



They called it "Blue Christmas" at Arborlawn United Methodist Church in Fort Worth the other night. Narrator/soloist Deb Sewell organized the mostly-musical program, offered for the community's "whosoevers"--the ones keenly feeling the loss of

loved ones, or other cuts from life's jagged edges.

More than 100 people gathered for the balm of song and Christian testimony, the latter provided by Yvonne Harpole, who was widowed in the fall of 2006. That's when James Harpole, who had held emphysema at bay for six years, succumbed, ending a marriage of 51 years....

At the lectern, Yvonne exercised her right to claim "selective

And why not? In the great sea of memories, the precious ones serve us best, even when we have to reach for them.

Several in the audience remembered her husband well. The "tenacious tenor" had inspired fellow choir members by the spirited way he kept pace--sometimes even running ahead--despite the encumbrance of oxygen tanks....

Two of Yvonne's most precious memories center on her hus band's renditions of "The Lord's Prayer." Both were sung to her exactly 50 years apart--the first time at their wedding in Gainesville, their hometown--and the next time in Fort Worth.

She planned the wedding, but it was James who insisted on the

ws renewal ceremony on August 5, 2005.

About 300 friends gathered for the ceremony; all were touched; particularly by "The Lord's Prayer." It was sung far differently this time. As James proceeded, he sang faster and faster. Organist Jerry, Westenkuhler could hardly keep up....

It was an emotional time, causing above average oxygen consumption. "I'm the one who knew how much oxygen I had left, so I sang fast," James laughed.

So did the on-lookers, each of whom had special memories of the veteran choir member. At one time, the choir had just seven members, including James on oxygen and another member on a cane. "Excuses others might have made came across as pretty lame,"

Director Tom Stoker recalls....

James wanted no special treatment, at work, at home or at church. He had breathing contraptions under his desk at Bell Helicopter Textron, a portable unit for his van and another at home.

For walking, he had a tank on rollers. That's the one he pulled behind him as they marched down the aisle to take their places in the choir loft. He never missed rehearsals or any choir presentations. And when they were on tour, he and Yvonne were in a van behind the bus. Safety precautions precluded compressed oxygen on the

"He just never went half-speed," Stoker said. "James was the 'life of the party,' always pushing tempos, giving the rest of us plenty of reasons to laugh. He made choir fun," the director added, "And when others saw the way he handled adversity, the choir started growing. Now there are about 70 members.'

In everything, the plucky tenor persevered. One day, Stoker saw Harpole laboriously mounting a stairwell, taking a step, then lifting the tank. He raced over to help, but James objected.


"Look, I have a selfish interest," Stoker said. "I'm counting on you having enough breath to sing when we get to the next floor!..."

In the early days of 2006, things got tough. Four days into the year, James could no longer work. A few months later, this man of music made one of his toughest decisions: to drop out of choir, James, a member of the One O'Clock Lab band while in ich early and the country of North Texas State, made great claims on music. Rich with a wife, three children and seven grandchildren, he crowded much into 73 years, depending on love and laughter for the harmony of life. He died on September 17, 2006, fully expecting Yvonne and others who loved him most to continue claims on smile-inducing memories.

Q. How do you know who owned your property back through the years?

A. Deed Records would be my first try. A Deed Record at the Sutton County Courthouse Annex will tell you when the person who transferred the property to you bought the property, and from whom. You then must trace it back. I recommend that people buying property have a title search done by the Sonora Abstract Office at the time of purchase. This will give you all the owners, back to when the title was first transferred. This saves a lot of time and research.

Speaking of land transfers, here is one article we found in 'The Devil's River News" of December 10, 1937: New Owners of Land and Two Residences. W.S. Evans place and that of Mrs. Rose Thorp sold. Deed recordings in the office of J.D. Lowrey, county clerk, have told recently of the transfer of two acres of land by Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Eaton, purchase of a residence by Mr. and Mrs. W.E. James, and the buying of a house by Mr. and Mrs. C.P. Alfrey.

The Eaton transfer was of property one-half mile east former owner of the water system serving Sonora.

The James purchase was of a four-room house on a 100 x 200-foot lot about onehalf block east of the J.D. Lowrey residence. The property, which extends back to a tract owned by Mr. Lowrey, is to be remodeled in the next thirty days and after that time will be occupied by the James family.

The country was in a Some people survived on as little as \$10 to \$15 a week on what they could hunt, and beans and greens they could grow. These were hard times, and things were beginning to get brighter with the war manufacturing companies hiring people to make items to send overseas. Just think how much of the steel rails from old railroads was shipped to Japan at this time, for their war with China, and wound up made into bullets that were fired at our own men at Pearl Harbor. Metal scrap, hides of animals for shoes and coats, wool and cotton for uniforms, beef, lamb, pork, etc. were starting to bring top dollar because of the war. The economy was just starting to pick up, and drilling for oil was becoming popular in Sutton County.






Three physicians to serve **Sonora Medical Clinic**

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



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

TDA Market Recap

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Agricultural Census Underway Making Your Information Count

For many people, counting sheep is a sure-fire way of getting to sleep. However, for the U.S. Department of Agriculture, sheep – as well as cattle, horses, ostriches and acres of cotton, rice, grapes and citrus – are just some of the many items the agency will count for a complete look of Texas for the 2007 Census of Agriculture.

We can be proud Texas has one of the most diverse agricultural industries in the world, and the Census of Agriculture is an excellent opportunity for us to showcase the incredible array of commodities coming from our fields, pastures, orchards, vineyards and rangelands.

That's why it's important for everyone who receives a Census questionnaire to complete it and mail it in by the Feb. 4, 2008, deadline. Taking time to complete the questionnaire not only gives you the opportunity to provide a complete picture of Texas agriculture, but also to help shape the way agricultural policies can meet your changing needs. The Census is your voice in Texas, and you need

Federal lawmakers use Census data when developing agricultural and rural programs, and community planners rely on the information to determine local programs and services. Private companies also use Census data to decide where to locate operations.

The Texas Field Office of the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service conducts the Census in the Lone Star State every five years. Questionnaires will be mailed the last week in December and should be returned in the envelope provided. You also will be able to complete the questionnaire online through a secure Web site.

U.S. law requires a response from all producers who receive a Census questionnaire, even if you did not operate a farm or ranch in 2007. This same law also guarantees strict confidentiality of your information, which is not shared with any other state or federal

Concho Valley COG Offers Help to Homebuyers

First-time homebuyers can get a 4% down payment assistance grant and a very low 5.99% mortgage rate through a bond program issued by the Concho Valley Housing Finance Corporation. With a 5.99% 30year fixed rate mortgage, there is over \$6 million in funds remaining in the program to help borrowers purchase their first home. Homebuyers have access to mortgage loans (FHA, VA, RHS, and Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae eligible conventional) that also provide a grant for down payment and closing cost assistance equal to 4% of the original loan amount through the following counties; Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton and Tom Green, (including the City of San Angelo).

"This program provides mortgage loans

payment assistance grant to families who might otherwise be unable to afford a home," said Albert Rodriguez of the Concho Valley Council of Governments and secretary of the HFC. "For example, a first-time buyer who received a \$100,000 loan would receive an additional \$4,000 grant which could be used for down payment and closing costs."

"The largest barrier to home ownership many families face is a lack of a downpayment," said Mr. Rodriguez. "We want to continue our long-standing support and encouragement of home ownership by providing a way for families to achieve and afford the American dream of owning their own

Income limitations for the program include annual family income not to exceed \$52,600 for families of two or fewer persons at a very attractive interest rate with a down and \$60,490 for families of three or more.

The maximum home cost under the program is \$237,031. Eligible prospective homebuyers cannot have owned a home in the last three years, except for qualified Veterans and those purchasing a home in certain targeted areas. Higher income and purchase price limits are also available in those targeted areas. Interested potential homebuyers may contact any of the three participating mortgage lenders under the program: Countrywide Home Loans, Dona Paul (325) 223-5101; Crockett National Bank/Premier Nationwide Lending, Valerie Allison, (325) 658-6714; or San Angelo National bank, Wes Masters, (325) 659-5850.

The Day After Christmas



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

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
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Judge Encourages Sonora Students to Learn and Know Rights



Judge Gomez, who graduated from Sonora High School, Judge Gomez, who graduated from Sonora High School, told the students that knowledge is their greatest asset. "Knowledge of your constitutional rights protects all citizens in this country," Gomez said. "This is a country of laws. The Bill of Rights was developed by people who chose to create laws for their new country that were far different from those in the countries they had left."

Judge Gomez was on hand to discuss the role of attorneys and judges before an assembled eighth grade that had performed mock trials - complete with defendants, attorneys, a jury and a judge. He told the gathering that, as a criminal defense attorney, his duty was to serve as an advocate for the

defense attorney, his duty was to serve as an advocate for the person accused of a crime. In his present capacity as a state udge, his job, he said, is to be an advocate for justice and

The judge recounted some of his experiences as a law student and as a criminal defense attorney and compared those experiences with his duty as a state judge. He discussed the importance of an impartial jurist and the traditions of "the bar" with students, who asked questions about the traditions of the practice of law in the United States.

Several students voiced the desire to become attorneys and Judge Gomez told the gathering that a Sonora attorney helped him get his start. He also said he would be happy to help any of the assembled students if they choose to go to

Judge Gomez was elected in 2006 to the 112th district bench to replace Brock Jones, who retired from that seat after nearly 30 years. The 112th District is a huge geographic area of West Texas. His district covers 11,500 square miles and extends from Sonora in the east, through Ozona, Big Lake, Rankin and Fort Stockton on its western edge. "Any felony that happens in this area of Texas is dealt with in my court," he told the students.



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
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
