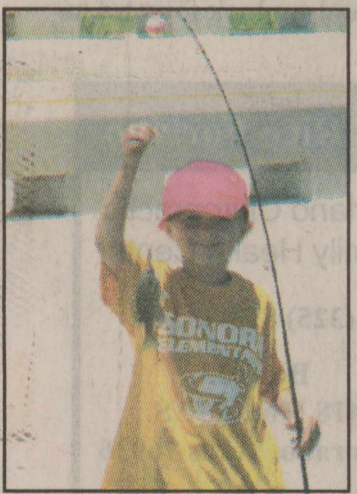

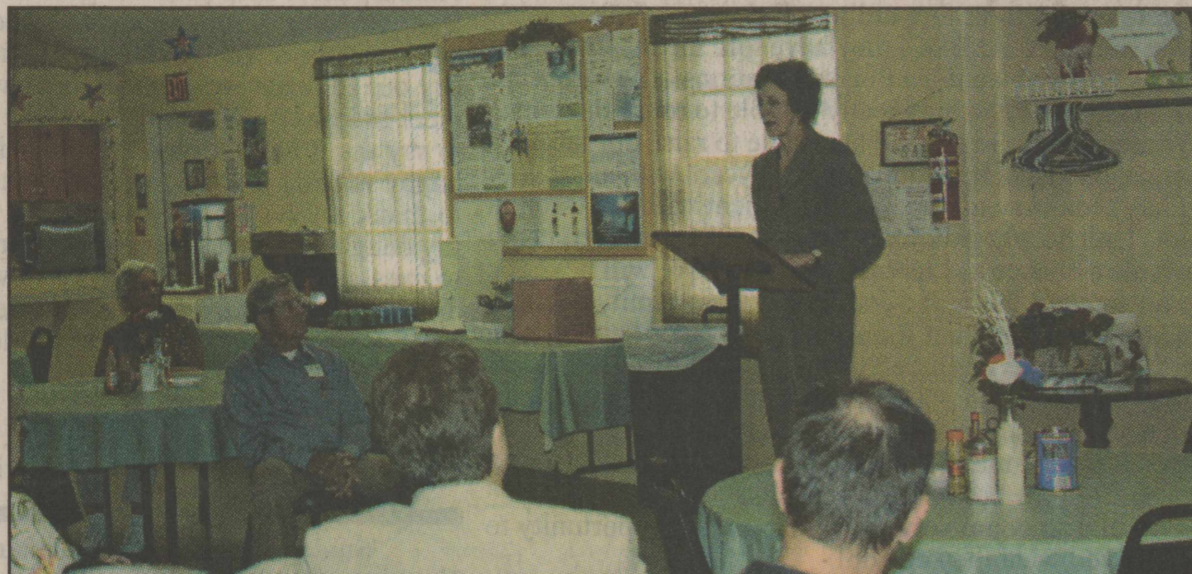

Susan Combs Visits Sonora

State Comptroller Susan Combs made a visit to Sonora's Senior Center this Friday, May 22, 2009. In the hour long presentation she discussed many different topics ranging from the current status of Texas' economic progress, to how her office spends our tax dollars as she commented, "we decided it was important to let the taxpayer know where their tax money goes. The state of Texas spends 450 million dollars every day, at the website (<http://window.state.tx.us/>) you can find day to day expenditures. Every single state agency is on the website".

Her overall view of Texas' economy is a positive one

(when compared to other states in the union), "I was working with the chairman of the senate finance committee, and Texas is so much better off than any other state. In the middle 80's we had an oil bust and we set up a "rainy day fund", and there is 6.7 billion dollars in that fund now". She did however state that Texas stands to lose some jobs, "We are going to lose 2.3 percent of jobs in Texas, and our foreclosure rate is 1 out of 850 houses when you compare that to Nevada (1 out of 70). Texas is still doing better than other states based upon those two trends". Even with an above average rating (when compared to oth-

er states), our state is still taking a good portion of federal stimulus money earmarked for our highways, education, and increasing our energy efficiency.

Combs also encouraged all Sonorans to visit the unclaimed property website (see the previous link) to see if they have any money in the unclaimed property fund, "We think there are 1865 Sonora residents who combined have over \$294,000 in unclaimed property". She then presented checks to our city and county each for money they had sitting in the unclaimed property fund.

New Field House Update: Construction to Start Soon

During the school board meeting on Wednesday, May 20th, Joe Carlock, Director of Sales and Marketing for DSA Construction Management, Jim Barnes, and other DSA representatives presented the Field House Project proposal register and the recommended contractors to the board members. The costs for the new Sonora ISD field house are as follows: \$3,768,293 for the new construction, and \$67,522 for the exterior renovation to the existing building. The total for the complete project is \$3,835,815.

The board members reviewed all of the bids. Following this review, Mallory Rousselot moved to accept the bids as submitted for the field house. Tammy Favila seconded the motion that carried unanimously. Mrs. Rousselot then moved to waive the bid bond; however, if the contractor(s) fails to provide a bond, DSA will award the bid to the next lower bidder that can produce the required bond. This motion also included rebidding of the laundry and ice maker equipment. The motion was again seconded by Mrs. Favila. The

two part motion unanimously passed.

Interim Superintendent Don Gibson reported that he and SISD Business Manager, Diane Jacoby met with the tax appraisal lawyers. The lawyers estimated that as much as one-third of the property values in Sutton County would be lost. Since that meeting, he had met with Mary Bustamante, who had more recently met with the lawyers who were now estimating a one quarter loss in tax values. Mr. Gibson said he hopes to have a report on the preliminary values at the July meeting.

The school district received two bids for the CNC Cutting Machine(plasma cutter) that the SISD Vocational Ag program will use. Mr. Gibson recommended that the school board accept the bid from VanguardMachinery International, LLC, Houston TX. Their bid was \$45,280 for the machine, software, and a feeding tool. Scott Jacoby moved to accept the Vanguard bid. Barbara Jennings seconded the motion which unanimously passed. Karen Evans, SISD Technology Director, explained that

a new sound and lighting system was needed for the high school auditorium. The system is the original one installed when the building was completed in the 1980's. She stated that she, the Theater Director, and Mr. Chavarria are still in the process of finding the best system for the money. Mr. Jacoby made a motion to authorize Mrs. Evans and the Theater Director to go out for bids for a new sound and lighting system for the high school auditorium. Jesse Bustamante seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

The next SISD board Meeting is scheduled for 5:30 PM on June 8th. At this board meeting, three newly elected trustees will begin their terms.



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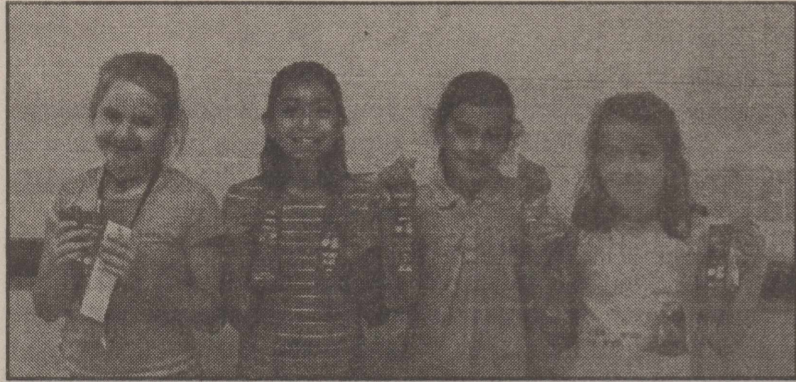

Be On The Lookout For White Grubs in Turfgrass

Summer and really hot weather are just around the corner. For lawns, that can mean grub damage. White grubs are the larval stage of insects commonly known as May or June beetles (or June bugs). Sometimes referred to as grubs, they injure turf by feeding on roots and other underground plant parts. Damaged areas within lawns lose vigor and turn brown.

The most important turfgrass-infesting white grubs in Texas are the June beetle and the southern masked chaffer. Warm season grasses like bermudagrass, zoysiagrass, St. Augustinegrass and buffalograss are attacked readily by both types of white grubs, with most lawn damage occurring during summer and fall months.

Once a year, in late spring or summer, adult beetles emerge from the soil to mate. Mated females then return to the soil to lay eggs. Within about two weeks the eggs hatch into small white grubs that feed on grass roots. The pupa, or intermediate stage between the larva and the adult, occurs the following spring and is the last immature phase of the insect's development cycle. Adults subsequently emerge from the pupal stage when environmental conditions are favorable in early- to mid-summer. Most damage from white grubs occurs during mid-summer to early-fall when the larger larvae are actively feeding.

White grub damage can be detected by the presence of irregular-shaped areas of weakened or dying grass in the lawn. Turfgrass damaged by white grubs has a reduced root system and is easily pulled from the soil. To confirm whether you need to treat for grubs, examine several soil sections at least 3 to 4 inches across and 4 inches deep. A good rule of thumb is to examine several soil plugs (one square foot) from widely scattered parts of the lawn. Take care to include areas at the edges of suspected grub damage. Finding more than five white grubs per square foot justifies treatment.

Proper timing and chemical application are critical to suppressing white grubs. New

white grub insecticides are more persistent and less toxic to beneficial arthropods and earthworms. However, these treatments must be applied early enough to kill the smaller (less than 1/2-inch long) larva. The insecticides imidacloprid and halofenozide are used most today for white grub control. Imidacloprid is most effective against small and medium-sized grubs but may kill some grubs larger than 1/2 inch long. The lethal effects of the insect growth regulator halofenozide are limited to early white grub life stages. Fortunately, both halofenozide and imidacloprid can be applied early and persist in the soil. Ideally, both products should be applied within six weeks of egg-laying (in early- to mid-June). Where grub damage is already evident in lawns and larger grubs are present, use products containing trichlorfon or carbaryl. Because they bind to soil particles and remain close to the surface even after irrigation, pyrethroid insecticides (such as permethrin, esfenvalerate, cyfluthrin and bifenthrin) are less effective against white grubs, especially in clay soils. 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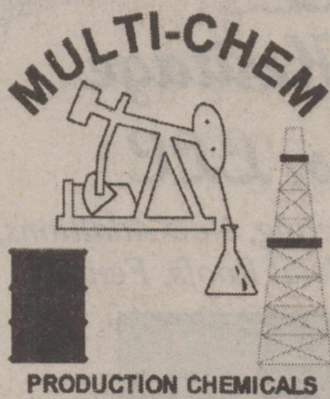

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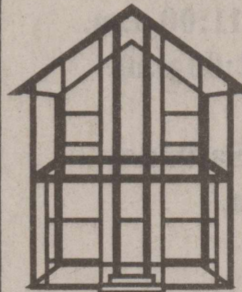

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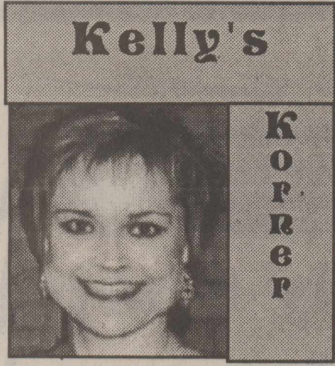

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Staying Safe in a Hot Environment

Excessive exposure to a hot environment, especially while active or working, can bring about a variety of heat induced symptoms – some mild and some severe. Heat illness can range from mild to moderate cramping and leg swelling to more severe heat exhaustion and even fatal heat stroke if the body's temperature is not brought down. In all these cases, you will want to get the person to a cooler environment – an air conditioned building if possible – or under a shade tree or other shaded area if air conditioning is not available. You will also want to be sure the person is hydrated with regular sips of cool (not ice cold) water or electrolyte-containing sports drink (unless vomiting ensues or heat stroke symptoms are evident).

- For cramping, you can apply firm pressure or gentle massage.
- For leg swelling, elevate the

legs. Call a doctor if elevation doesn't bring the swelling down.

- For heat exhaustion (characterized by dizziness or feeling faint, headache, nausea, profuse sweating, clammy/cool skin, rapid/weak pulse, low-grade fever, low blood pressure, and ashen or pale appearance), get the person out of the sun; lay him/her down; and cool the body with cool, wet cloths (changing them often) or by spraying or sponging the body with cool water.
- If signs of heat stroke are present (characterized by high body temperature [103 degrees F, orally]; red, hot, dry skin; no sweating; rapid heartbeat; rapid, shallow breathing; dizziness; nausea, confusion, irritability, and/or unconsciousness), call 9-1-1 immediately, and begin cooling the body in whatever way possible. Time is crucial, so use whatever means are available for cooling – get the victim to shade

or air conditioning; immerse the victim in a cool bath or shower, or spray with a garden water hose; sponge or spray with cool water. If the humidity is low, you can wrap the victim in a cool, wet sheet and fan him/her vigorously. Do NOT give the victim fluids in this case.

To stay safe in the heat and prevent heat illness, allow your body to adjust by limiting your activity at first. Slow down and avoid strenuous activity during the hottest

parts of the day (between 10 am - 4 pm), if possible. Wear a wide-brimmed hat; wrap around, 100 percent UV protective sunglasses; and loose fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing to allow some of the sun's energy to be reflected away from the body. Drink plenty of water even if you are not thirsty. Your body needs water to stay cool. If you are doing strenuous activity for more than 1 hour, try an electrolyte-replenishing drink, like Gatorade or Powerade. Eat well-balanced, light, reg-

ular meals. Avoid salt tablets unless directed to do so by your doctor.

Check on family, friends, and neighbors who do not have air conditioning or who spend much of their time alone. If possible, spend the warmest part of the day in public buildings with air conditioning, such as libraries, schools, theaters, malls, or other community facilities. If air conditioning is not available, stay on the lowest level of the building. Never leave children or pets alone in a closed vehicle, even when you crack or roll

down the windows-temperatures inside a vehicle climb higher than the outdoor temperature.

Giving the body time to adjust to the heat, staying hydrated, and being aware of the signs of heat illness can help keep you and your loved ones safe in the sun. 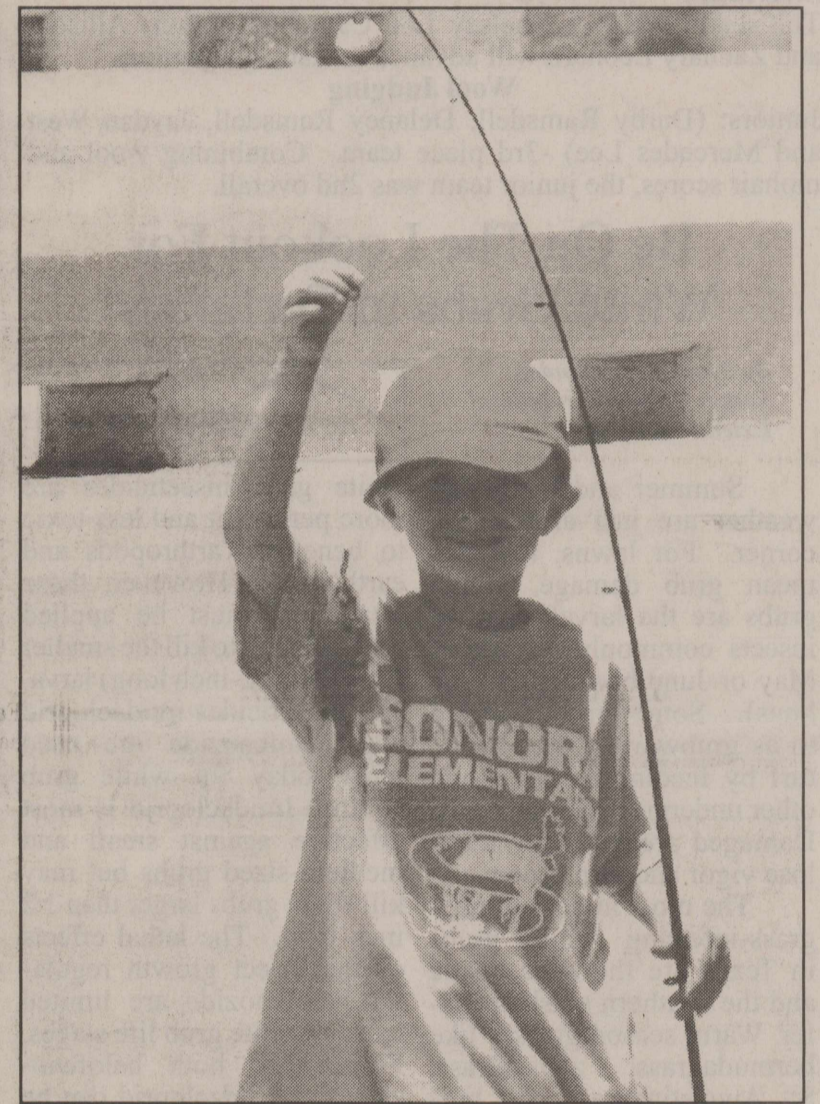

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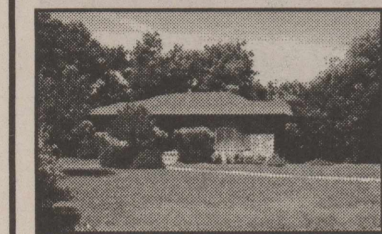

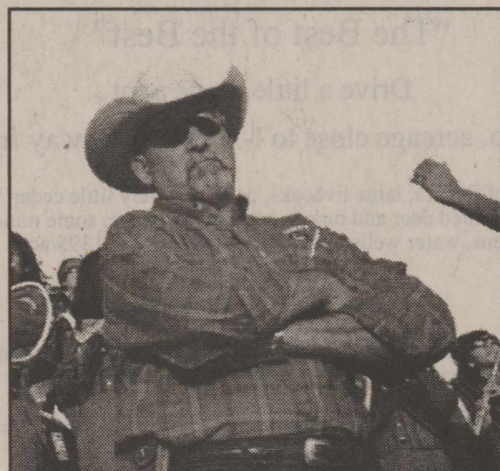
