Sutton County has erected a temporary fence around Allison Park after water tests reported the presence of E. Coli.

The source of the contaminant is unknown, although officials from the County government stated that "credible information exists that raw sewage has been dumped. The park will remain closed until the source is identified and the contaminate is no longer detected. Anyone in Sutton County with concerns about the water quality in their wells can contact the Sutton County Underground Water District 387-2369 for free testing.



Haltom City-Gustavo (Gus) Hernandez, 63, went to be with the Lord on July 24, 2008. He was born to Santos and Oralia Hernandez on December 23, 1944, in Sonora, Texas.

He moved to Plainview at the age of 15 and graduated in 1966 from Plainview, Texas. Gus loved boxing. While in Plainview, he belonged to the seven-member team that competed in the State Golden Gloves Tournaments. He joined the U.S. Army, serving in Vietnam as a helicopter door gunner which earned him the Bronze Star among many other distinguished awards and medals. Returning from Vietnam, he moved to Fort Worth in 1970 and married Erma Rodriguez of Plainview. He continued his military career for 27 years in the U.S. Army Reserves and retired in 1999 from the 300th Aviation Company from the Naval Reserves Unit out of Grand Prairie. 

BLAST FROM THE PAST 1940s

The following letter was written by the editor of The Devil's River News to the Citizens of Sonora, June 14, 1940

Unfounded rumors, baseless in fact, are a source of discredit to the persons who start such statements, and an injury to whom they are aimed against. In these present times, when the feelings of the American citizens are wrought up and at a high pitch, and justly so, good judgment is often forsaken and tactics adopted which are dangerous, ill-advised and hurtful in the extreme.

It has been called to my attention that rumors such as these have been aimed against the management (meaning me) and other members of the staff of The Devil's River News. Specifically speaking, these rumors and false statements have been made for the purpose of leaving the impression with listeners that I, and others of The Devil's River News, are pro-Nazi in sympathies, and violently anti-Ally in our desires, simply because we have not been inclined to get out on the street corners and in the homes of our good friends and wave a flag of violent agitation against Hilter and his death-dealing hordes. We resent, with every fiber of our being, all such implications. The people of Sonora have become well acquainted with the Hix Hall family during the past six years or more that we have lived in your midst. We have always been as liberal in our efforts, so far as the community was concerned, as our condition and circumstances would permit. We hope we have never fallen short of the aims which every good citizen should have toward the community in which he lives. We have tried to conduct our private lives, and our business matters, in such a way that the people of the community could remember us as a decent citizens of the town, progressive in both our civic and business life.

To have such things said about me, and my family, and my office force, causes not only a deep sense of injury, but of downright anger at the unscrupulous person or persons who have been responsible for starting the rumors which have been noised abroad, and broadcast over the town by word of mouth, on the quiet, and accepted in many cases without investigation and without an opportunity being given to plead our side of the case. I was a World War soldier, serving 26 months in the army during the war, and in the Army of Occupation. I served as well and as faithfully as I could. I was given an honorable discharge from the army. I volunteered for service the 19th day of April, 1917, two weeks after this nation entered the war. Did any of my critics do likewise? What was your service? Since that time, my attitude has always been my own country first.

As regards the rumors circulating in this city—my home and your home—the least I can do is to brand them as false-hoods of the greatest degree—plain lies being circulated by possible enemies, of which every man has a few, and calculated to hurt me and my family, my business establishments and my associates. It is a rather despicable thing to do—have your acquaintances on the street make such an attempt to knife you in the back, and not having manhood to come out openly and make the charges, use such underhand tactics to injure the ones whom they feel they have reason to dislike. To those who have caused such rumors to be scattered over town, I would request that they display enough manhood to come to me personally and in full confidence of a just and patient hearing, and get my own personal and individual statements and opinions. I trust that this plain spoken statement will meet with the proper reception—for it is spoken in the kindliest manner, and with a desire from the deepest part of my heart that misunderstandings shall not arise, or I or anyone else, be injured because of the carelessly uttered rumors and statements of some unthinking person.

Present Banking System Result of Many Years of Planning, Hard Work

The Devil's River News October 25, 1940

New Bank Building Costs \$75,000

The most beautiful architectural edifice in Sutton County is the new bank building, which was erected in 1928 at a cost of \$75,000.

Built of Arkansas brick, the structure was erected after a building committee meeting October 14, 1927, gave the go-ahead signal in spite of the fact that some thousand dollars had just been spent on the original house.

Formal opening was held January 7, 1928.

Located on one of the main corners of the city, the structure is on the main thoroughfare of transcontinental travel across the southern states, the old Spanish Trail, and is viewed annually by thousands of tourists.

It faces 35 feet on the city's main street, siding 90 feet on the street next of importance. It consists of a basement, first floor, mezzanine floor, and a second floor for offices, practically making a four-story structure.

The building is not only fire-proof throughout, but has been modeled after the most up-to-date type of banking structure as is featured in so many of the Federal Reserve Bank buildings.

First Report Shows Resources

The first report to the Comptroller of the Currency on the condition of the First National Bank was made at the close of business on September 5, 1900, after the institution had been organized less than a month. Resources were shown to total \$88,128.87, with loans and discounts amounting to \$25,549.63.

United States bonds and premiums totaled \$13,000; the banking house, furniture and fixtures were valued at \$2,501.93, and cash on hand and in banks aggregated \$45,077.31.

Liabilities showed capital stock, paid in, to be \$50,000 undivided profits during the short time totaled \$366.94, deposits were \$37,717.24, and other liabilities totaled \$44.69.





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Meeting Livestock Water Needs

We know that hot, dry weather means sparse growth and dry vegetation. That means nutrition for livestock will be less than optimum. However, we rarely think about livestock water needs. Since our county relies on groundwater, we don't "feel" the added burden that occurs when creeks dry up. Our livestock water from wells with the aid of windmills or pumps. Nonetheless, I thought it would be interesting to discuss livestock water needs.

As you might guess, water requirements for livestock depend on weight, stage of production, and temperature. As weight increases, the amount of water needed also increases. The same holds true for temperature; as temperatures increase, so does water intake. Also, if the animal is lactating, water requirements are

For example, some rules of thumb on water intake for cattle are as follows: Daily water intake may vary from 3 to 30 gallons per day depending on age, body size (weight), stage of production and the environment (mainly air temperature). As a rule of thumb, consumption will range from 1 gallon per 100 pounds of body weight during cold weather to nearly 2 gallons per 100 pounds of body weight during the hottest weather. Lactating cows require nearly twice as much water as dry cows.

Sheep and goats are no different. Ewes and does require approximately 2.5 gallons of water per day. Lactating ewes and does, however, need about 3.5 gallons. Feeder lambs and kids will drink an estimated 2 gallons per day. It is worth noting that water intake will vary with environmental temperature and dryness of the feed. Animals eating lush growth on a cool spring day will drink much less water than animals grazing the same pasture in the middle of sum-

Newly arrived animals may refuse water at first due to differences in palatability. One must allow them to become accustomed to a new water supply. Intake should be monitored to be sure no signs of dehydration occur until animals show adjustment to the new water source. Signs of de-

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hydration or lack of water are tightening of the skin, loss of weight and drying of mucous membranes and eyes. Luckily our water quality is good and we are not concerned with factors such as salinity.

But, clean fresh water is important. All water troughs ought to be frequently cleaned. Livestock should never be forced to drink dirty or contaminated water. Stale water can cause a reduction in water consumption. If there is a question of water quality, it should be tested. This can be done locally by our water district (at no charge) or by sending a sample to a lab such as the Texas A&M Water Testing Laboratory (for a small fee). So as we wait for the next good rain, remember that water quality and that consumption affects production as much as nutrition does.


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



Different sources vary on the best way to hunt dove. Some hunt over fields of sunflower or agricultural crops. Others prefer to hunt at water sources such as dirt tanks, water troughs, or creeks. Both feeding and watering areas can make great shooting areas. The peaking timing of incoming birds will differ. Birds follow a pattern of feeding, then watering, then roosting. They do this in both the morning and the evening. During drier conditions, water sources can really concentrate birds. 




