

The Devil's Workshop An Idle Mind Column

By Della King

The opening of the Olympic games in Tokyo last weekend adds interest to the following facts about early Olympiads compiled by Jesse A. Pardue of the American Athletic Union:

Today's young Olympic supermen would undoubtedly beat the socks off the Greek athletes who competed in the first Olympics in Athens around 3,000

And, the odds are great that they would also make mincemeat out of the contenders in the first modern Olympic game which was launched in Athens in 1896. Especially such strong Texas hopefuls as Fred Hansen of Rice University, who has unofficially pole vaulted higher than anyone in three different competitive events (17 feet 4 inches); and Randy Matson of Texas A&M, who shows great promise with the shot put.

Better equipment, superior training, and more Wheaties undoubtly give our modern contenders the edge. But it is also a continual striving to beat the "last" world's record. There is truth in the Olympic motto: "Cities, Altius, Fortius" (Swifter, Higher, Stronger).

For instance, the 1896 pole vault record was 10 ft. 9-3/4". The 1960 record was 15 ft. 5-

But let us not look too far down our noses at the original Olympic athletes in those ancient games. Take for instance, the Olympic youth who after runming a long distance race at a meet, immediately ran home 32 miles to tell his girl friend. And these early chaps were no slouches when it came to building stadiums, either. They had one that was every bit as big or bigger in area than any arenas built in modern times, seating 40,000 on grassy slopes.

But probably there will be more participants (7,000 from 90 nations) in the Tokyo Olympiad than there were spectators at most of the ancient meets. Tokyo expects a crowd of at least 11/2 million to view the 18th Modern Olympiad being held October 10-24. This event should provide more thrills, heroics and records broken than ever before.

There were other differences between modern and ancient Olympics. No women were allowed to participate, or even to watch, under the threat of being thrown off a nearby cliff. And possibly it's a good thing, too, since all of the young stalwarts performed in their birthday suits, as was the custom of the
