With the entire south, and particularly that large portion of it lying within the bounds of the
Lone Star State, in the midst of harried efforts to Lone Star State, in the midst of harried efforts io
bolster the price of the dethroned King Cotton, West Texas is satisfied to take sane steps toward a solution of the puzzle offered by the below-cost prices on mohair.
Instead
Instead of seeking legislation and militarism as
the cure for the ill, representatives of the wool and the cure for the ill, representatives of the wool and
mohair business met in Kervville recently and de cided to work together in adopting sensible methods of price boosting. Losing no time in wrangling, they
agreed to stand pat on sales of mohair until a remagreed to stand pat on sales of mohair until a rem-
edy could be tried, and at once dispatched a delegation of competent men to the North and East to confer with the federal Farm Board and with leaders in the manufacturing industry in an effort to get a the production of mohair
On the other side of the ranchmen's business, the production of meat (rather than fleeec), bankers, ranchers and farmers met in San Angelo and
within ten days worked out plans to benefit both within ten days worked out plans to benefit both
producer of meat and producer of feed. If there is such a thing as lifting oneself by the bootstraps the breeder-feeder plan is the example. With prices of finished meat always higher than those of range
livestock, the chance to finish stocks in Texas offers livestock, the chance to finish stocks in Texas offers
a solution in the disposal of a bumper feed crop, and in such a manner that the future of the business will not be depressed for a temporary gain, as will be the effect of drastic anti-cotton legislation.
It may be possible for a government to save an It may be possible for a government to save an
oil situation by enforcing a shut-down, since oil is a natural resource. Cotton, on the other hand, cannot be classed as a natural resource, and its future like that of other agricultural commodities must be overned by the economic laws of supply and demand
Use the militia to regulate the planting of coton, or the selling of cotton, and soon the wheat farmer will seek the same aid, and so will the corngrower, and the feed farmer, and the truck farmer,
and the potato farmer. In the twinkling of a few and the potato farmer. In the twinkling of a few
proclamations, the military forces of our land would pe doing the farming-figuratively, not literally. The farmer himself would still do the work, but before he hitched his team in the morning, or before he plowed an acre of ground, he would ask the maste
Again troops would be quartered on the people. If the government is to run agriculture and
dustry, as Governor Huey P. Long of Louisiana is seeking to have it control cotton in that state, the farmer will lose more in high tax rates reflecting
the high cost of government regulation, than he will make by a higher price. Instead of being a citizen of the United States, free to exercise the rights of self-expression, he might just as well be running a

The need for action is imperative, for as she
nd goats are driven along the highway, not only is the fleece damaged, but the seeds are scattered ver ranches of the entire section.
Efforts will be made to pass a bill in the Texas Legislature requiring that the highways be kept
clean of this vegetation, and prohibiting the contractors of hay infested with the seeds of the undesirable plants.
