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





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Obituaries

John Allen Ward, III



John Allen Ward III passed away to meet his maker on June 20, 2009 at Community Hospital in San Angelo, Texas. John, son of John A. Ward, Jr. and Lucy Cutbirth Ward, was born August 27, 1929 in San Angelo, Texas. A fourth generation Texan, known to many as a rancher West of Sonora, Sutton County, Texas, where he raised cattle, sheep and goats.

He was admired and loved by all who knew him. When attending High School in Sonora he became part of the "Infamous Four" because though John was scheduled to graduate in 1944 as Valedictorian of his Sonora High School class, they elected to delay graduation to play football an additional year, to ensure a winning team. The Infamous Four became the subject of dispute, ending in the forfeiture of all Sonora's victories. John went on to the University of Texas at Austin, where he was a member of Kappa Sigma Fraternity, and graduated cum laude.

He was a proud Aviation Cadet, receiving his wings in 1952 at Reese Air Force Base, Lubbock, and completed training at Moody Air Force Base in Georgia. He flew F-51, F-86, and F-89 fighter jets in the 11th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, part of the Air Defense Command during the Korean War.

Following his discharge from the Air Force, John received his law degree from the University of Texas, where he was on the Texas Law Review, and graduated magna cum laude in 1957. He was admitted to the Texas bar in 1956 and scored the highest grade in the State on the Texas Bar Exam that year.

He was in-house legal counsel with Sun Oil Company ("Sunoco") and Chief Counsel for International Operations and on their behalf negotiated many overseas oil contracts and concessions with countries in the Persian Gulf, South America, Europe, Australia and Africa. He was licensed to practice law in Texas, Pennsylvania and Washington, D.C. He argued 37 cases before the United States Supreme Court.

John married Lucia Marino in 1983. They enjoyed many good years and many world travels together, and recently celebrated their twenty-sixth wedding anniversary. John was, for many years, the Senior Warden of St. John's Episcopal Church in Sonora, and a dedicated member of the Sonora Lion's Club. Until his death, he remained "Of Counsel" with Wallace Law Offices of Sonora.

When recounting his extensive travel adventures, he was often heard to say, "I've been to 72 countries, two revolutions... and one elegant dinner in the House of Lords." Which

John was proud of being, in one lifetime, a cowboy, a fighter pilot and a lawyer. His long time childhood friends in Sonora consider him a "legend".

Mr. Ward is survived by Lucia M. Ward, his wife; Anne Ward Guinan of Dallas, daughter from a prior marriage to Anne Curtis, two grandsons, Daniel and Amon Guinan and extended family in Pennsylvania, Colorado and Texas.

Funeral services were held at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, June 23, 2009 at St. John's Episcopal Church in Sonora, Texas. Any memorials may be sent to St. John's Episcopal



Irene Avila, Ph.D., the daughter of Silverio and Frances Avila, was awarded a Doctorate of Philosophy in Psychology from Arizona State University on May 13, 2009. It was a graduation to remember as President Obama gave the commencement address to the Class of 2009 and with over 71,000 people in attendance. The President shared some inspiring words with the graduation class: "I know starting your careers in troubled times is a challenge, but it is also a privilege because it's moments like these that force us to try harder, to dig deeper, and to discover gifts we never knew we had- to find greatness that lies within each of us". Irene will continue to do experimental research at the national Institutes of Health in Bethesda, MD where her research efforts are directed toward identifying mechanisms in the brain that could be manipulated to prevent, correct, and/or compensate for motor complications occurring in Parkinson's disease.






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
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Wipff Gets First Trophy

Students named to the President's List must have a grade point average (GPA) of 4.00 and carry a minimum class load of 12 undergraduate hours.



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
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The Post Commander's House was the only two-story building at Fort McKavett. Constructed in 1856, the building was destroyed by fire in 1941.





Sonora Equestrians Ride High at District




Chelsey Lou Campbell and Serena Lee Allison competed at the District 4-H Horse Show in Gonzales, TX on June 16,
