





Life suddenly became about the little things, the little joys that came from the community support around her. Linda underwent chemotherapy and radiation for a year after that. Throughout, she and her husband Preston were sustained by cards and by little acts of love from the people of Sonora. Even now, fourteen years later, Linda could vividly recall certain acts of kindness that helped her through that dark time.

For Linda, her battle with breast cancer made her realize how "wrapped up" she had been in her "world on Interstate 10," and that she had not realized how much the community's love and support meant to others during their times of pain and suffering. Before, she, like so many others, always thought, "Other people will be taking food," or "Lots of other people are probably helping them." Linda recalls that she never even thought that anything she did would have mattered - she was

busy enough as it was. Things have changed since her cancer diagnosis - everything has changed. Her focus has shifted from running the steakhouse to truly serving others, in whatever capacity that may be. However horrible cancer is, for Linda it was almost a blessing in disguise. She is truly grateful for the second chance she has been given, and believes that she is still here because God is not finished with her yet. Relay for Life is scheduled for May 9-10 this year at Bronco Football Stadium. All Sutton County cancer survivors are encouraged to register with Relay for Life to be recognized at the event. 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

O. I am looking for information on M.F. Hamby and Nannie Hamby. They are supposed to be buried in the Sonora Cemetery. He died in Austin in 1937, and I think she died in 1931. Did they have any children? Nancy Hough - rockartgal2@earthlink.net

A. Marion Franklin Hamby was born on June 9, 1864 in Fayetteville, Arkansas, some say Austin, and died February 16, 1937 in Austin. He was buried in the Sonora Cemetery. His wife Nan Casey Hamby, the daughter of John Casey, was born December 5, 1858 in Alabama and died on a townsite and the city was February 14, 1931 in Sutton named Georgetown in his County.

Her obituary lists survivors as 7 children: J. S. Mc- ther on January 26, 1832 and Millon, Austin; Mrs. J. G. Baker, San Angelo; Mrs. Al Stockton, Menard; Mrs. Guy 1853 and then to Jeptha Bill-Landrum and Mrs. Gertrude ingsly in 1856, Joseph Abner Hart, California; John F. Joseph Glasscock was a teamster and used Longhorn steers and Spanish mules to pull his freight wagons. He hauled supplies to Ft. McKavett from San Antonio, Austin, Fredericksburg, Lampassas and Bastrop. The wagons usually traveled in convoys protected from Indians by a detachment of soldiers.

To the marriage of Joseph Abner Glasscock and Eliza Ruth Bowmer Glasscock 11 children were born. Two of the children died in infancy and one child, Lucien. B. Glasscock, died in Menard at the age of 16. The following children grew to adulthood in Menard and Sonora and many of their families still live in the area: Samuel Joseph Glasscock, born 1858, married Hannah Margaret King; Moses P. called "Mode" Glasscock, born 1877, married Annie E. Carruthers; William Andrew Glasscock, born 1861 died 1924, married Maturia A. White; Robert E. Glasscock, born 1864 died 1953, married Katie L. 

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

IRS Urges Taxpayers To e-file Extension Requests By April 15

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today urged taxpayers who need additional time to complete their tax returns to submit their requests for an automatic extension electronically by April 15. E-filing a request for an extension is convenient, safe and secure, and taxpayers receive confirmation to keep with their records.

The extension gives taxpayers until Oct. 15 to file the tax return. An extension does not give the taxpayer an extension of time to pay. Those who owe taxes can make a payment when they file the extension either by mailing a check or by several electronic payment methods, such as electronic funds withdrawals from bank accounts and credit card payments.

Some taxpayers can wait until after April 15 to file a return, pay any taxes due and make IRA contributions for 2007. As a general rule, those eligible get the extra time without having to ask for it. Eligible taxpayers include:

Members of the military serving in Iraq, Afghanistan or other combat zone localities. Normally, the postponement is until 180 days after the service member leaves the combat zone.

Disaster-area taxpayers in four states affected by recent floods, storms and tornadoes. The postponement is until May 6 in parts of Illinois, May 19 in parts of Georgia and parts of Missouri and May 27 in parts of Arkansas.

IRS expects to receive 10.3 million extension requests during 2008 compared with 10 million extensions received during 2007. The IRS expects to receive almost 2 million extension requests electronically this year.

Taxpayers can get an automatic six-month extension of time to file their tax returns by filing Form 4868, Automatic Extension of Time to File.

It is also important for extension filers to remember that Oct. 15 is not only the due date for their tax returns, it is also the last date on which a return can be filed that will result in an economic stimulus payment. Taxpayers who file earlier, however, will get their economic stimulus payments sooner.

Taxpayers can e-file the extension from a home computer or through a tax professional who uses e-file. Taxpayers can e-file their extensions at no cost. Some companies offer free e-filing of extensions through Free File; these companies are listed on IRS.gov.
