animals be taught to eat from a feed trough before delivery. The rams will be treated against internal parasites and vaccinated against enterotoxemia immediately after arrival.

Rams should have at least one-half inch of wool at delivery.

A deposit of \$400 per ram is due upon arrival. Any unused funds will be returned when the test is over.

Rams will be shorn before going on the test on Sept. 23. The initial weigh-day is set for Sept. 24. Other weigh-days are Nov.12 and Jan. 7, 2009 with the final weigh-day on Feb.11, 2009. The final shearing is set for Feb. 12, 2009.

Waldron also encourages breeders to participate in an "on-the-ranch" performance test so more information can be gathered from more rams.






She was a homemaker by choice, a seamstress by talent, a rancher from pioneers but most of all wife, mother, grandmother, and great grandmother.

Mrs. McMillan, known to many of her friends as "Chicken," died August 18, 2008.



## Sonora Elementary Dress Code

## **Dress and Grooming**

The District's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with the following guidelines:

We expect students to come to school in clothes that are clean and neat, and we expect students to exhibit basic cleanliness and grooming that will not be a health or safety threat to themselves, other students, or staff. While we respect students' desire to express themselves in their clothing and grooming styles, we do not permit students to wear clothing with pictures, emblems, or writing that is lewd, offensive, vulgar, or obscene or that advertises or depicts tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance that students are prohibited from having or using at school. The principal makes decisions about dress and grooming violations.

General Guidelines:

· Be neat, clean, and well groomed

· All pants and shorts must be worn at the waist.

· All clothing will be the proper size for the student and must be gender appropriate.

• Hemmed shorts are permitted and may not be shorter than fingertip length in a normal standing position. • Shirt tails which extend beyond the palm of the hand while

in a normal standing position must be tucked in. • Special dress days may occasionally be declared with the principal's prior permission. When such days are held, rules that pertain to decency, modesty, and decorum must still be followed.

• Hair styles must be neat/well groomed and should not distract from the educational setting.

· Body piercing of any kind is prohibited, with the exception of traditional girl's earrings (lobe only)

• Tattoos must not be visible at any time while at school or at school sponsored activities on or off campus. This includes artificially induced scars produced to resemble or represent something else.

· Body markings of any kind, using pens or markers, is

· Contact lenses that are distracting (red, cat eye, etc.). **Inappropriate Garments:** 

· Shirts, blouses, or dresses with large neck or arm open-

· Shirts with objectionable lettering, drawings, or advertisements of alcohol, tobacco, etc. including pictures or symbols of groups or individuals representing deviant or

evil ideals. Athletic garments issued by school sports programs may not be worn to school.

• Muscle shirts, tank tops, or similar T-shirts. Plain white T-shirts may not be worn.

Overt baggy pants. Clothing that is torn or frayed.

· Caps or hats inside of the building

· Shirts and blouses that reveal abdominal skin when the arms are outstretched to shoulder height Girls:

• No sun dresses or blouses that are open below the bra line

in the front or in the back should be worn. Skirts or dresses may not be shorter than fingertip length

in a normal standing position. • Strapless clothing or clothing with spaghetti straps may not be worn. All straps must be at least two inches in width.

Hair coloring must be of natural color.

· Facial hair is not permitted and sideburns will not extend below the earlobe.

· Earrings are not permitted.

• Hair may be no longer than 2 inches below the bottom of the ear lobe, not below the collar, and when combed forward will not extend into the eyes. · No artificial hair coloring is allowed (frosting, streaking,

highlights, etc.). · Pony tails, braids, shaved head with bangs, shaggy or un-

kept hair will not be worn.


If your child comes to school wearing clothes that violate the dress code or in any other way violates our dress and grooming standards, s/he will be asked to call home and have the problem corrected. Any class time missed will result in an unexcused absence/tardy. A second offense will result in ISS until the issue is resolved. If the student changes clothes or otherwise comes into compliance with the dress and grooming standards, s/he will return to regular classes immediately.

The dress code will be enforced at all Sonora ISD functions, including out of town activities.



Stink bugs and weevil can cause August drop. Stink bugs that feed on pecans before shell hardening cause injury termed "black pit" that leads to nut abscission. In nuts with black pit, the interior is decayed and black in color. Species that feed on nuts after shell hardening damage the kernel but rarely cause abscission. This damage is termed kernel spot. The kernel spots are variable in size, sunken and bitter to taste. Kernel spot lowers nut quality and is undetectable until shelling.

Some insecticides such as gamma - cyhalothrin are labeled for stink bugs, hickory shuckworm, pecan weevil, pecan casebearer, spittle bug, pecan aphid species and pecan phylloxera. The pre harvest interval is around 14 days. For a complete list of insecticides or more information, contact the Sutton County Extension Office.



# Water District Receives Funds

The Sutton County Water District recently received \$1,158 to plug an abandoned water well located on an area ranch. Funding was provided through the innovational approach to resolve enforcement actions accessed by Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). The Supplemental Environmental Program (SEP) policy provides an alternative payment of amount of an administrative penalty incurred by a local entity to be used for improving environmental quality. A respondent in an enforcement action may negotiate an agreement to perform a SEP contract in return for a reduction in administrative penalty.

Plugging this well will prevent contamination of the drinking water supply of residents in Sutton County.

Local coordination for the well plugging was conducted by Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District and Concho Valley Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Area. Please contact the Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District at 325/387-2369 to report abandoned water wells.
