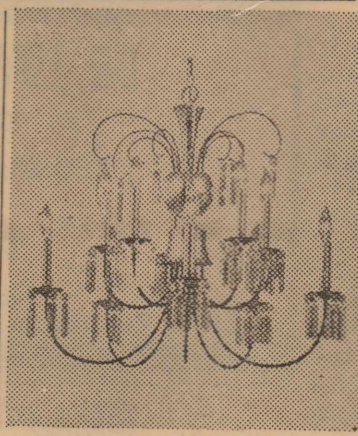

Hope Remains That Missing Honey Boy May Be Discovered, Returned to Owners

Several Sutton County people still have hope of finding the lost Chihuahua, Honey Boy. Boyd Lovelace says that U.S. Border patrolmen, Boy Scouts, Omer Grelle, city marshal, and other persons remain alert for a glimpse of the show dog missing since September 18.

Honey Boy, who is owned by Mr. and Mrs. James Agnew of San Antonio, was lost when the panel vehicle he and 11 other dogs were riding in turned over 14 miles east of Sonora on U.S. Highway 290. Miss Hester Sherfey of San Antonio was taking the animals to several dog shows when the accident occurred.

Miss Sherfey is now in Santa Rosa Hospital in San Antonio recuperating from spinal surgery. Lovelace says he has not given up hope of finding the gold and white Chihuahua since no trace has been found of its body or of the leash and chain it was wearing.

The four-pound dog was last seen by Raul Favila and Carlos Ortega, Highway Department employees, after it escaped from them. It ran under the locked gate of the Harold Schwiening Jr. ranch. Lovelace says that Schwiening has searched the pasture several times for a trace of the dog.

The other 11 dogs have all been accounted for. Mr. and Mrs. Joe V. Wilford recently carried the last two to a San Antonio kennel where Miss Sherfey's other dogs are being kept. One of the two was identified as the registered champion, Gervase Gaston of Shermac, a dog Miss Sherfey had been especially worried about.

A cash reward and a toy Manchester terrier are being offered to the person who returns Honey Boy.

Mrs. Agnew wrote in a letter to Lovelace last week, "We are ever so grateful for all that you and the other grand people of Sonora are doing to try and find a little lost dog. We love him so much and are so proud of him—in dollars and cents there is not enough money to buy him. "I am sure he has no money value to anyone else. He is K.C. registered, but is not champion size or build. He is only obedience trained. Hester (Miss Sherfey) trained him well. That was to be his last trip away from us. My husband never did want him to go, but Hester and I were so proud of him, we wanted to show him off . . . "Maybe someone will see Honey Boy and get in touch soon."

Agricultural Census To Collect Data From Ranchers, Farmers on Production

"All ranchers in Sutton County will need this year's business records to help answer questions on a form scheduled for mailing in early November to start the nationwide Census of Agriculture," D. C. Langford, county agent, reported this week.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years by the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U.S. Department of Commerce. The information provided about the nation's agricultural resources and production is needed in making decisions affecting many segments of the U.S. economy. Data gathered include a livestock and poultry inventory and information on equipment and facilities and on income and some production expenditures.

The job of taking the census will be in three stages, Langford says. The first stage—organizing a team of local citizens in each county to take the census—is already underway. Crew leaders to supervise the census are being selected and trained. They will have the responsibility of recruiting and training enough enumerators to count the ranches and farms in their counties.

Soon after November 1, the Census Bureau will open stage two by mailing out census questionnaires. Ranchers and farmers will then have a period of time to consult their records (or best estimates for the year) and answer the questions.

In the final stage, enumerators will visit each ranch in the county to collect the questionnaires and help ranchers prepare answers to any questions they have been unable to complete.
