubbock, July 27 - 29

Lubbock, July 21.—Dr. Ben D. Wood, of Columbia university, heads the faculty of the guidance conference, first of its kind in Texas, to be held at Texas Technological college July 27, 28 and 29. Dr. Wood is executive secretary of cooperative test service of the American Council of Education, and is the author of several books on guidance.

1418 Poll Taxes Paid

A list at Tax Collector Jim Cook's office show a total of 1,418 poll taxes were paid up to January 31, this year. There have been 60 exemption certificates issued to "unders," it is estimated there are at least 200 "overs," probably 35 who became 21 years of age since February and were not required to have certificates of any kind, also an unknown number who have moved into the county 30 days or more ago.

MAKE BREAKFAST PARTY SUCCESS

Sundays and Holidays Best for Informal Meal.

THE breakfast party is a delightful form of entertaining more or less informally. In general, Sundays or holidays are naturally chosen for this meal which may be scheduled for any time between nine and one-thirty.

The meal may be served either at the table or buffet style depending upon the number of invited guests. In any case, the guest of linen, glass and china are used. Be sure that the napkins are large enough to be really useful.

Now about the menu. You may use foods which we associate with breakfast no matter what hour the meal is served. Or, you may choose more elaborate dishes, such as would be served at the usual luncheon.

For a second course there may be, if you like, a cereal, hot or ready-to-eat. Oatmeal or cornmeal milk with plenty of cream will be a treat to persons who habitually eat the lightest of breakfasts.

Be sure that you have plenty of hot coffee at the table at the moment breakfast is announced. That is what everyone demands at breakfast.

For the breakfast which verges on the luncheon, you may offer hot bouillabaisse instead of cereal. The main course may be broiled chops, scrambled eggs with shad roe or broiled chicken.

No matter how simple the menu, if the food is well cooked and your breakfast table appointments are attractive, your "brunch" will be successful.

Select small, round tomatoes. Cut across at stem end and with teaspoon scoop out centers. Turn upside down to drain.

Beat the eggs, add the cream and season to taste with salt and pepper. Melt one tablespoon butter in a heavy frying pan, pour in mixture and stir over a low fire until just set.

Scrambled Eggs With Shad Roe. 6-8 eggs, 1/4 cup cream, salt and pepper, 1 tablespoon butter, Paprika, 1 can shad roe.

Waffles. 2 1/2 cups pastry flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 3 eggs, 1/2 cup melted shortening or cooking oil, 1 1/2 cups milk.

Toasted Potato Fluff. 3 cups mashed potatoes, Seasoning, Hot milk, 1/2 cup whipped cream, 1/2 cup grated cheese.

The mashed potatoes should be well seasoned and beaten with milk until creamy. Spread on a deep plate, cover with whipped cream and cheese, and sprinkle with paprika.

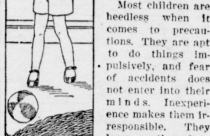

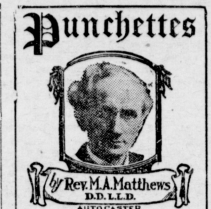
