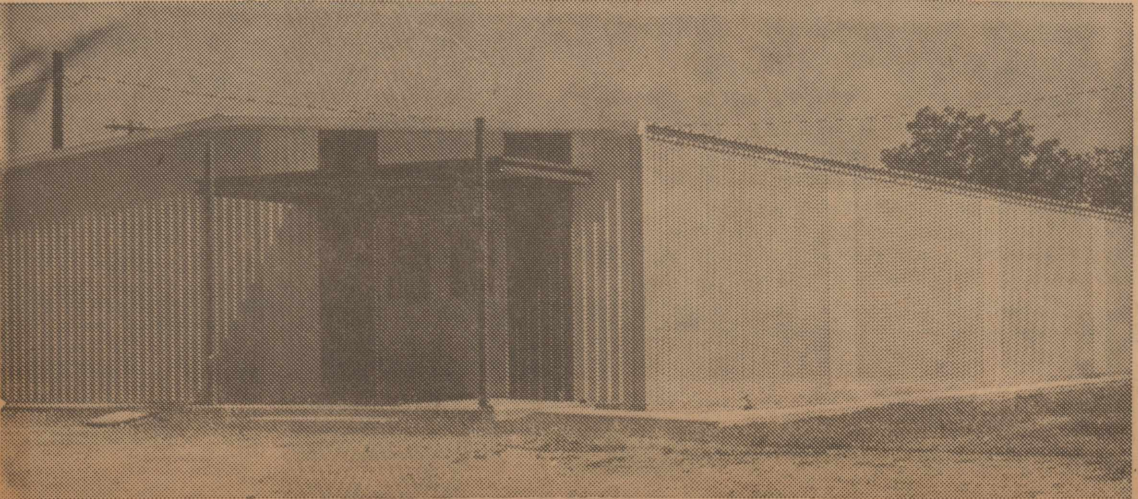

## Mr. Sunshine Bars Wins WT Quarter Horse Futurity

Mr. Sunshine Bars, owned and trained by Luther Harnes, crossed the finish line first with a time of 17.25 seconds in the 330-yard West Texas Quarter Horse Futurity to win \$4,950. This was the featured race of the Sonora Spring Race Meet that ran for two weekends, April 24-25 and May 1-2. The seventh annual running of the 330-yard futurity was Saturday, May 1, and included a total purse of \$11,500.

A mare, Heart Flush, owned by Dreabon Copeland, nosed across second in the futurity to win \$2,178 and Reber, owned by Marburger and Taylor, finished third for a purse of \$1,782. The rest of the purse was divided among the other seven horses in the race.

Another high spot of the day was the 330-yard futurity consolation with a purse of \$800.

Peace Corps Test Scheduled May 8

An opportunity for Sonora area residents to test their aptitudes for Peace Corps service will come at 9 a.m. Saturday, May 8, at the Courthouse in Junction and the Federal Building in San Angelo.

The opportunity is the Peace Corps Placement test, which is not passed or failed. It measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language. If, for example, test scores indicate limited language acquiring ability, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking area. The test is used by the Peace Corps only as a tool in the matching of volunteers and jobs.

The Peace Corps Questionnaire is the most important indicator of an applicant's suitability for Peace Corps service. It must be filled out and brought to the exam unless previously submitted.

Applicants should plan on about one and a half hours at the testing center, unless they wish to take the Spanish or French language achievement test, which requires an additional hour.

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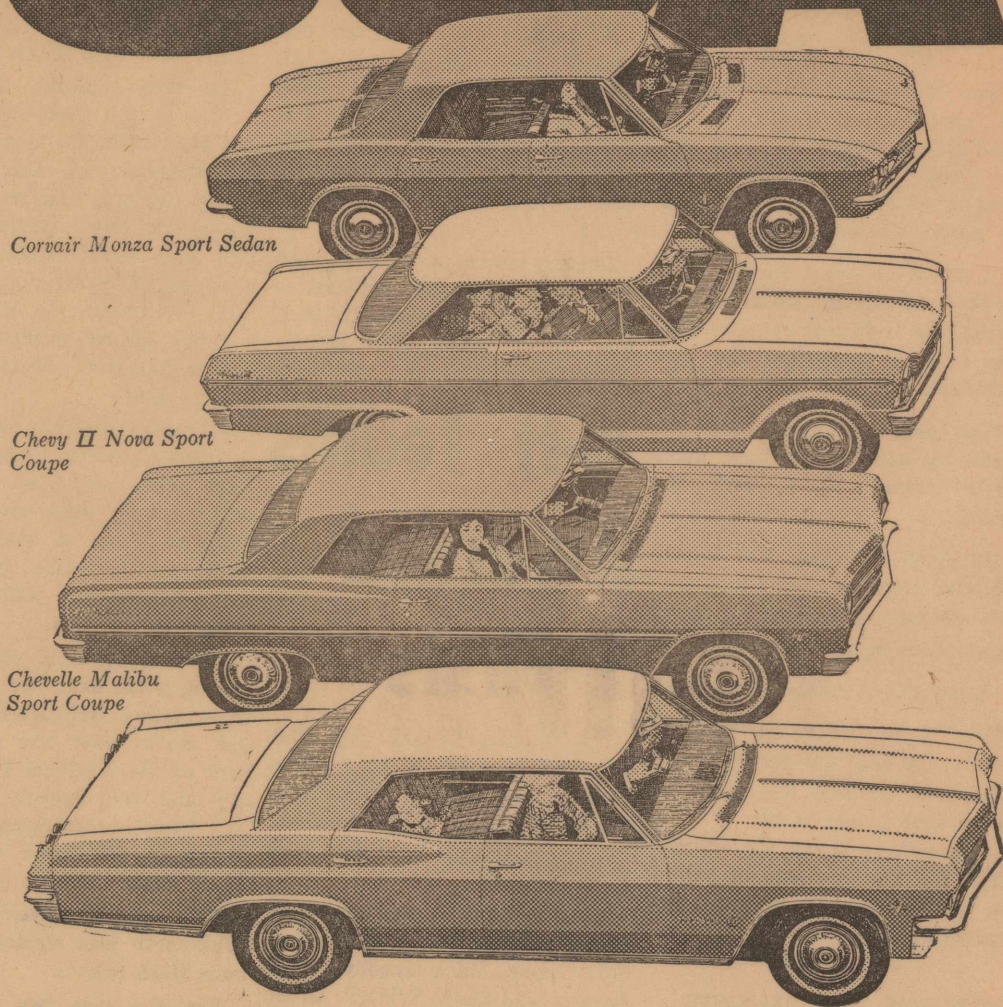
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### Elementary School Round Up Slated
