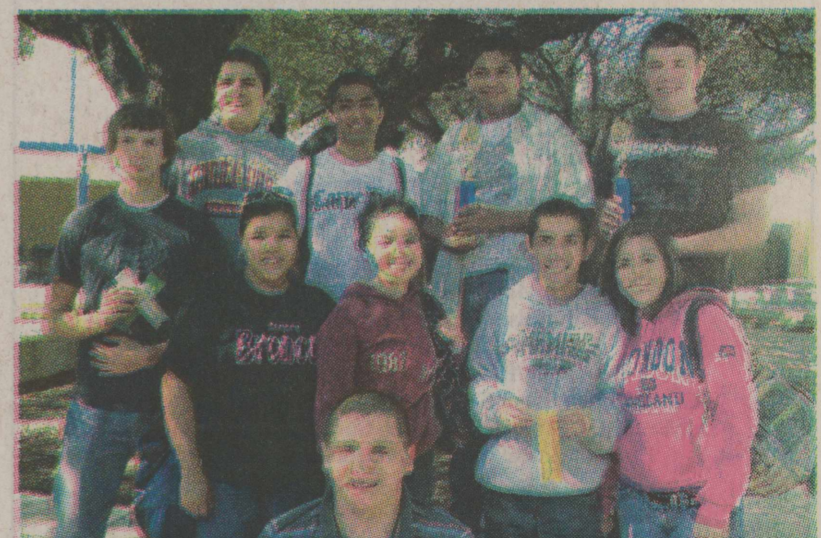
## Sonora Athletes to Assist With Haiti Relief Fund

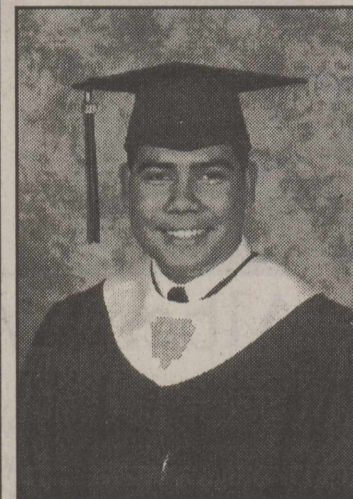

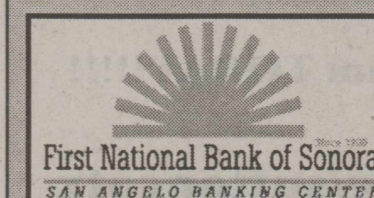

## What is the American Cancer Society?

Research - studious inquiry or examination; especially : investigation or experimentation aimed at the discovery and interpretation of facts, revision of accepted theories or laws in the light of new facts, or practical application of such new or revised theories or laws

Where would we be in the fight against cancer had the American Cancer Society not been formed in 1945? It is most likely that our treatment for cancer would be no different now than it was in 1947 when Dr. Sidney Faber, one of the American Cancer Society's first fully funded research grantee, used the drug aminopterin to achieve the first temporary cancer remission. What if the research had stopped here? Dr. Faber's research marked the beginning of modern day era of chemotherapy for cancer treatment.

The question that is posed most often is...What is the American Cancer Society and what do they do? Research. Plain and simple. The research program consists of 3 components: extramural grants, intramural epidemiology and surveillance research, and the intramural behavioral research center.

**The American Cancer Society Mission Statement:** The American Cancer Society is the nationwide, community-based, voluntary health organization dedicated to eliminating cancer as a major health problem by preventing cancer, saving lives, and diminishing suffering from cancer, through research, education, advocacy, and service.

Over the years, scientists supported by the American Cancer Society have established the link between cancer and smoking; demonstrated the effectiveness of the Pap smear; developed cancer fighting drugs and biological response modifiers, such as interferon; dramatically increased the cure rate for childhood leukemia; proved the safety and effectiveness of mammography; and much, much more.

The American Cancer Society is the largest source of private, nonprofit cancer research funds in the United States, second only to the federal government in total dollars spent. All told, the Society has committed more than \$3.3 billion to cancer research, funding 42 Nobel Prize winners -- often early in their careers before they had received recognition and monetary support for their work. Based on a report dated June 2009, the American Cancer Society has 55 current grants in Texas for a total of \$31,756,166.

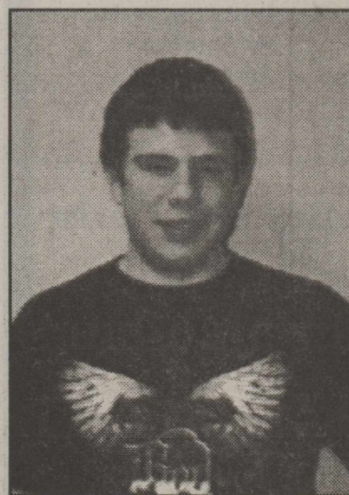

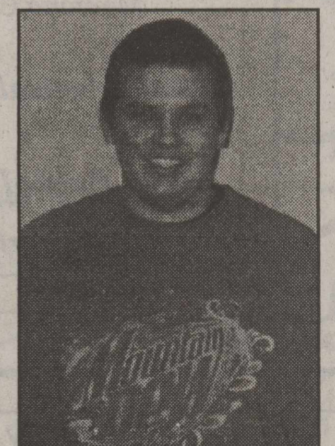

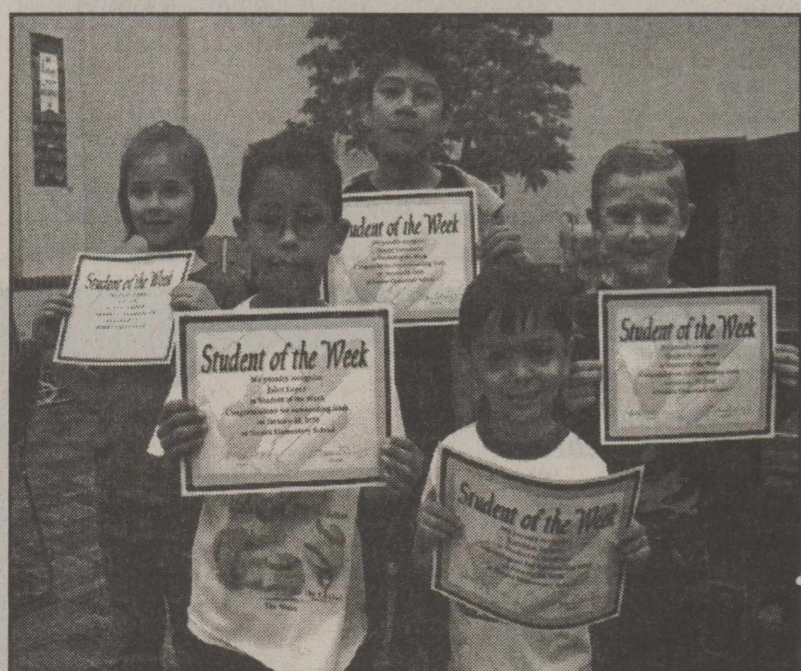
### Main Street Traffic

Two teams from the Sutton County 4-H club traveled to Texas State University on January 11th to compete in the first ever 4-H Food Challenge. This new contest hosted 39 teams and 163 youth from twenty two counties, which was a record throughout the state, as actual participation. Sutton County did an awesome job and placed first in both of their categories. The 4-H Food Challenge is a grass-roots effort developed by county Extension agents to address the need for a new, 'highly charged' foods experience. Modeled after such competitions as the Food Network's Iron Chef, the 4-H Food Challenge allows teams of 4-H members to create a dish using only a predetermined amount of ingredients. From these ingredients, 4-H members must identify, prepare and then present information related to the serving size, nutritional value, and cost of the dish. Through out this energized process, the 4-H members are demonstrating their culinary and food safety skills to judges and on-lookers.

### Marvelous Minutia



Play of light, color, texture and contrast add to the wonder of the hidden world.

What spring offers in landscape glory, winter displays in miniature. Vegetation, discolored during the cold months provides a dulled and more barren background against which the tiny can pop for the observant human eye. From an artistic point of view, the delights are endless. Small, delicate and exquisitely formed (designed, one might say) plants show off color, texture, and symmetry enhanced by shadow, sunlight and dew; creating a nature photographers' dream in diminutive splendor.

As Betsy Ross put it while visiting Eaton Hill, "It's a symphony, and there is room for everyone!" However, the story is much deeper and more complex than the seemingly simple beauty of smallness. I was fortunate to catch Ms. Ross up on Eaton Hill one recent morning, and she offered me another glimpse into the majesty of nature - much of it overlooked and hidden from the naked eye. During our brief visit, I learned that the tiny clover-like plants that are currently covering much of the ground, play a critical role in it's health by returning much needed nitrogen to the soil. Nitrogen that will be available and necessary for other vegetation to emerge in the spring. Betsy Ross studies the soil on the microscopic level and works with composting to bring the correct balance of organisms and nutrients for optimal health. She is a national leader in the field, and her company Sustainable Growth Texas helps stewards of land use natural methods to keep the soil condition balanced and enriched. Clients range from M.D. Anderson in Houston to organic farmers around the country.

Bent over, faces toward the ground, Betsy and I took in the wonder under our feet. "See, the soil doesn't like anything uncovered" she mused, stroking the tiny plant that I now see in a different light. With any luck, Ms. Ross will lead a workshop for us and share her passion for the health of our land. Perhaps brother Joe David can put in a word. Hit the trails! Be thinking about the upcoming Second Annual Eaton Hill Outdoor Photo Contest. We'll be expanding the categories and "Miniatures" would be a fun and challenging addition.

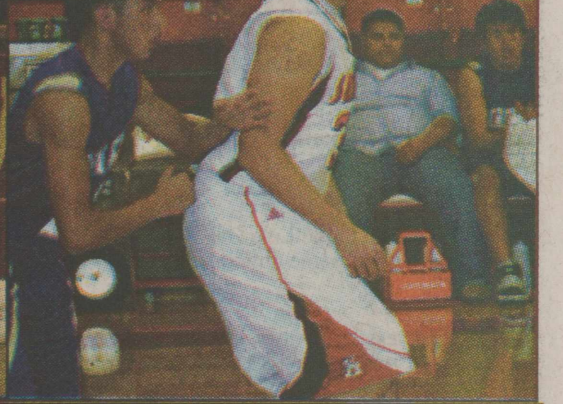
