"Early detection of diabetes the first step toward diabetes control," states Dr. Silverthorn. National Health Survey data reveal that more people are limited in their activities by diabeter than by cancer and tuberculosis combined. It is estimated that 200,000 Texans are diabetics today, with one half of this number being unaware of their condition. One of the tragic complications of diabetes is blindness. For the nation as a whole, diabetes is the third leading cause of blindness.

As diabetes is discovered more often among the older residents of our communities, all people over 40 years of age are especially urged to take advantage of the screening program. Also persons who are related to diabetica. persons who are overweight, and the parents of babies weighing more than nine pounds at birth
