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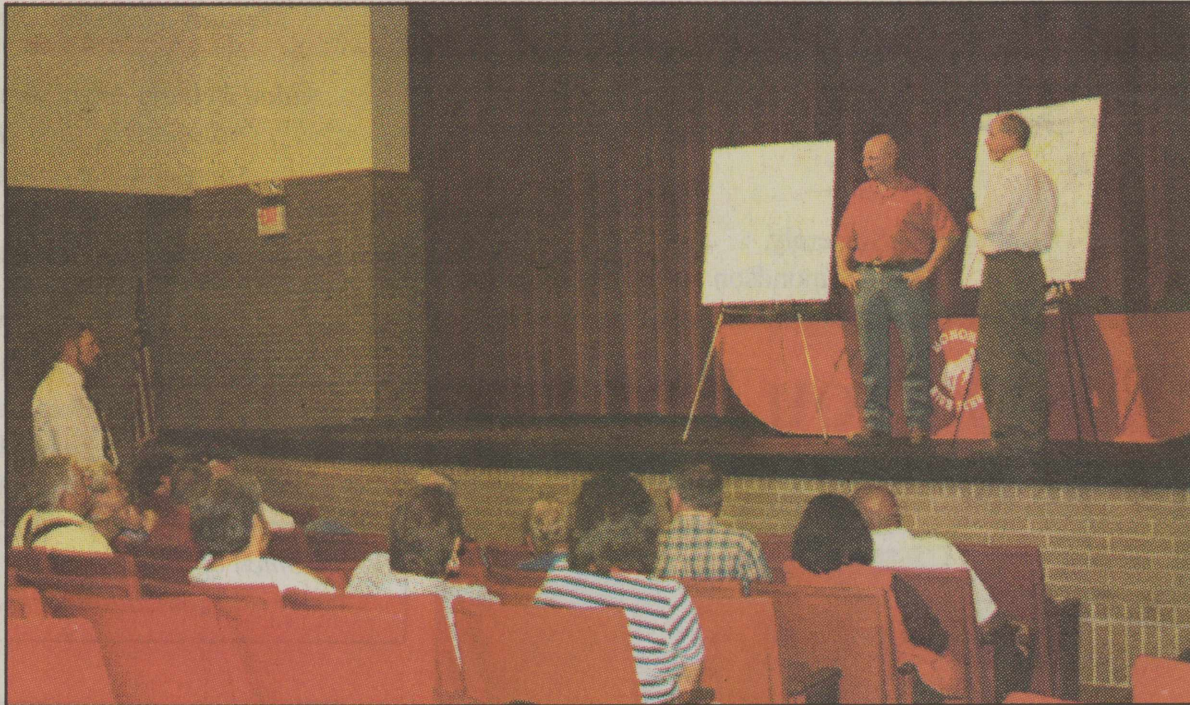

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## Engineers Discuss Infrastructure Plan Construction Begins This Summer

On March 26, 2009 a special session of the City Council meeting was held at the High School Auditorium to discuss the city water and sewer infrastructure upgrades. All council members were present along with over 30 community members to listen to a presentation by Engineers responsible for implementing the upgrades. David Todd of Enprotec/Hibbs & Todd presented the majority of the plans and schedules.

Todd opened his presenta-

tion by stating that, "the city is going to undertake a considerable water and sewer reconstruction program starting probably by the end of the summer". Engineers and city officials decided the most effective strategy (in terms of cost and performance) is to upgrade the current water and sewer system instead of constructing a new one. The reconstruction of sewer lines includes replacement of lines with a technique called "pipe bursting". This technique will

use the existing infrastructure, but will result in the installation of new pipes as Todd commented, "a pipe bursting head will be run through the existing pipes allowing us then to run new pipe in behind it". He assured people in attendance that the areas being worked on will be out of service no more than a day at a time, and added that there will be a solid line of communication with the community to inform them of possible outages ahead of time.

The water line replacement will consist of digging lines next to existing ones and laying down replacement pipe. Todd fielded a question from a concerned business person regarding the steps that are being taken to minimize the effects of possible water outages to Sonora businesses, "the water should not be shut off. If it is then we will give plenty of notice in advance, the contractor and city will combine efforts to notify citizens". Additional concerns to safety were brought up, specifically with regards to the replacement of water lines that have proximity to gas lines. Todd commented that, "during the design process we collect all the information from utility companies to follow in the design process, but any safety concerns were ultimately the responsibility of the contractor".

This project (upgrades are mandated by the state) has been funded through a nine million dollar loan from the State Water Development Board. Todd commented that the planned upgrades to our sewer and water infrastructure, "is just the beginning of a long chore. The current project consists of renovations of 75% of our sewer and 25% of our water lines". He added

that, "there is no guarantee that the project will be completed with the nine million". He stated that the two largest factors determining the success of this project within the proposed budget will depend on the economy, and results of further evaluations of the sewer and water lines. A community member then asked, "If nine million doesn't cover the repairs, then are we still out of compliance with the state?"

Both City Manager Dean Carrell and Todd answered, "That's a hard one to answer. We have sent in an application for 5 million extra, but we are under no obligation to take the extra funds if they are offered. We just wanted to make sure we have the money if we need it". Carrell then stressed the importance of upgrading our water and sewer systems now before the government steps in. "We are in control of what we do now, but if we don't get things fixed the state will be in charge".

Comments from the audience indicated an understanding of the need of this upgrade, but concerns arose regarding how this would affect the current water and sewer rates of Sonora residents. City Secretary Patti Prather stated that

Edmondson cited his family as his main driving force for staying active in the Scouts, "I have always been a big fan of the outdoors, but I really stayed with the Scouts because a lot of my family were Eagle Scouts. and kept driving me to go further. ## Sonora Elementary Pre-Kindergarten Registration Dates

Pre-registration for the 2009-2010 school year will be held on Tuesday, April 14th and Wednesday, April 15th from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Sonora Elementary School office. Students enrolling in Pre-Kindergarten must be three or four years old on or before September 1, 2009.

Students who are three years of age on or before September 1, 2009 must meet one of the following qualification requirements: 1) economically disadvantaged, 2) limited English proficient, 3) qualify for special education services, or 4) have a parent who is an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States including the state military forces or a reserve component of the armed forces or a parent who was injured or killed while serving on active duty.

Students four years of age on or before September 1, 2009 do not have to qualify for Pre-Kindergarten as our enrollment is open. Class size, however, will be limited and classes will be filled on a first come first serve basis.

You must provide a copy of your child's birth certificate, social security card, and current immunization record. Your child will not be placed in a class until immunizations are current and proof is provided.

Please make every effort to register on these dates as this will help us plan for the 2009-2010 school year. Call 387-6951 if you have any questions.

guess I stayed in to emulate their achievements". In order to reach the level of Eagle Scout Tyler had to earn over 20 merit badges (a three year investment), attend summer camps, serve in a role of responsibility, and develop a service project designed to benefit the community.

The city council will vote to adjust the rates on an annual basis, and that rate is population dependant (meaning that if the city population increases the rate decreases and visa versa). 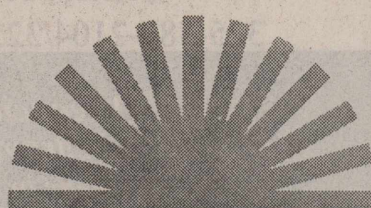

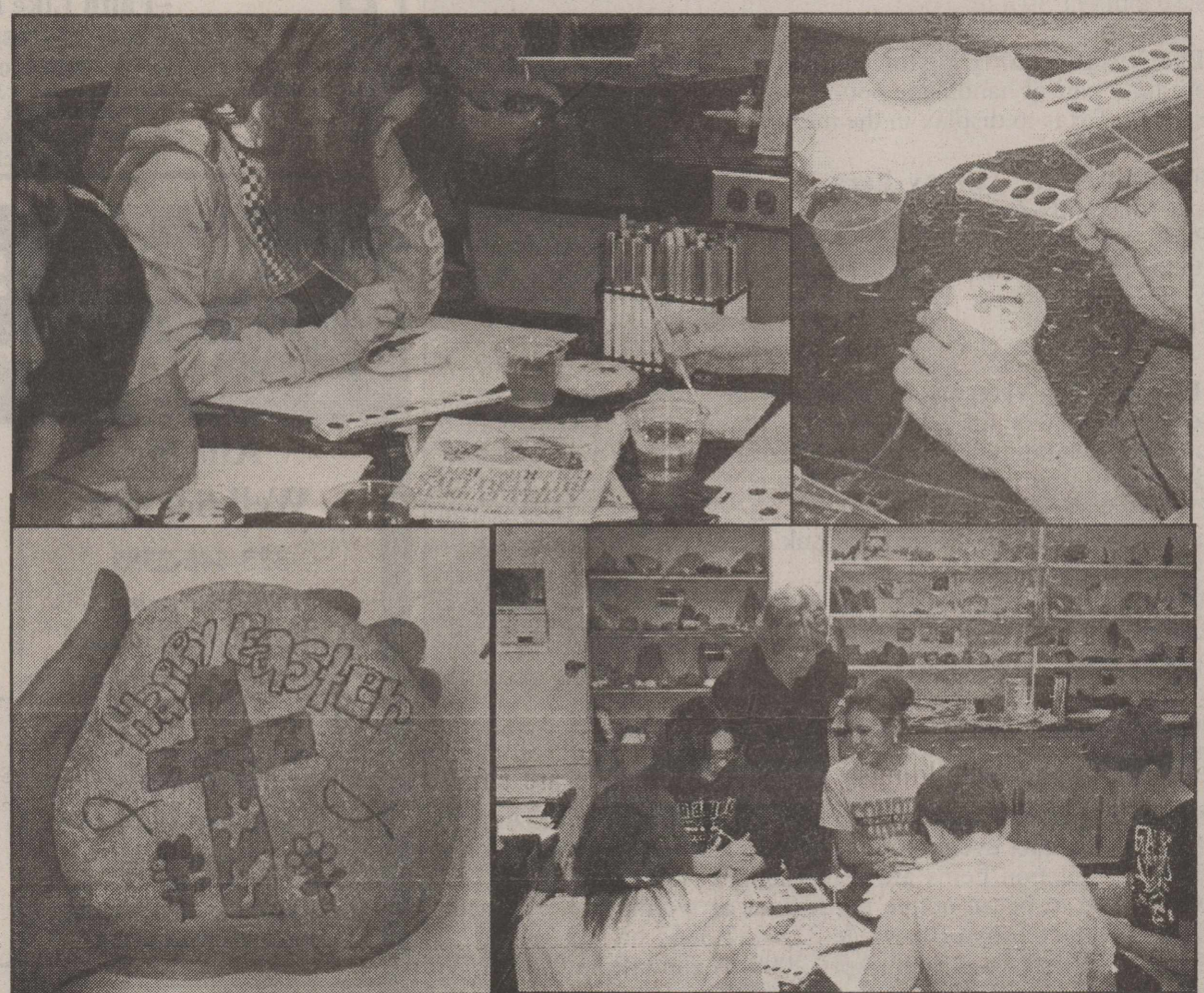

## Watch For Snakes As Warm Weather Approaches

Now that spring is here, we'll see the emergence of new vegetation and greening-up (hopefully) of our landscapes, and warmer temperatures will make the outdoors inviting. Keep in mind, however, that this is also the time when snakes become active for the year. It is a good idea for children to be wary when playing outside, even around the home.

Snakes in general, occur around a home for the specific purposes of seeking food and shelter. Knowing this, provides us with guidelines to help prevent snakebites around the home. First of all, keep wood piles, brush piles, and trash dumps as far as possible from the residence. When working in these areas, exercise caution. Never put an arm or leg into something if you can not see the bottom. Use a flashlight when moving about, even in your home yard, at night.

Maintain storage areas and livestock sheds/barns as neat as possible. Snakes will sometimes enter houses, barns and other buildings because they are attracted by the presence of rodents and insects as well as by the cool, damp, dark shelter provided by these buildings. Controlling insect and rodent populations in the area will also help to discourage snakes by eliminating their food supply. You should treat tools and materials stored on the floor as possible snake shelters. Overturned boats, tarps and similar objects are also potential shelter for transient snakes moving through the area. Remember snakes are adept at finding their way through small openings. Keep this in mind when entering basements, garages and similar areas.

When hiking or working outdoors, there are some precautions to take. Wear protective clothing in areas where you suspect snakes may be. Heavy footwear, snake proof trousers and/or leggings will help reduce your risk of snakebite. Also, never step over a log without first seeing what is on the other side. If you must move a log - use a long stick or garden tool first, to ensure snakes are neither under, on or around these favored habitats. Children should know that animal burrows make excellent habitat for snakes - don't reach in.

As it is, there are probably only two types of snakes in our area which are venomous. The first is the rattlesnake (there are several species) and can be recognized by its rattles. The other is the coral snake. Coral snakes are most notable for their red, yellow/white, and black colored banding. Several nonvenomous species have similar coloration, so to help you in identification remember the following folk rhyme. "Red on yellow, kill a fellow; red on black, venom lack". This refers to the band of color which border each other. Most species of coral snake are small in size and average around 3 feet.

Being able to identify or describe a snake in useful if snake-bitten so that the correct antivenom is administered. Lastly, arm yourself with a little first aid knowledge (just in case). Though avoiding snake bite seems like common sense, children need to be reminded. That way, we can all enjoy the outdoors this spring and summer.

AUSTIN, Texas — Despite welcome rains in late March, much of Texas remains parched by prolonged drought of historic proportions, and wildlife die-offs of whooping cranes and deer have been reported. However, experts say native wildlife evolved to bounce back from drought, and a bigger issue is how human water use is changing the equation, and how drought underscores the need for water planning and conservation.

"The current drought affecting all of Texas has reached historic proportions, with the past six months among the driest since the long-term drought of the 1950's and 1917, the driest year on record." That sentence begins the March 11 situation report from the governor's Drought Preparedness Council.

The council report said last December through February was the driest period on record for the east, south central, and upper coast regions. It also noted the entire state was classified as at least "Abnormally Dry" according to the United States Drought Monitor.

Continued dry range conditions could have a negative impact on wild turkey production and hunting prospects for spring turkey season, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists. If parts of Texas remain parched, particularly the south, experts say Rio Grande turkey breeding activity and nesting effort will be greatly reduced or nonexistent. Rio Grande spring turkey hunting season runs April 4-May 17 in the North Zone, with special youth-only weekends March 28-29 and May 23-24. The South Zone season runs March 21-May 3, with youth weekends March 14-15 and May 9-10.

At TPWD's J.D. Murphree Wildlife Management Area near Port Arthur, drought has delivered the second half of a one-two punch that started with Hurricane Ike last September.

The lack of rainfall means freshwater marshes at Murphree WMA that were inundated by Hurricane Ike are not being flushed of salt water. That lack of flushing is killing plants and damaging soil chemistry. The area's brackish marshes are saltier than usual for this time of year, suffering the same stresses as freshwater marshes.

"Brackish marshes on the WMA and neighboring pri-

vate ranch land which would normally be at or below 10 parts per thousand salinity are still up in the teens," said Michael Rezsutek, Ph.D, a TPWD wildlife biologist at Murphree WMA.

Rezsutek said little fresh water is available for use by mottled duck broods, and that will likely lead to a very low production of mottled ducks this season. Mottled ducks are the only Texas year-round resident duck, and are prized by hunters and wildlife biologists. They've been declining for the past 30 years due to habitat loss and other factors, so drought effects are adding stress to an already stressed population.

He also said alligators and amphibians are unable to recolonize areas inhabited before Hurricane Ike because of the salt water, and populations of these animals will likely remain depressed for the next several years.

Down the coast at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, drought may have contributed to the worst winter on record for the world's only wild flock of endangered whooping cranes. After an encouraging multi-year comeback in which flock numbers grew each year, this is the first decline since 2001. Only 249 birds will return north to Canada this spring, down from 270 who arrived in Texas last fall.

Refuge expert Tom Stehn attributes whooping crane losses to poor habitat conditions on the middle Texas coast. He said low rainfall in 2008 resulted in saltier bays and fewer blue crabs, the primary food source for wintering whoopers. In addition, whoopers are further stressed when cranes must leave the bays to fly inland seeking fresh water.

In the Edwards Plateau of Central Texas, at spots like Garner State Park, there were reports of non-native axis deer dying from starvation coupled with cold weather earlier this year. TPWD wildlife biologists report range conditions are in poor shape, prickly pear is thin because of the lack of water and feral hogs are looking very thin and drawn down. Native whitetail deer still appear in decent condition but may not last long if the situation continues.

In the Trans-Pecos region of West Texas, last summer TPWD wildlife biologists observed a considerable drop in the pronghorn antelope

population in portions of Jeff Davis and Presidio Counties, although overall Trans-Pecos pronghorn populations remain only slightly below the 30-year average. The specific causes are not known, but biologists believe there were several compounding factors, including how much of the affected area received no measurable rainfall from November 2007 to June 2008.

Meanwhile, this year a team of scientists are continuing work that will eventually guide decisions about how water pumping from the Edwards Aquifer in Central Texas should be restricted during critical drought periods. The science team is part of the Edwards Aquifer Recovery Implementation Program or RIP, a coalition of organizations working with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to recover endangered species threatened by low spring and river flows. The RIP approach has been successfully used in other parts of the country to

work out complex water use and endangered species issues. The EA RIP was created by the same 2007 legislation that raised the aquifer pumping cap during normal times, and as part of that agreement to increase the cap lawmakers required the RIP to be completed by the end of 2012. TPWD has four scientists on the team, examining flow needs of aquatic creatures and plants from Comal Springs all the way down the Guadalupe River to San Antonio Bay.

Finally, wildlife experts say individual citizens can do a lot to help manage problems caused by drought, including using drought-tolerant native plants for spring gardening. TPWD's Texas Wildscapes habitat program for homeowners, businesses and small-acreage landowners has a wealth of information online about landscaping approaches that can save money, require less maintenance and use less water.

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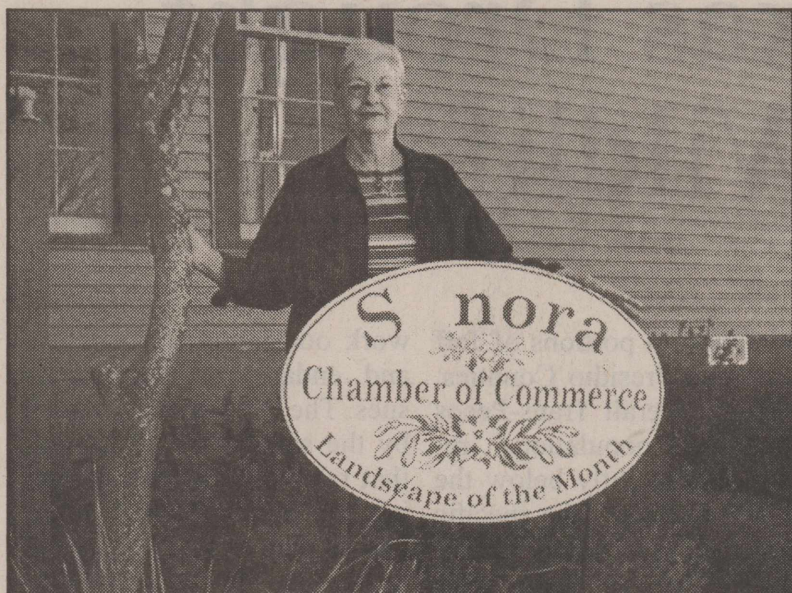

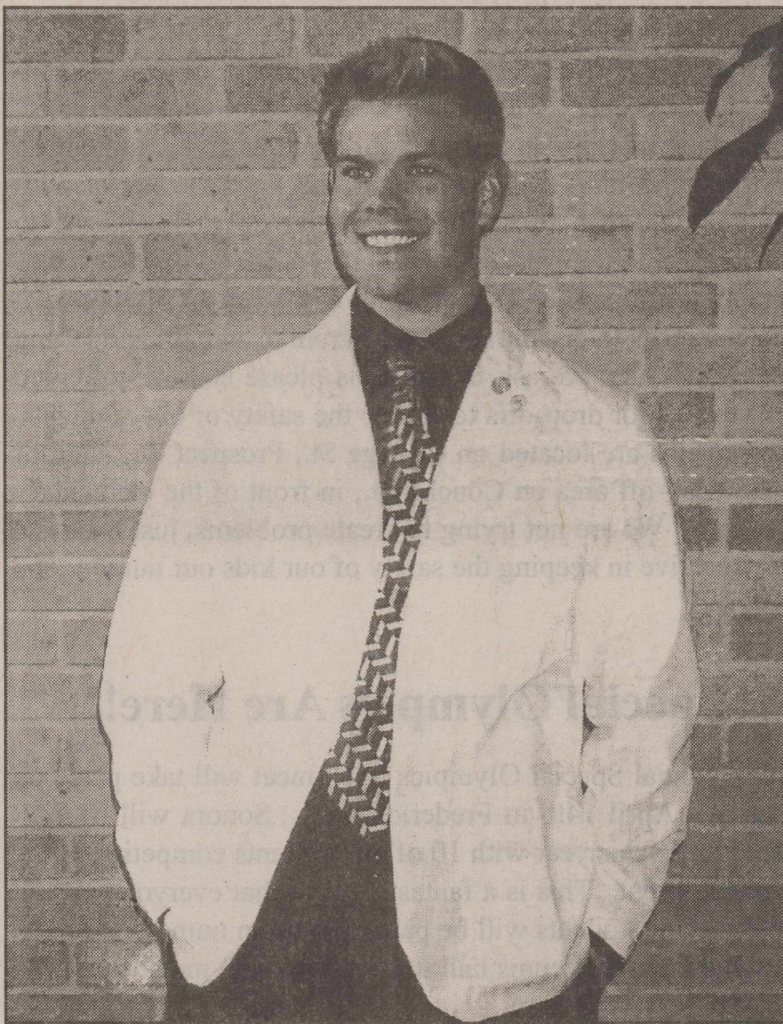


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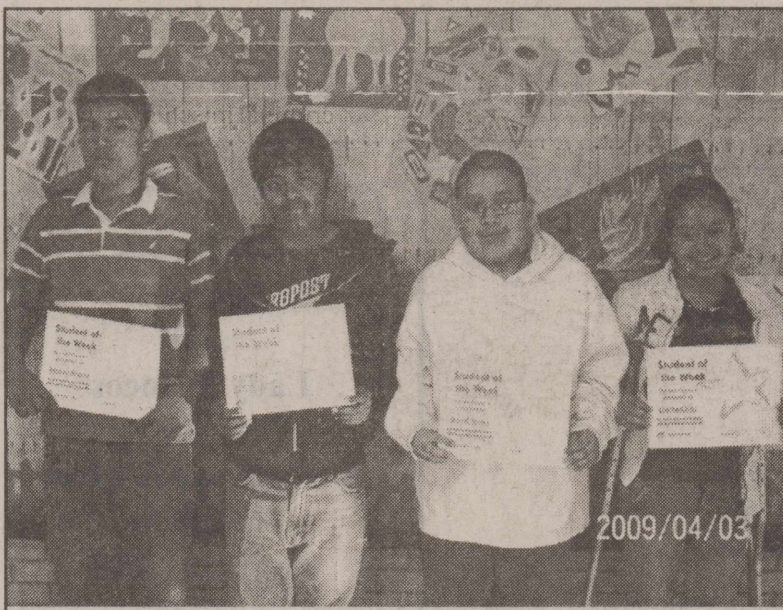
## Gilly to Begin Residency in San Antonio

## 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Boys Track Finishes Up An Outstanding Year

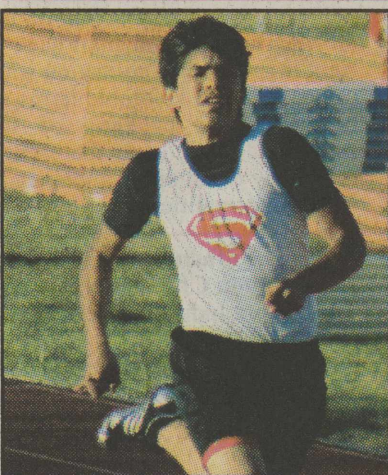

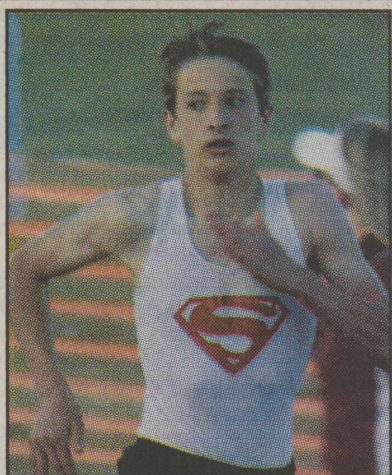
