# Rainfall Drenches Area

Soil Conservation Service

The heaviest general rains in many years drenched West Texas and the Sonora area-from Sunday through Tuesday. Rains were falling again Wednesday morning. Rainfall totals of 5 to 7 inches were usual, with some ranchmen measuring over 9 inches for the three-day total.

Most of the rainfall was of the ground-soaking, drought-breaking variety with very little runoff. Some torrential showers fell, however, causing streams to flow. Sediment pools on four of the five flood prevention dams on Lowrey Draw were filled. Automatic drawdown pipes at structures on James Hunt, Ada Wynn and W. L. Miers ranches were discharging floodwater on Monday and Tuesday. All structures on Dry Devils River caught floodwater, but only Site 5 on the Lawrence Steen ranch was discharging.


Reports that some of the lakes were full of water were erroneous. Actually, none of the lakes were 10 per cent full. With the soil now soaking wet, however, a heavy rain on the watershed could produce runoff that would prove the dams very valuable.
