

City to Begin **Fire Hydrant Repairs**

During the month of November 2006 the City of Sonora hired Clark Utility Service, a company that specializes in fire hydrant repairs and rehabilitation, to survey and evaluate the operability of the fire hydrants throughout the city. After the evaluation the fire hydrants were classified for repair as High Priority (24 hydrants), Medium Priority (31 hydrants) and Normal Maintenance (49 ydrants). The City has scheduled the High and Medium priority hydrants for repair.

Starting February 20, 2007 Clark Utility Service will be in Sonora to perform these repairs. It

Plane Crash Near Rocksprings Kills Two

Two men lost their lives last Friday evening when the Cessna 310 Q twin engine, eight passenger airplane they were traveling in crashed and burned near the Edwards County Airport. Pilot Richard Jordan of Houston and passenger Joseph Walter of Spring, were almost to their destination when tragedy struck. Jordan, 33 years old, was bringing Walter, 45, a bulldozer operator, to the airport where he was to leave with another employee of landowner Jerry Hix of the Houston area. Walter was coming to the area to help build an airstrip on Hix's property which lies northeast of Rocksprings. The plane was owned by Richard Rivera, Jr. and Sr. of Drilling Structures International of

way 55 South, in a pasture on the tion was completed around noon Wittenburg ranch. Adams said Kelly and Wes Wall of Rocksprings were traveling north toward town when they witnessed the crash. Wes said they could feel the heat of the explosion of the aircraft even though their vehicle was some 120 feet from the highway.

The employee of Hix that was waiting at the airport said the plane appeared from the east, traveled around the airport to the west side, then south and then was traveling north when it made a turn toward the high-

Department of Public Safety, Edwards County EMS and Volunteer Fire Department along with Edwards County law enforcement officers arrived quickly on the scence of the ac-

Edwards County Sheriff Don Letsinger said it appeared that the left wing of the craft hit the earth first, flipping it on its nose where both propellers were embedded in the ground. This part of the plane landed upside down of the fuselage. He also added that the victims suffered very serious head injuries and the plane apparently exploded in flames on impact with the

"The burn area covers about a 60-70 feet swath of land," said Deputy Adams. He also related that Edwards County law enforcement maintained security of the area through the week-

Do you want to ski or take pleasure rides or do you need something that does it all? Some boats only do one - like my Ranger Z19, which is designed specifically for serious fishing. Some have multiple functions. Also, where do you plan to do these activities? My tournament schedule calls for fishing a lot of southern lakes with lots of trees and boat docks to maneuver around, so I went with the 19-foot Ranger. Anglers on the Great Lakes would be better served with a 21-footer. Also, do you plan to use your boat in fresh or saltwater? Most boat are not designed to do both and you can easily ruin a freshwater boat in saltwater.

Once you know where you're going and what you're doing, you need to know how many people are going with you. That helps you determine what size boat you need. Are you taking yourself and a friend or the whole family? Size also determines how much gear you can haul and what kind of conditions the boat is designed for. Once you know how big your boat will be, you can determine what kind of vehicle you need to haul it. Remember: the bigger the boat, the bigger the tow vehicle. Make sure you consult your vehicle's owner's manual for specific towing instructions.

One of the choices that many people struggle with is aluminum or fiberglass. In the past, aluminum boats have been cheaper, but with the rising cost of aluminum, these boats are every bit as expensive and sometimes even more so than a fiberglass boat. Also, an advantage of fiberglass over aluminum is the soundness of the construction. Because a fi-

The Home of the Intrepid

Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio is the most important military medical training and treatment facility in the world.

The Fort was built in 1875, but its roots date back to arrival of the first U.S. soldier in Texas in 1845. From 1910 until World War II, Fort Sam was the largest Army post in the continental U.S., and played a key role in the beginnings of military aviation.

Since the mid-1940s, Fort Sam has been the nucleus of U.S. Army medicine. The base spans 3,000 acres and employs more than 27,000 military and civilian personnel.

Now the Fort has a new distinction: It's the location for the world's most technologically advanced rehabilitation facility for American warriors wounded on duty, particularly in Iraq or Afghanistan.

These wounded men and women deserve the very best facilities, and the "Center for the Intrepid" certainly delivers. Last month, inspiring dedication ceremonies were held in San Antonio, officially opening a four-story, 65,000-square-foot rehabilitation facility adjacent to Brooke Army Medical Center.

It offers state-of-the-art physical and occupational therapy and psychological counseling resources to amputee and burn victims. Facilities include an indoor running track, a firing range, an Olympic-sized pool, a two-story climbing wall and other notable rehabilitation ben-

Modern technology is evident throughout. The Center's 'computer assisted rehabilitation environment," known as CAREN, is as advanced as any facility in the world. CAREN provides virtual landscapes that simulate everything from a city sidewalk to a peaceful lake. Rehabilitation patients use the unit duty to provide for our troops, to improve their gait and balancing skills.

Resources for the \$50 million facility came from the hearts and pockets of an estimated 600,000 Americans who donated anything from pennies to millions of dollars. The Center is the largest single private contribution to our nation's wounded By Senator military.

The fundraising campaign was led by philanthropist Arnold Fisher of New York and the Intrepid Fallen Heroes Fund. In addition, the Center opened along with two new 21-bedroom Fisher Houses, which provide temporary accommodations for visiting family members.

Earlier this month, I had the honor of visiting a number of our superb soldiers and marines, including some from Texas, who were wounded in Iraq or Afghanistan and are undergoing treatment at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. I was able to discuss career options and future plans with several patients and their families on the wards, and with men and women undergoing rehabilitation in the Physical and Occupational therapy clinics.

I was impressed with the optimism and spirit of these great Americans. Mass Transit in Texas

In the future, I would like to see a commuter train built between Austin and San Antonio that would allow Texans who live between these cities to more easily commute to their places of business.



The good moisture we've been blessed with this winter provides promise for spring Much growing conditions. better than this time last year. Ranchers wanting to improve rangeland condition may consider a seeding program during the next few weeks. Seeding forage-deficit ranges with desirable forage plants can make them productive again. Seeding is also necessary following rootplowing for brush control.

Range seeding is usually done in late winter or early spring. Since seeding is expensive and the risk of failure is always present, careful attention must be given to a number of factors. To begin, evaluate the quantity and distribution of desirable plants currently present. If desirable plants make up less than 10 to 15 percent of the vegetation, seeding is probably necessary. Ranges can be improved by grazing management and brush and weed control if desirable plants are uniformly distributed and make up more than 10



Texans, Tractors, And Cattle Invade The Capital March 2

Protesters tell Lawmakers: "Don't Tag Texas!"

Horses, cattle, llamas and their owners will parade up the center of downtown Austin to the Capitol on Texas Independence Day. Farmers in their tractors will escort the marchers as they tell Texas legislators: Don't Tag Texas. Freedom-loving Texans plan this protest because of two issues that threaten their way of life: the National Animal Identification System (NAIS) and the Trans-Texas Corridor (TTC).

NAIS is a corporate-agriculture plan being pushed by the federal government. The Texas Animal Health Commission currently has authority to make it mandatory at any time. If it does, then anyone who owns even one livestock animal - even just a chicken or a horse - will have to register their premises with the government, individually identify each animal, and report movements to a database. This massive government program will have an immediate impact on rural Texas, and will ultimately raise the cost

of food for everyone.

TTC is a plan for a privately-owned toll road, including vehicle lanes, railroad tracks, utilities, and pipelines, to run from Mexico to Oklahoma. "It's about revenue, not transportation," says David Stall, Founder of Corridor Watch. "Over one million acres of Texas land will be destroyed for the sake of a private company's profits." Hank Gilbert, the 2006 Democratic candidate for Texas Agriculture Commissioner, says, "The TTC stands to be the largest land-grab and eminent domain project in the history of this

Although disparate on the surface, the issues of the NAIS and the TTC share many common themes: the threat to rural Texas, the use of Radio Frequency Identification Devices (RFIDs) to track animals and people, the impact of large corporations on our government policymaking, and the loss of choices for every person.

'As goes Texas, so goes the rest of the country" is a common theme in national politics. Judith McGeary, founder of the Farm

and Ranch Freedom Alliance, says: "The NAIS and the TTC are national issues, with their hearts in Texas. We hope that the sight of a veritable Noah's Ark marching throughout Austin will re-connect Texas lawmakers to the people whose lives they are affecting, and bring the attention of the entire country

After the march up Congress Avenue, renown guitarist and freedom advocate Jimmie Vaughn will perform a song at the steps of the capitol.

Marchers will gather at the parking lot at 1st and Red River at 1:30 pm on Friday, March 2. They will walk and ride the 1½ miles up Congress Avenue to the Capitol. Animals and tractors will return to the parking lot, and the participants will be provided with shuttle service back to the Capitol. Speakers will start at 2:30 p.m. on the South steps of the Capitol. Retired Marine Corps Commandant to Keynote Nimitz Museum Ceremonies

Grand Re-Opening of the Admiral Nimitz Museum in Fredericksburg, Texas on February 25

General Michael W. Hagee, the 33rd Commandant of the United States Marine Corps, is slated to deliver the keynote remarks at the Grand Re-Opening of the Admiral Nimitz Museum in Fredericksburg, Texas on Sunday, February 25, 2007. Hagee will return to his hometown to honor another Fredericksburg native, Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, for whom the museum is named. Hagee retired in November 2006, after 42 years of service, the last four as the Corps' Commandant.

"I'm honored to be a part of the dedication ceremonies honoring not only Admiral Nimitz but all those who served with him in Pacific theater of the Second World War,' said Hagee. "As a young boy growing up in Fredericksburg, I was always interested in the stories about Nimitz, and of course, the

"steamboat hotel" was a landmark," con- a fountain area. tinued Hagee. Some 60 years after Nimitz left the Texas Hill Country for the US Naval Academy at Annapolis, Hagee followed. His own career began during the days of the Viet Nam conflict and concluded during the war in Iraq.

The Nimitz Museum, housed in the historic Nimitz Hotel Building, has been closed since 2004 for a three million dollar renovation. New exhibit areas on the first floor of the museum will be devoted to the early days of Fredericksburg and to Nimitz's life and career. Educational exhibits and offices will be on the second floor and the Admiral Nimitz Foundation Board Room will be on the third. The Grand Ballroom on the museum's first floor was restored to its original grandeur of the 1880s. Also included is a landscape and wayfinding project which adds additional outdoor seating, a gazebo and interpretive center, a garden setting and

Historically, the old Nimitz Hotel was the social and cultural center of the Hill Country from the mid-1880s until its closure as a hotel in the early 1960s. In 1964 a group of Fredericksburg residents bought the building with the idea of turning it into a museum to honor their hometown hero, Chester Nimitz. The Fleet Admiral agreed to lend his name to the museum so long as the goal of the museum would be to honor all who served with him in the Pacific theater of World War II. The museum had its original dedication and grand opening on the anniversary of the Admiral's birth the year after his death, February 24, 1967.

Forty years after the original dedication, the museum will be re-dedicated and take its place as the corner stone of the National Museum of the Pacific War.

and...oh, that's enough! Dr. James (Doc) Blakely, one of Texas' all-time great speakers, tells of a town's "big night of the month"--when the

Knights of Columbus and Masons have a joint meeting to swap secrets...

These thoughts in mind, we must forgive the 2,000 folks in Big Sandy for going plumb "bonkers" when TV cameras honed in with sideline shots of their beloved "favorite son." There he was, Lovie Smith, head coach of the Chicago Bears

One local put it well: "Why wouldn't we get excited when one of our boys makes it big? We're 'whooping it up' because it might be years before anyone else from Big Sandy takes a team to a world championship

Makes sense to me. So does Lovie's "remembering where he came from" stance. He wrote a letter to one of his years-ago teachers, greatly thrilling her. And he even remembered that

she spells "Patti" with an "i." Some 200 miles from Big Sandy is another East Texas hamlet where another man single-handedly put the town on the map. Back in the 50's, a boxer from Cut N' Shoot named Roy Harris brought celebrity to the town of some 200 people. It's grown by 7-8 people a year since then. Population is now around 900.

Yeah, ol' Roy was an East Texas slugger who challenged Floyd Patterson for the Heavy Weight Championship of the

World. And he might nigh won. Born in Cut N' Shoot, he's invested his life there. They named the post office for him, and he served as Montgomery County Clerk for 28 years. He earned a law degree and real estate license along the way....

Harris, now 70, contends that he "should have whupped him (Patterson).'

It was a magical time, back there in 1958, when a man caused the world to "take notice" of his little ol' home town. Visit there, and they still talk about him, working into the conversation how the community got its name. Perry cites growing economy in State of State all." address

AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry on Feb. 6 delivered the State of the State address to the state Legislature, exclaiming "Texas is perched at the forefront of a new era of prosperity."

Perry said the economy is

growing, tax collections are on the rise, frivolous lawsuits are down and so are the costs of insurance for homeowners and doctors. He also said teacher pay and student achievement have improved.

The pluses aside, Perry said nearly 4 million Texans are living in poverty, so during the next four years his goal will be to spread opportunity to more Texans "who are willing to take" personal responsibility for their

Perry indicated, nevertheless, that poverty is not necessarily tied to a lack of personal responsibility, saying the rising cost of health care is "one of the greatest obstacles to personal

prosperity.' "Of the 5 and one-half million uninsured Texans, 2 million are adults with incomes below 200 percent of the federal poverty level," Perry said. "Most are working Texans whose jobs offer health-care benefits they

So, Perry announced the launch of "Healthier Texas," his program to redirect unspent federal health-care dollars to a pool that would serve Texans. 200 percent below the federal poverty level.

Perry touched on other subjects, such as a Human papillomavirus vaccination program for girls entering sixth grade, his proposal to sell the state Lottery, and his plans to build coal-fueled power plants and a statewide matrix of toll roads.

Perry also talked about border security, literacy, prisons, and a get-tough stance with

er, women in the walking group had significantly less health problems than the non-walking group of women. The women in the walking group were walk-

ing seven miles more each week than those in the other group.

Only 2% of the walking group were diagnosed with heart disease, whereas almost 13% of the non-walkers had a diagnosis of heart disease. Walkers also had fewer hospitalizations, surgeries, and falls. Participating in the short-term walking program ten years earlier was the main difference between these two groups!

So, trying again is important. Studies have shown that walking with others and engaging in a program long enough to make walking a habit promotes success. Observers simply count the highest number of each species they see during an outing or a sitting, and enter their tally on the Great Backyard Bird Count web site at www.birdsource.org/gbbc.

"We are encouraging people to go outside and count birds for the first time this year," said Paul Green, Audubon's director of Citizen Science. "By submitting their counts online, birdwatchers can quickly see how the dots they put on the map form new patterns that tell new stories about the birds that share the world in which we live, including our own backyards and parks.'




