Sonora sprouts like wild rose on wrong site

Charlie Adams in his book "Forty Years a Fool" admits having some part in the blunder of starting Sonora on the wrong section of land. The book is sub-titled "Facts, Figures and Fun." Facts and Figures are few, and the Fun is interwoven all around and all over until they are hard to separate, and one is convinced the whole thing is Fun. This does not surprise those who knew Charlie and believe he misplaced the town for a king-sized joke. He never took life seriously, and he probably did not expect his book to be taken seriously.

He did say that in locating a ranch in Sutton County, getting the land surveyed and a well drilled cost so much that his only chance to break even was to start a town and sell lots.

"When I started the town, I filed on a section of school land, made the proper payments, and began selling lots. For two years the town grew and flourished like a rose. I saw that I was going to get rich and took up with some London land sharks the proposition of establishing a family coat of arms.

"But all at once the startling discovery was made that we (here Charlie uses the first person plural) had not established the town on the school section bought from the state but upon the land belonging to some New York firm. It was then up to us to pitch in and buy back our own town. One of the members hastened to New York and succeeded in making the purchase all right, but the firm was very suspicious. They believed a gold mine had been found and in the deed they reserved everything under the surface selling us just the top of the gound . . . Nothing was thought of this at the EARLY SONORA-Huddled around a well on time, but by the terms of the deed we had cut ourselves off from the foot of a hill, wedged between two big water." Here Adams refers us to Caudal Appendage No. 7, which draws, the city of Sonora took root. In early states that this water problem is why no man from this town drinks

Finally he says, "Up to the time that it was discovered we had built the town on the wrong section, I enjoyed the reputation of being the "Father of Sonora," and there was some talk of raising a monument to me on the courthouse yard. After the mistake was discovered, however, it required a strong bodyguard to keep some of those to whom I had given choice corner lots from raising me in reality, rather than in marble, to the top of a telegraph pole." The fact is, there were no telegraph or telephone poles in this town.

Searching for "Facts" is rough. Old-timers definitely remember the town was on the wrong section; a few remember something on underground restrictions—nothing positive, not a single detail.

It would be safe to say Charlie was the "Father of the Idea" of starting a town on this site. Well drilling was making this country a year-round grazing ground for sheep and cattle. Before, it had been bypassed as civilization populated headwaters of the Llano and San Saba rivers 25 to 35 miles east, the South Concho 50 miles north, and the Nueces and Devil's rivers way south and southwest. Civilization detoured 90 miles south to lay a railroad across the state to El Paso. In the form of a wandering sheep herder SONORA was not the title that Charlie Adams civilization now followed the well driller into this land, "The chose for the new town. Now for some Facts, documented when possible, with dates, on children. the origin of Sonora and clues to the wrong-section mix-up.

An old-timer with a clear memory, G. W. Moriss, in an interview with the Devil's River News (hereafter abbreviated to DRN) in the October 25, 1940, issue states that Charlie told him the well was drilled in February, 1889. The DRN on September 5, 1891, gives the birth date of the town as July, 1889.

This is close to an earlier date, June 8, 1889, found in Vol. 1A of county records. Two deals, the first recorded on town lots, are bonds to guarantee title in three years. One is to G. J. B. Chetwynd of San Angelo, for lot 6, block D, according to the townsite map in his possession, for \$25. The other bond for \$100 to Pharis Hurst is for lots 1, 2, and 3, block E and lot 3, block B.

So we know Sonora was on paper in June, 1889. At least one of these deals developed. In our post office building is a picture of lot 1, block E with the stage stand and post office building of P. 





No man is what he thinks he is, but what he thinks-he is.


This saying applies not only to people, but to an entire community.

No time was lost; the deeds were recorded and lot sales began in June. In fact, Charlie bought the lot where his two-story home had been finished in January, six months before.

Charlie had strong faith in his town, if nothing else. And he had talked a lot of faith, or something, into thers who had built their homes on lots they did not own. Surely they had some sort of deed or scrap of paper. Very likely they were all bonds to guarantee title, as the two we were fortunate to find. Those folks wanted to live here mighty bad, and it was said, "Charlie

Musing on this strange confidence, we might check and see how many were living here, how many had actually built. Just how many could have been forced to move their homes? On Main Street was Callahan's store. According to Jim Cauthorn it was sticking out onto the street some six to ten feet and had to be moved back.

We have learned that Hurst's buildings were up on the corner next to the big oak. Across the street the present two-story rock building was then Sowell Hotel, six rooms, kitchen, and dining rooms built in one week in '89, according to Mat Adams. Down that side of the street were two saloons with open gambling (according to all old-timers), a restaurant, and a scattering of residences and gambling concessions operated by the Mexican people.

Going back to pioneer G. W. Morriss (DRN, 10-25-40) we read that he said that he came here with his wife around September, 1889, and their house was ready to move into. > This whole thing is beyond one not experienced in abstracts, land deals, and such. So the question is carried to a prominent local attorney. He stroked his chin in contemplation, "Yes, I have heard of the wrong section thing but am not sure what sections were involved or how it came about. Contrary to the story of restrictions on underground rights, I have been told that the owners first flat refused to sell section 85, but Callahan frankly told them he had to have it because his town was there, and they said that makes a big difference—why didn't you tell us so to start with. They made out the deeds, showing Callahan every consideration. All titles are now clear—as far as I know. There is possibly a slight cloud on some town property when Charlie sold property where he should have recorded the power of attorney to do so."
