License Required For Most Persons Fishing in Texas

The idea of catching fish without getting caught—without a license—is a favorite selling point nowadays by J. B. Phillips, coordinator of law enforcement of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The fishing license, for residents and non-residents alike, costs only \$2.15. If caught without one, a fisherman can expect to pay fines ten times or more the cost of the license.

A fishing license is required of everyone who fishes in Texas with only three exceptions: persons less than 17 or over 65 years of age; persons fishing on property on which they reside or own; and persons fishing in the county of their residence and not using a reel or other winding device.

Licenses are available at many fishing tackle and bait dealers, filling stations, grocery stores and at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices.

It also is advisable to pick up a copy of the fishing laws before you fish in an unfamiliar area. Size and bag limits often vary from county to county and from lake to lake. A copy of the laws, available at most sporting goods stores, is free.

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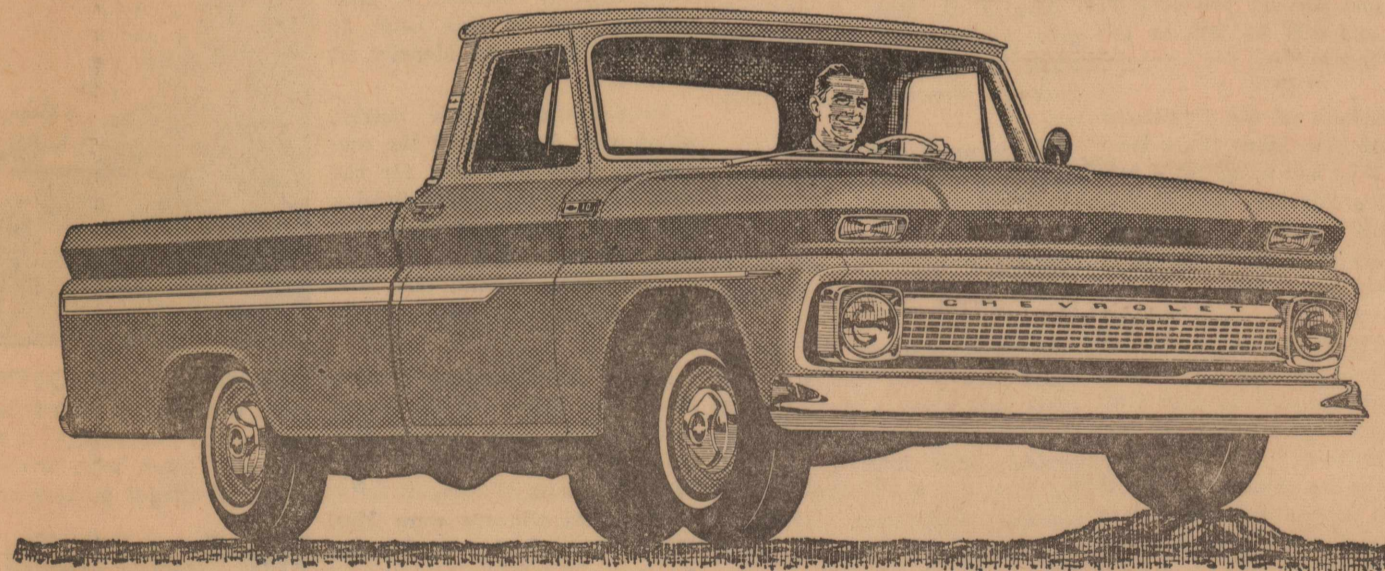
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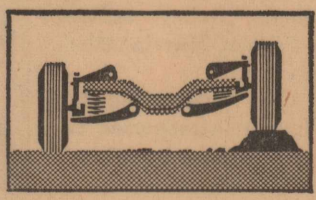
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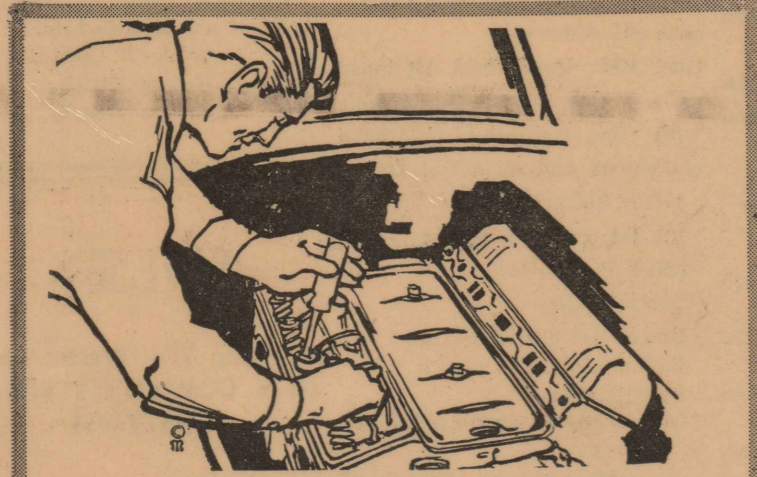
**El Dorado Woolens Opens Fabric Shop** Miss Sawyer Elected Dorm Sweetheart

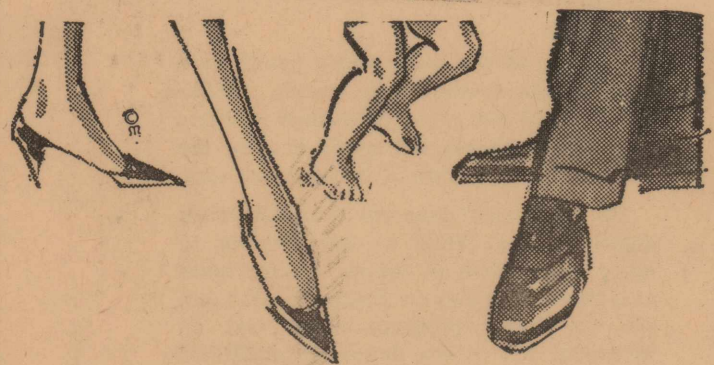
Carol Hopf, winning a silver medal, placed second in the girls' prose reading contest. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Hopf.

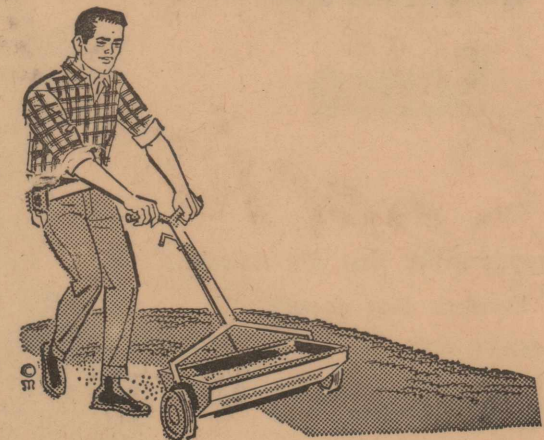

## Texas Lions Crippled Children Camp To Take Summer Campers' Applications

Applications for the Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children at Kerrville are now being taken and may be submitted to David Shurley of the West Side Lions Club or Ralph J. Finklea of the Downtown Lions Club.

This summer camping program is free of charge and is available only to those children who are crippled, blind, deaf, or mute.

In five sessions of two weeks each, the camp will accommodate a total of 720 crippled children. There will be three sessions for boys and girls ages 7 through 11 and two for boys and girls ages 12 through 16.

The first session for the younger group will be from June 6-13. Another session in this age group will be July 4 - 17, and the final camp session will be August 1-14.

Sessions for the older groups will be June 20 through July 3 and July 18-31.

All applications should be made during March if possible to give the camp and local clubs time to process the applications and interview applicants. However, the deadline for accepting applications is April 30.

Finklea said that the camp does not cost the children anything, and they are even urged not to bring any money to the

child who wants to come home when his two weeks are over, Finklea added.

Texas Lions have an investment of about \$750,000 in the camp and equipment, and last year operated on a budget of over \$100,000 supplied through assessing each Lion member in Texas \$3 per year, and through other endowments and gifts.

During winter months the camp is operated as the Texas Lions Camp for the adult blind as a training center to help make them able to get along with their handicaps.

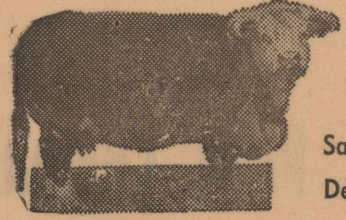

In view of these facts, the national "medicare" tax proposal (the King-Anderson bill, H.R. 1) is not needed. "Medicare" benefits are very limited, covering about one quar-

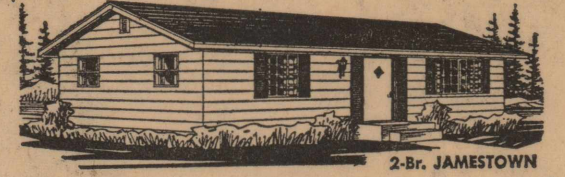
ter (25%) of the total yearly health care costs of the average aged person. "Medicare" would not cover physicians' services or surgical charges, nor would it cover the cost of drugs outside of institutional care.

The "medicare" proposal is an extremely expensive one. While we are starting to enjoy a reduction in federal income taxes as a result of action by Congress last year, the "medicare" program would cost an estimated \$1.7 billion dollars in additional taxes the first year. "Medicare" would increase payroll taxes to cover everyone over 65—even the wealthy. The employee who now pays a maximum tax of \$174 annually would find the amount for Social Security benefits and "medicare" increased to \$291 by 1971. Employers would pay a similar increase for each employee, thus resulting in higher prices for goods and services.

The Texas approach of providing medical, surgical and hospital care to those who need it is a more comprehensive, more economical program than "medicare," and it provides more benefits. If you object to paying higher payroll taxes for an undesirable, unneeded program, write your Congressman today. Ask him to oppose the "medicare" tax proposal, mentioning the programs for the aged now available in Texas. Ask him to support the Herlong-Curtis ElderCare Bill (H.R. 3727), which would make possible the broadening of the existing Texas program to provide medical, hospital and nursing home care for those few remaining aged who are still in need of help.

Registration will begin at 7:30 a.m. at Brady High School, committee meetings at 8:45, and general session at 11 a.m.

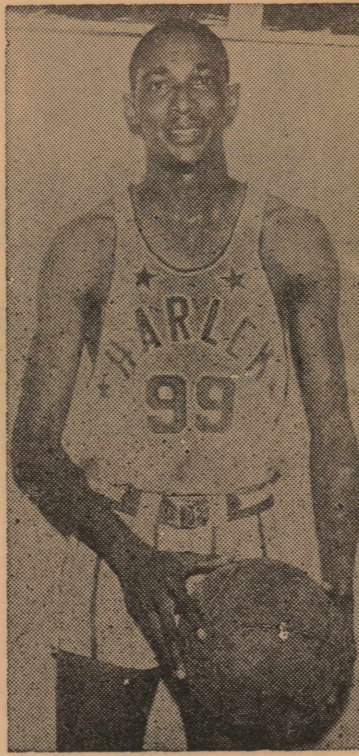
## Deadline Stalks Owners of Autos
