

Innocent until proven guilty. That should be one of the wonderful benefits of living in America. It is one of the many civil rights we as Americans should have. Unfortunately, that is not the case in Sonora, Texas, and that is why I am writing. It seems this particular right has slowly but surely been changing

in this country. It seems Americans no longer care if you are innocent or not. If it is their opinion from the start that you are guilty of an offense, then you, the accused, have to fight like hell to defend yourself and try to get a fair trial to prove your innocence. I believe that a lot of the citizens of Sonora are guilty of this. That is what is happening in our community.

I, in the last six months, have had to deal with this particular problem. Two people, who are very close to me, have had to face the judicial system in Sonora, Texas. Unfortunately, one of them has already lost. Although I and a whole lot of other people were aware of his innocense. I believe that it was the outcome of prosecutorial and law enforcement prejudice, not to mention biased opinions of the people of our community, that sealed his fate before he even stepped into the courtroom. It also saddens me that his jurors were not willing to spend more of their time in a courtroom, so it was easier to convict rather than fight for their beliefs. I believe that is the main reason why the new trial which my family and I will soon face has been moved to a different county. Maybe there we will get a fair trial. That is one of the major downfalls of living in such a small community. Everyone knows everyone else's business and, regretfully, form their opinions without knowing all the facts.

Going through this has made me realize a lot of things. Number one, we should not judge people because of the gossip we hear on a daily basis. Number two, I have realized the importance of going out to vote for our elected officials. I believe that a lot of people think their vote won't make a difference, but it does. I think that is the opinion of a lot of our Hispanic citizens of Sonora. Another thing I've seen is that people will do or say just about anything to get out of doing our civil duty to serve as jurors. I'd like to take this opportunity to urge people to please do the things we as Americans should do like voting, serving as jurors, and not have biased opinions before hearing all the facts in a court of law. I'd also like to tell people that if you believe that you are being treated unfairly by the elected officials in your community, you should stand up for yourselves and those you care about. Be aware that, ultimately, we as citizens are the ones that give them their jobs when we vote for them.

I recently read in an article that Attorney General Eric Holder said "your job as assistant U.S. Attorney is not to convict people. Your job is not to win cases. Your job is to do justice. Anybody who asks you to do something other than that is to be ignored." The article also stated that we as citizens "fail in our duty to the public and the bar when we do not penalize publicly those prosecutors who engage in egregious conduct".

In another article I read a quote that states "There is no crueler tyranny than that which is executed under cover of law, and with the colors of Justice." Again, I'd like to urge the citizens of this and every community to stand up for yourselves and the rights that our forefathers fought so hard for.

It is easy to ignore these issues when you haven't had to be in a position where you need all the fairness you can get, so please think about it and don't wait to be in this situation before doing something and trying to change things.

# Heroic Purpose

Editor's Note:

Words are cheap when used casually, dangerous when spounteers have prepared them ken with spite, and powerful when written with a purpose. Jay Amundson's purpose for writing the following could not have been more solid: to give a firsthand account of "one of the most heroic things I have ever witnessed".

> I had been flying Night Hawk missions, so I slept during the day. I was awakened one morning by an explosion, so I grabbed my camera and ran toward the smoke.

> The following sequence is of an OH6 from the 1/9 1st Cav that was refueling in Phuc Vinh. As he was landing, his skid became entangled with the fuel hose, and he flipped over. There were 3 men on board and trapped in the aircraft.

My CO happened to be landing a flight of Hueys on the tions, as soon as they are other side and saw the OH6 crash. He ordered the flight to get out of there, got out of his aircraft, and ran to the burning

> In the middle of the fueling area was a drainage ditch that often had JP4 spillage on top of the water. As he ran, he fell in the ditch and was covered with fuel. He had to know, because of the odor of the fuel, that he would burn if he tried to rescue the guys in the crash. He ran in anyway and pulled them out.

> Two of the 3 crash victims survived, though severely injured, and one died. My CO, Major Pete Bradley, was severely burned, but survived.

It was one of the most heroic things I have ever witnessed. Jay Amundson Ghostrider 3 C/227th 1st Cav 1970-1971

Major Pete Bradley (a colonel by the time of his retirement) now resides in Sonora, Texas. His own survival from this incident was secured by a non-commissioned officer who put out the fire that was engulfing the fuel-drenched Bradley. The injuries he received resulted in a lengthy recovery time in hospitals in Japan and eventually San Antonio, Texas.

Pete received a commendation for his actions on that day. His response to the news of his commendation was to ensure that the non-commissioned officer who saved him would also receive the same award.
