Chicken breast, pinto beans, mashed potatoes, green beans, and brownie for dessert, a full stomach and a great speaker characterized our Lions Club meeting.

Keith Butler, CEO of the Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital and Wellness Center, provided an instructive and informative look into the future of our hospital. If we can, let's reflect on the gifts we have in the medical fields here in Sutton County. Why are we so gifted? Well, it is many reasons, but for sure it's the early benefactors who had great vision for the needs of their descendants. But more recently, the work of our dedicated volunteers and professionals at our clinics and hospital under the leadership and direction of Lion and distinguished CEO Keith Butler have provided us with a great medical facility. The plan Keith outlined will add about 8000 square feet to our current complex. It will house an MRI state of the art imaging tube (big enough for me to fit along with Col Pete Bradley), but also to assist in breast exams which will be an added service here in Sonora. 

We all have a need for information on many topics such as landscape maintenance, brush control, or money management. Of course, it's easy enough to google, but we can't always distinguish between fact and opinion. Also, we have to look all over the internet to find what we're looking for. One useful resource is the Texas AgriLife Extension Service online bookstore.

The Texas AgriLife Extension Service publishes and makes available research-based information at the AgriLife online bookstore. Most publications are available as pdf documents and can be viewed online. In order to view most of the electronic publications, you will need to have the Adobe Acrobat viewer installed on your computer. If you do not have it, you can download the latest version from Adobe for free.

The bookstore also has a very small number of electronic publications that are in the Microsoft Powerpoint format. This will be noted in the descriptions for those specific publications. You will need to have Microsoft Powerpoint installed on your computer in order to view these items.


You can "browse the shelves" for information on agriculture, business, the environment, family & personal resource management, lawn & garden, emergency preparedness, and more. If you prefer, you can search by topic or if you're looking for a particular publication, you can search by title or publication number.

For classroom teachers, home schoolers, or leaders of after-school programs, the "Resources for Teachers" page is for you! It offers carefully selected Extension publications written by specialists and based on sound research. You can use those materials to develop lesson plans or enrich your curriculum. Topics range from Biology, Plants, and Math, to Character Education, Careers and more.

The AgriLife bookstore site also has an "Ask The Ex- friendly online site where pert" section. There, you can contact an Extension specialist for help with a specific question. 


