## Basis Now 67 Cents; Is 4c Lower Than Formerly

Sonora's insurance key rate has been lowered four cents per hundred according to a new posting of rates by the Texas insurance commission, as announced by J. W. De-Weese, state commissioner. The rate is 67c, as compared with a former rate of 71c. The new rate became effective August 15, but was not announced until several days after that date.

The reduction was secured in several ways. Regular inspections and monthly reports to the state commission by George Smith, fire marshal, secured a reduction a reduction of 3 per cent. At the request of the chairman. the local delegation carried a complete chart of rates charged by utilities in Sonora. Rate listings were secured from the Southwestern Public Service Co., from the West Texas Utilities Co., and from the San Angelo Telephone Co.





SECOND DIPTHERIA TREATMENT TO BEGIN SATURDAY, SEPT. 5

The second innoculation with diphtheria toxoid, following up the first immunization treatment administered to 152 Sonora children August 4 and 5 through efforts of the Sonora Parent-Teacher Association, will be given to all children who had the first shot at that time, on Saturday afternoon, September 5, at 1:00 o'clock at the high school building.

The Parent-Teacher Association urges that parents of all children who are eligible for the second shot of toxoid make their plans to have their children present for the treatment. It is pointed out that the first shot is useless unless followed up as prescribed.

No first treatment will be given, but all children, both American and Mexican, ready for the second innoculation should be on hand September 5 for this important followup step in immunization.


## **Rattlesnake** Fight

As they leaped at each other, they began striking, and during the entire battle each snake kept up a continual rattling. "The arena" occupied only a small piece of ground, and neither of the fighters gun and blew goat's horns off. Goat once gave ground to the other. At times they became disentangled, but promptly charged again, emitting a yellow foam from their mouths and lashing the air with fire station to cost \$200,000. their tails.





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

Sutton county is going to the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show next March. She is going with one purpose-to take winning baby beeves, fed by Sutton county boys. Last year Sonora and the county were acknowledged as strong contenders for honors in the club boys division in baby beef feeding. They were disgualified only because there were not the required number of 15 animals which could qualify to compete as a load.

This year can be made entirely another matter, but the time for action is right now-not next March. At present there are 18 calves being fed by seven or eight boys. Turner D. White, instructor in vocational agriculture in the Sonora schools, is seeking to increase this number to at least 25, in order that a first-class showing of 15 beeves may be assured.

The breeders of livestock in this section stand a chance to secure advertising which is the best that money can buy-recognition of Sutton county as a breeding and feeding center for the highest grade of Hereford cattle.

The majority of Sutton county cattle men are squarely behind the project. All that is needed is a few more boys to take the responsibility of giving

a calf regular feed.

### **35 YEARS AGO**

The Devil's River News published on Saturday, December 12, 1891, almost forty years ago, told of a surplus supply of horses existing in Queensland, Australia, whereas in the United States horses were scarce and very expensive. In Queensland the horses could be bought in Brisbane for \$1 and \$1.75 a head. Farmers living in the interior could not afford to send them to market at such a price, and instead, had to shoot them. In addition to losing the horse the cost of shooting was 62 cents a head! In Washington at that time ordinary horses sold for \$125 to \$200, and matched teams of better strain brought fabulous prices. The physicians carrying professional cards in The News of that day were Dr. H. Guernsey Jones and Dr. C. R. Matthis. A business lot on Main street was offered for sale for \$200. S. H. Stokes offered to trade a four-room residence and lot for sheep. Stories from the issue are reprinted as follows:







For the right front cut a piece with an extension from X to the lower edge and back to D. For the left front cut a straight line from X to D and let the right front extend over the left front. All edges are hemmed with a very narrow hem and edged with valenciennes, except the left front. Underarm and shoulder seams are first French seamed.

For the peplum the line AB is 20 inches and CD is 22 inches. The peplum is five inches wide and is curved slightly so that it is cut from a strip of material six inches wide. The blouse is stitched over the peplum and the peplum is edged with lace. It is cut in two pieces, seamed at the sides, and the blouse section may be slightly gathered at the sides to fit over it smoothly.


