Picnic Time Treats

Brown hamburger and onions in hot fat in skillet. Add remaining ingredients. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, 20 to 30 minutes.

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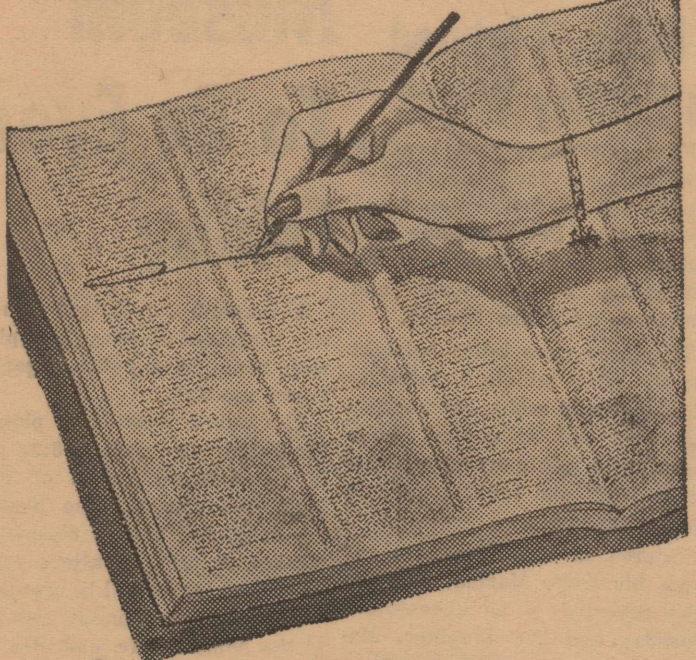
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HISTORY'S SCRAPBOOK

September 7, 1945
The number of farms and ranches in the County of Sutton, State of Texas, as shown by the preliminary count of returns of the 1945 Census of Agriculture was 171, as compared with 168 in 1940, and 168 in 1935.

September 13, 1935
Seven laborers, five days and an expenditure of about \$75 were combined by Alfred Schwiening recently to rid of milkweed 1,500 to 1,800 acres of his 10-mile ranch.

A service medal for outstanding work during the last year will be given J. T. Shurley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Shurley, in a public ceremony tomorrow night when he is made master counselor of the San Angelo DeMolay organization.

53 YEARS AGO
Hull Bros. at a depth of 161 feet got water for T. B. Adams on his home place on Concho Ave. Mr. Adams wants trees, grass, roses, shrubbery and a garden on his place.

B. M. Halbert and R. H. Martin returned from San Angelo Wednesday in Mr. Halbert's car. Latticed in the back seat of the car were three Angora billies from U. S. Grant of Dallas, Ore. Rodeo Aids Prison Rehabilitation Work

For the nearly 13,000 inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections, the annual Texas Prison Rodeo held in the Huntsville prison stadium each Sunday in October is more than just a top-flight entertainment feature.

They know, also, that because of the rodeo, the Texas Department of Corrections is able to carry on a full scale rehabilitation program designed to help inmates prepare for the day when they will be either paroled or discharged from prison.

That is why they work doubly hard to make certain that the Prison Rodeo will always be the type of entertainment which will attract record crowds at each performance.

The 1965 Prison Rodeo series, in addition to highlighting the best inmate talent in rodeo contests and entertainment, will also feature the nation's foremost television and recording stars.

On October 3, Tennessee Ernie Ford will be guest star, followed by Dizzy Dean on October 10; Roger Miller on October 17; Brenda Lee on October 24; and Jimmy Dean on October 31.

The 34th Annual Texas Prison Rodeo begins at 2 p.m. and lasts two hours. A special pre-show program by inmates begins at 1 p.m.

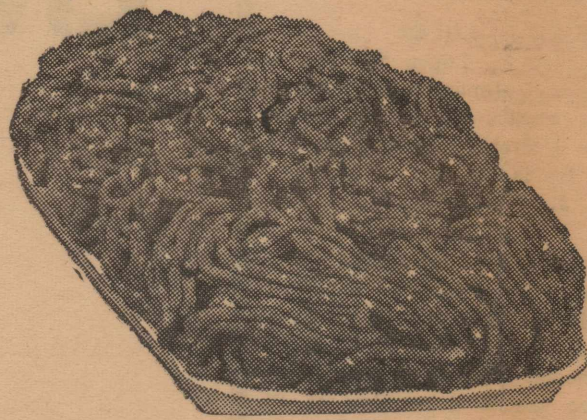
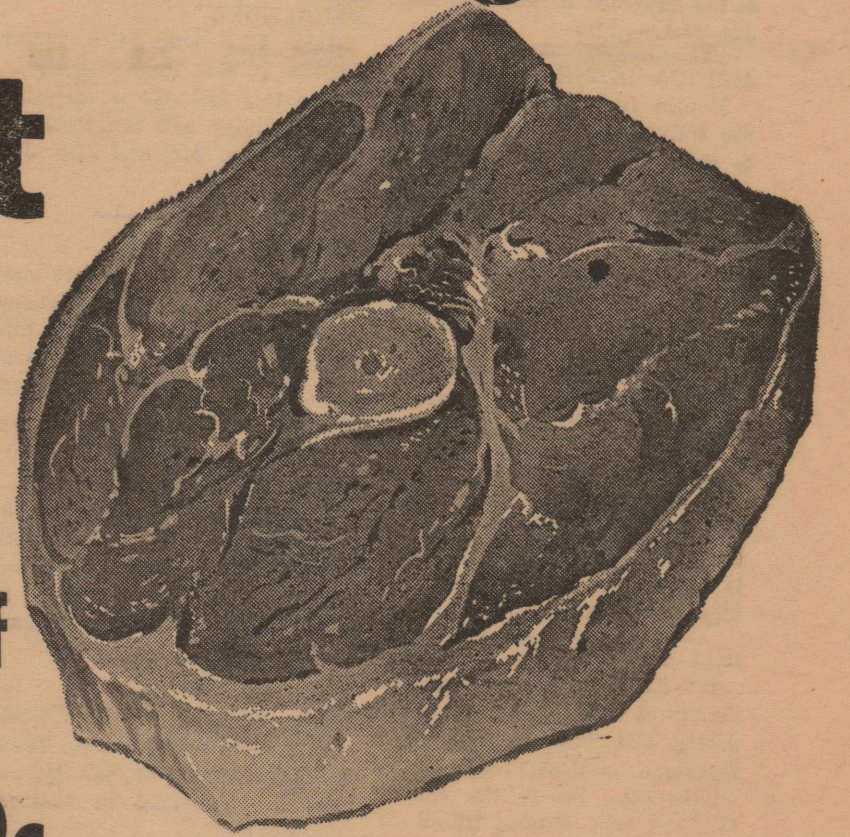

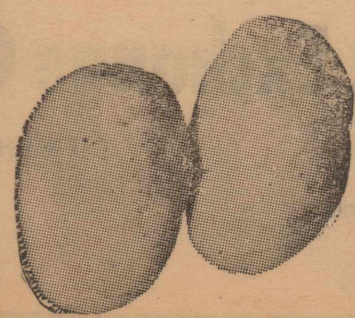

The Stanleys have one daughter, Shawna, who is eight months old.

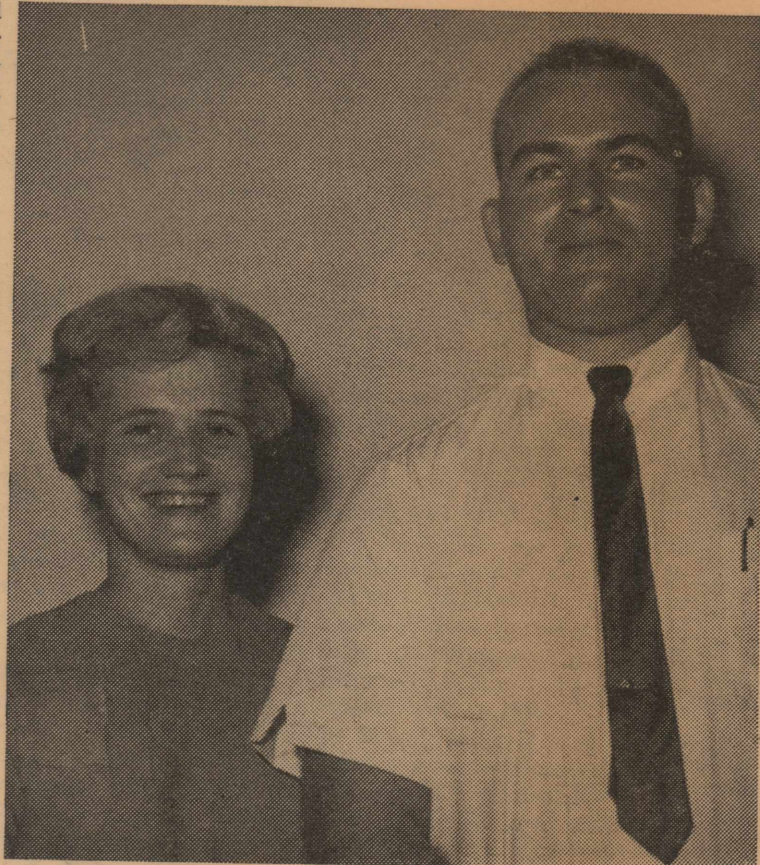

Askew Named to Importation Committee

Vestel Askew recently has been named by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White as a member of a fact-finding committee studying the effects of imported beef on the Texas livestock industry.

Askew is past president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. His selection was made at a general hearing in Austin August 31, called by a legislative resolution on the imported meat question.

"I am extremely pleased that Askew has agreed to serve on the committee in this capacity," said Commissioner White. "The livestock industry must prepare for any future marketing problems by keeping a close watch on import-export activities," he added.

The committee will meet at frequent intervals to prepare and maintain fact-finding studies. "We expect the committee to make recommendations for state and Federal legislation when necessary," White pointed out. He further stated that by laying the foundations for such action now, livestock producers have

the opportunity to direct their livestock marketing future by choice rather than leave it to chance.

Fred Wulff Jr. of Brady was named to head the executive committee. Gaylord Hankins of Rocksprings is first vice-president, Sam Rabb of Reagan is second vice-president, and secretary is David Witts of Dallas.

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Health Officials Exhort Vaccinations

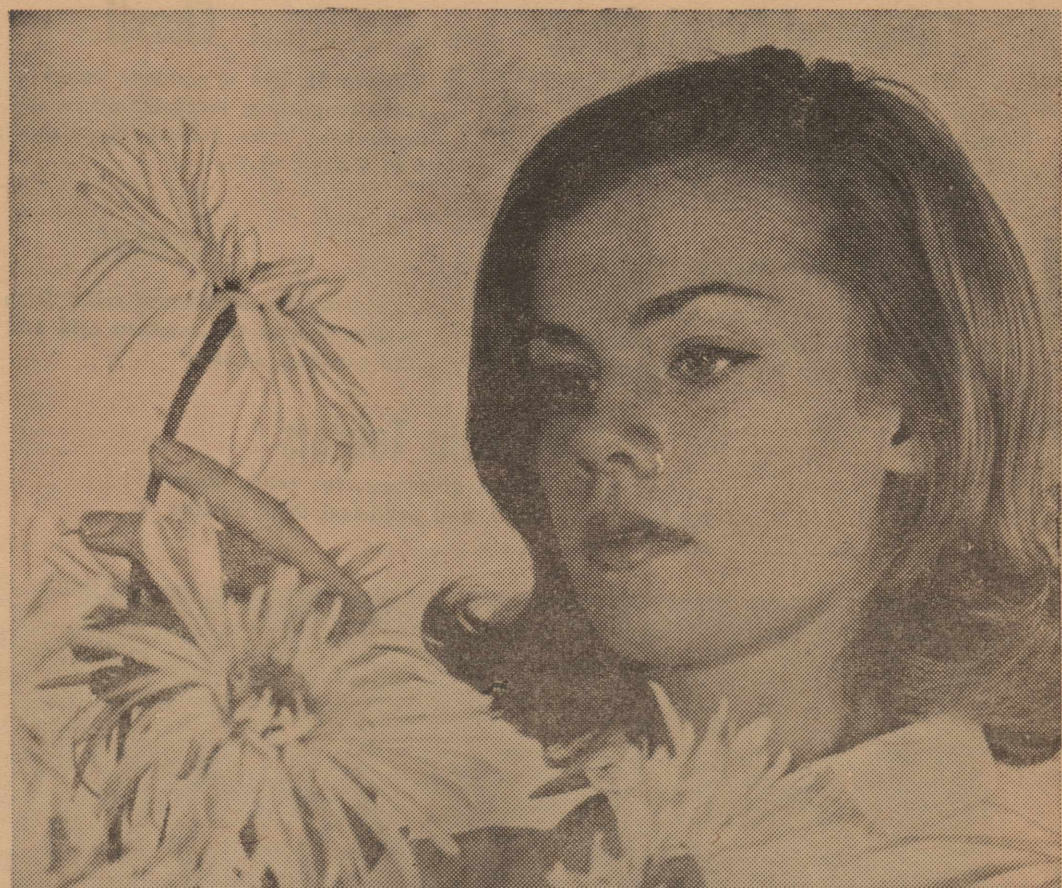
The Public Health Service Advisory Committee advises that now is the time to have a booster dose of influenza vaccine if individuals have been vaccinated since July 1963.

Individuals not vaccinated since 1963, the date of the last major change in the vaccine, should receive two doses of polyvalent vaccine two months apart, said health officials. The first dose should be given about September 1.

Persons of all ages with chronic debilitating disease, persons 45 years of age and older, pregnant women, patients in nursing homes, and chronic disease hospitals are especially urged to have their vaccination, added officials.
