Bromegrass

Bromegrass, which is perhaps the most arouth-resistent grass, accord-ing to a writer in the Prairie Farm-er, should be seeded early in the spring when there is an abundance of moisture, or in late summer is at the cent number of the summars in the cent number before writer. The rate of seeding is 20 to 25 pounds an acre. It may be seeded broad-cast with red clover, alfalfa or sweet clover, but it tends to crowd out the legumes.
