Edwards County Deputy Gets Jail Time For Shooting

San Antonio Express-News DEL RIO - A federal judge refused to re-

lease Edwards County Sheriff's Deputy Guillermo F. Hernandez on probation Monday, crushing the hopes of his family and more than 100 supporters from his hometown waiting outside the courthouse to welcome him home.

Instead, visiting U.S. District Judge Robert T. Dawson sentenced Hernandez, known as Gilmer, to a year and a day in jail for shooting nearly two years ago at a fleeing vehicle that was transporting undocumented immigrants through his hometown of Rocksprings.

Hernandez's case gained nationwide attention after a jury convicted him Dec. 1 of violating the civil rights of one of the passengers, who suffered minor facial injuries in the shooting.

"He was just doing his job," said his wife, Ashley, who broke down in tears following the judge's order. "Gilmer had faith in the law and they still do this."

Her mother, Rose Arredondo, fainted outside the courthouse, prompting officials to call an ambulance.

"It's wrong what they did to him." said his father, Joe Arredondo.

Supporters waited two hours outside the federal courthouse in Del Rio to learn Hernandez's fate. They had traveled 80 miles from Rocksprings, population 1,250, carrying signs saying, "Please Let Gilmer Come Home," "Protect Our Lawmen," and "Free Gilmer," which has become the community's rallying cry.

"I'm so appreciative of that," Parks said. "But as an advocate and friend of Gilmer's, I didn't want to see him spend any days in jail.'

Parks said he plans to appeal, arguing Hernandez is innocent because he didn't intend to hurt anyone when he shot at the fleeing Chevrolet Suburban.

'We're hopeful that the conviction will be overturned on appeal," said Paul Kamenar, senior executive counsel for the Washington Legal Foundation, which filed a brief late last week in support of Hernandez.

Kamenar said the sentence is just another "bad message" federal prosecutors are sending to the local law enforcement community in South Texas, adding many are still upset with U.S. Attorney Johnny Sutton's office for prosecuting U.S. Border Patrol agents Ignacio Ramos and Jose Alonso Compean for shooting a drug-smuggling suspect in the buttocks as he attempted to escape. Edwards County Sheriff Donald G. Letsinger

echoed that sentiment Monday.

"I'm sorry I lost a good deputy and a good man," Letsinger said. "These types of cases should ever be prosecuted.'

Prosecutors claimed Hernandez recklessly shot at the Suburban after the driver attempted to flee when Hernandez pulled the vehicle over late April 14, 2005, just north of Rocksprings. A bullet fragment, or some other type of debris, struck

The 25-year-old former deputy has been held in a Val Verde County jail without bond since he was convicted.

Gilmer Hernandez's wife said she would continue to fight for her husband's freedom and will remind their 7-month-old daughter, Alektra, that her dad will one day be home.

While Hernandez's family expressed shock and outrage at the sentence, attorneys involved in the case offered mixed emotions.

Defense attorney Jimmy Parks Jr. said although Dawson denied pleas for probation, the wife said. judge did deviate from federal sentencing guidelines that made the former deputy eligible for up to nine years in prison.

"The law says you cannot use deadly force to stop a car unless it poses an imminent threat to the officer or another person. If the car is going away from you, it's not even a close call," assistant U.S Attorney Bill Baumann previously had said.

Hernandez's attorneys argued the deputy was trying to protect himself, fearing the vehicle might turn on him.

Parks said Hernandez would get credit for the 110 days he has been in jail and is eligible to receive 54 days credit for good behavior.

April 18 is also fixed as the last day for filing objections to the plan.

Copies of the amended disclosure statement, the supplement, the amended plan, a ballot and a copy of the order were ordered to be mailed out to all creditors and parties-in-interest within 14 days after the entry of the order. The order was submitted on March 9.

A hearing on confirmation of the amended plan is set for 1:30 p.m. May 3 in both Lubbock and by video in San Angelo.



Ruth was born on February 1, 1912 in Mount Enterprise, TX, attended Jacksonville schools, including Lon Morris College, and graduated from Southwestern University in Georgetown, TX.

Able to sing, play the piano, and the organ. Ruth taught music and elementary classes, joined the Methodist church, was a 1933 charter member of the Sonora Music Club, and the third president.

At that time, married women were not allowed to teach in the public schools, so after a Methodist choir practice romance, and marrying rancher E.D. ASK THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY By Jo-Ann E. Palmer

Q. Do you have an obituary on George Wallis Stephenson?

"The Devil's River A. News," Friday, May 24, 1935: Funeral Sunday for G. W. Stephenson, here for many years, known by many as raiser of pure bred Angora goats and once Deputy Sheriff.

Death shortly after midnight Saturday claimed G. W. Stephenson, 77, another of the fast thinning group of ranchmen who knew Sutton County in the days before there were fences and the conveniences of living which have become common in the last quarter of the century.

Mr. Stephenson's death came after an illness of six months. At several times during that period he had been well enough to be downtown. His condition became critical Saturday morning about five at the home of his daughter Mrs. Rose Thorp, at whose home he died. He was a member of St. John's Episcopal Church.

Besides Mrs. Thorp he is survived by his son Guenard, Sonora business man and ranchman, and a son, Wirt, also a ranchman. A daughter, Mrs. R. H. Chalk of Del Rio, died in September of 1913.

Services were conducted at Mrs. Thorp's home Sunday afternoon by the Rev. W. S. Ezell, assisted by the Rev. Frank Nixon. Burial was in Sonora Cemetery in a grave which he had ordered dug and concrete lining built shortly after his wife's death in April, 1924. Pallbearers were: R. D. Trainer, J. D. Lowrey, Tom Sandherr, B. W. Hutcherson, Jack Wardlaw, J. W. Trainer, Ed Mayfield and Stanley Patton.

Mr. Stephenson's grandfather was a native of Louisiana and came to Texas in the days when it was a republic. Mr. Stephenson told of how his grandfather used to tell him of being a gunsmith with whom the peaceable Cherokee Indians dealt frequently.

It was in Chambers County on Texas' coastal plains, where his grandfather from Louisiana settled, that Mr. Stephenson was born Aug 8, 1857. He was educated there and lived in that section until he was thirty-nine when he moved to Bell County of which Belton is the county

Two years later, in 1898, he came to Sutton and settled on a 16 section ranch, eight miles northwest of Sonora, around which he built his ranch holdings, which at one time amounted to thirty-two sections, lying in Sutton and Schleicher coun-

Dealing chiefly in cattle at first, Mr. Stephenson's interests in later years were shifted to a large extent to the raising of sheep and pure bred Angora goats. His breeding stock was in demand by livestock men in many parts of the United States. He has been said to have been the first man to import South African billies as well as having been among the first to have erected wolf-proof woven wire fence in this section.

On the Stephenson land, thru which the original Old Spanish Trail was routed, was located the old Wall Well, known in early days as the only water between the Llano and the Pecos rivers. Travelers through the country stopped there for water for themselves and their livestock. Arrowheads and other articles found near the well indicate that it was at one time a favorite meeting place of the Indians.

In 1924 and 1925 all of his land except six sections was divided by Mr. Stephenson among his children.

During all his years, Mr. Stephenson was actively interested in the ranching and livestock industry. He was a member of the Angora Goat Raisers Association. From 1903 to 1907 he served Sutton County as a deputy sheriff from 1900 to 1902 was a county commissioner, aiding in directing the affairs of Sutton County citizens.

Our files indicate that his children: George Guenard Stephenson born 1886, married Ida Belle Henning in 1905 and died in 1952 in Florida and was buried in Sonora. Rose E. Stephenson born in 1888 married Luther

Roy Thorp in 1911 and died in 1970 and was buried in Sonora. Wirt Stephenson was born in 1891 and married Emma Seale; he died in Fort Worth in 1971 he is not listed as being buried in the Sonora Cemetery. Inez Stephenson was born in 1884 and married R. H. Chalk in 1904. She died in 1913 in Del Rio and was buried in Sonora.

Extra little facts are that Ida Bell Henning was the daughter of T. W. Henning of San Angelo who died in 1930. Her sister Maude married Edward Cauthorn. I think this catches anyone up on information in our files on Stephenson.

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





Growing Tomatoes - No Quick Gardening Task

Well, Spring is finally here. It conjures up thoughts of gardening. To many, gardening means growing tomatoes. Growing tomatoes in the backyard can be rewarding or it can be very frustrating. A sickly tomato plant which produces few, if any, fruit certainly doesn't boost anyone's gardening enthusiasm. For those growing tomatoes for the first time, some simple advice might help avoid common pitfalls.

First, select an area that receives sunlight for at least six hours a day. Otherwise, tomato plants simply will not produce maximum yields. Second, good soil is essential for good growth and high yields. Often, poor soil can be improved with liberal amounts of organic matter and by proper fertilization. Soil can be improved by working in 3 to 4 inches of decomposed organic matter where the tomatoes are to be planted.

feet square should be prepared for each plant. The soil should be worked to a depth of at least 12 inches. Liberal amounts of organic matter and a small amount of fertilizer, such as 10-20-10 or 12-24-12, can be mixed into the soil where the plant is to be grown.

Variety selection is of utmost importance and is one of the keys to growing tomatoes successfully. Select varieties that resist many of the common diseases. Look for VFN after a variety name; this indicates that it has resistance to verticillium wilt, fusarium wilt, and nematodes. 'Bingo', 'Big Set', 'Celebrity', 'Floramerica', 'Spring Giant', 'Fantastic', 'Carnival', and 'Carmello' are top producers. Other old-time favorites such as 'Merced', 'Heatwave', 'Surefire', and 'SunMaster' may not be available anymore.

Plants can be started at home, although at this time in the season it is best to purchase transplants. Look for healthy, vigorous transplants. When the transplants are set in the garden, use a starter solution to assure adequate fertility during the early stages of growth.

If only a few tomato plants are to be grown, a space at least 2 Starter solutions can be purchased, or they can be made by mixing one tablespoon of a complete garden fertilizer in a gallon of water. One cup of the solution should be applied in the planting hole prior to planting.

For best results, the transplants should be set in the garden on cloudy days or late in the afternoon. The plants should be protected from adverse conditions such as high winds or cold temperatures for a week or so after transplanting. Cages, wrapped in row-cover fabric, can be used to control temperatures for a week or so after transplanting. Covering the plants with milk cartons also works well.

Almost all tomato varieties should be staked, trellised, or caged for best results. Any method is good if it keeps the fruit off the ground. Fruits allowed to contact the soil often develop fruit rot. People who would like to grow tomatoes but lack the space should try growing them in a five-gallon container. Mongolian Scientists Visit the Sonora Station

Imagine going back to the time of open range and high sheep prices. Sounds great, until you remember the generations since who have been trying to recover from the damaging impact that overgrazing had on our Western rangelands.

History is repeating itself in Mongolia. With a high demand for meat coming from China, and a family's value measured by the number of livestock they have, Monogolian scientists are fighting an uphill battle trying to implement practices to prevent the severe long-term consequences of overgrazing.

From ancient times the Mongols have herded five kinds of animals (sheep, goat, cattle/ yak, horse, and camel) in the severe Central Asian climate, have

herding families through economic, educational and agricultural programs.

The team was looking forward to visiting the Sonora Station on the Edwards Plateau even prior to their visit to the USA. "Travel to your place was very interesting for us and we learned a lot of challenging and totally new things about your special methods such as prescribed fire management. We were impressed with NIRS trials to identify [the] difference [s] of goats with high and low juniper intake.'

Information on resource conservation has been very limited in their country due to the isolationism brought on by communism. But as capitalism slowly spreads across their country, they are finally able to travel and

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
