

English fleece wools are moving freely now and are in the strongest position they have occupied for several weeks.

There was a moderate turnover of merino tops in Yorkshire with 64's tops selling one cent a pound PATRONIZE OUR MERCHANTS! higher than last week. Crossbred wools are not entering into consumption channels in Great Britain as rapidly as merino wools. However, prices of crossbred 50's tops advanced 3 cents a pound in Bradford following the sharp rise in price of New Zealand wools due to the activity of Japanese buyers in New Zealand.

Yarn prices also advanced during the week with 2-48's and 2-32's yarns quoted at two cents a pound above the previous week. Some increase was reported in the demand for spinning yearns.

During the month of February 611,000 pounds of wool, 3,697,000 pounds of wool tops and 110,000 pounds of wool yarns passed thru the Bradford conditioning house. This is a considerable increase over last month, for during January only 369,000 pounds of wool, 3,462,000 pounds of wool tops and 104,000 pounds of wool yarns were conditioned.

This spring is an ideal time in which to start with poultry. With a little care in selection, a well bred flock of chickens may be obtained from a reliable hatchery or breeder. Feed costs will be lower this season than in many years past. By the time the pullets are ready to lay, egg prices will be on the up-

Limited capital should not stop the prospective poultry-raiser or farmer from entering this field. A modest amount of money to invest in good chicks, a good brooder stove and a good brooder house, with enough to buy feed during the spring and summer, is enough.

Spring is an excellent time for starting the flock, for two reasons. First, the poultry-raiser has an opportunity to know his birds as they grow to maturity. By constantly checking their progress, he can have a fine flock of pullets in the fall and know all about his birds individually. Second, hatchery chix offer the most satisfactory method of getting an early profit on the investment, since they can be raised in sufficient numbers to make a flock of pullets large enough to realize a good total income.
